Capua

Biunx, about 213-210, AE 12.18 g. Laureate head of Zeus r.; behind, two stars; border of dots. Rev. Artemis-Luna, crescent above brow, driving galloping biga r.; above, two stars, and in exergue and it is border of dots. Sambon 1032 SNG ANS 207 Good green patina. Nearly extremely fine 1,500.

Hyria

Nomos, 340-330, AR 7.20 g. Head of Hera Lacinia facing three-quarter r., wearing pendant necklace and diadem decorated with floral device (palmette) flanked by foreparts of griffins, both facing r.; border of dots. Rev. Yalna retrograde over man-headed bull walking r. Sambon 794 SNG ANS 270 Rutter, Campanian Coinage, 1979, 128 AMB 37 var.

Rare and with unusually fine detail. Toned, good very fine 6,500.

Some time after the minting in Sicily of one of the first tetradrachms with a facing bust, the Syracusan issue signed by Eukleidas (Tudeer 58), many cities of Magna Graecia copied this general type. Some, like Phistelia, Metapontum, Neapolis and Heracleia developed facing effigies suited to their own local cults, whereas Croton (probably the initiator of the new design), Thurium, Pandosia, Poseidonia, Fenseris and Hyria, with apparently a shared interest in the worship of Hera Lacinia, adopted a striking uniformity of obverse type. This phenomenon is perhaps to be sen as a response to the attacks being made on the Greek settlements by Italic tribes which led to the intervention of Alexander I, king of Epirus and maternal uncle of Alexander the Great.

 A charming piece. Toned, very fine 1,500.
- Didrachm, about 300, AR 7.09 g. As previous, but nymph wears narrower band in hair and triple-pendant ear-ring; behind truncation of neck, Artemis running r. with torch, and below, XAPI. Rev. As previous, but κ beneath bull and ΝΕΟΠΟΛΙΤΩΝ in exergue. Sambon 466 BMC 80 Slightly double-struck. Nearly extremely fine. 2,000.-

Diobol, after 300, AR 1.09 g. Head of Athena I., wearing high-crested Corinthian helmet decorated with griffin. Rev. TIATI to I., upwards. Heracles standing I., strangling the Nemean lion, club in field r. Sir Hermann Webber coll. 473 (these dies) O. Ravel, Catalogue of the Vlasto collection of Tarentine coins, 1947, (Teate in alliance with Tarentum) 1417-1419 (all these dies)

A very rare coin, not represented in most major collections. Nearly extremely fine 1,000.

Calabria

Taras

Nomos, 445, AR 7,85 g. TARAΣ retrograde in field upper l. Naked Phalanthos seated r. on dolphin, applauding; beneath, scallop-shell. Border of dots between plain circles. Rev. TARAΣ retrograde in field upper r. Taras, naked to waist, seated l. on stool, holding upright distaff in r. hand and long staff to armpit in l.; dotted exergual line. Vlasto Very rare. Toned, about extremely fine. 4,000.-

This enigmatic obverse shows in the extreme the marked local character already present even in the late archaic and early classical coinage of Taras, although the way in which Phalanthos' musculature is exaggerated on his nearly skeletal frame is reminiscent of similar treatment of a standing figure on the archaic tetradrachm of Selinus (Rizzo, Monete greche della Sicilia, pl. 32, 2).

- Nomos, 430, AR 7,72 g. TAPA(NTINΩN) Phalanthos seated naked on dolphin l., extending strigil in r. hand; beneath, prawn l. Rev. Taras, naked to waist, seated l. on stool and holding distaff. Vlasto 250
 - Fine early classical work. Very fine / extremely fine 1,500.-

Nomos, about 330, AR 7,91 g. Naked ephebos on prancing horse r., holding in l. hand reins, shield and two spears and striking downwards with spear in r.; in field l. and r., Λ - N and beneath horse, KAΛ and X. Rev. TAPAΣ l., upwards. Taras, naked, seated on dolphin r., adjusting with r. hand the crest of a helmet of Attico-Phrygian (?) type which he holds with his l. hand inside it; below dolphin, KAΛ Vlasto 557

Rare and of fine "Lysippan" style. Striking crack, extremely fine. 6,000.

For KAA, see J.K. Jenkins in Essays in honour of Margaret Thompson, 1979, p. 111. The types seem connected with Alexander the Molossian's campaign against local barbarians on behalf of the Tarentines.

9 Nomos, about 320, AR 7,72 g. Ephebos on horseback as previous coin, but ΣA under horse. Rev. Taras, naked, seated l. on dolphin, holding cantharus in extended r. hand and long trident in l.; to l., K, and to r., TAPAΣ downwards; beneath dolphin, smaller dolphin l. Vlasto 607 Fine style and from sharp new dies. Extremely fine 2,500.

At precisely this period the Tarentine fleet was active; see Jenkins, op. cit.

Hemistater, 281, under Pyrrhus, AV 4,25 g. Head of young Heracles r. wearing lion's skin. Rev. NIKAP in exergue. Taras driving biga r., holding trident; beneath horses hooves to r., two amphorae. Vlasto 32

Some surface damage, otherwise very fine 2,500.-

Nomos, about 280, AR 7.85 g. Head of Athena three-quarter facing r., wearing triple-crested Attic helmet decorated with Skylla r., throwing stone, and plain necklace, her hair loose; in field l., μ. Rev. HPAΚΛΕΙΩΝ to r., downwards, behind Heracles, naked, standing l., cornucopiae on l. arm and lion's skin over shoulder, sacrificing from jug over lighted altar, beside which r., club; in field l., ΑΡΙΣΤΟ/ΔΑΜΟΣ. Garrucci, Le monete dell'Italia antica, 1885, pl. 101, 39 For obverse, cf. SNG ANS 80 Extremely rare, the second published example. Toned, extremely fine 2,500.

Metapontum

Nomos, 400 or later, AR 7,87 g. Head of Demeter I., wearing cluster ear-ring of inverted pyramidal form and necklace of beads suspended from a plain wire; her hair is caught up at the nape of the neck by an olive-wreath and the truncation of the neck bears the signature APIΣΤΟΞΕ; all within a linear border. Rev. META to r., downwards. Ear of barley with tendril to l. Noe, Metapontum 2, ANS NNM 47, 1931, 422h (this coin) Gulbenkian I, 66 (these dies) Cf. Hirmer, pl. 83, 1

Very rare and of beautiful style. Nearly extremely fine. 9,000.-

Ex Münzen und Medaillen sale 64, 1984, 14, Kunstfreund, 1974, 179 and Vicomte de Sartiges collection, 39 The master-engraver Aristoxe(nos), active also at the neighbouring mint of Heraclea, has produced in the expressive head of the goddess an outstanding example of contemplative classical art.

- Nomos, 400 or later, AR 7.75 g. Head of Kore l., without ear-ring or necklace, wearing sphendone and diadem; before her brow, ear of barley downwards. Rev. META to r., upwards. Ear of barley with tendril to l.; in field l., bay-leaf. Noe 467

 Rare. Toned, very fine 4,000.-
- Nomos, 380-360, AR 8.06 g. Female head r. with ear-ring of triple-pendant type, hair in net at nape of neck. Rev. METAΠ to l., upwards. Ear of barley with tendril to r.; in field r., scallop-shell inverted. Noe 492

 Rare. Toned, good very fine 3,000.-

Nomos, about 330, AR 7,86 g. Laureate head of Zeus Eleutherios r., ΕΛΕΥΘΕΡΙΟΣ downwards before and behind, £. Rev. META to r., downwards. Ear of barley with tendril to l.; upper l., squatting Silenus and Δ. SNG ANS 451 (where obv. monogram misunderstood, these dies).

Extremely rare and of masterly style in high relief, perhaps the finest known specimen. The perfect striking and preservation permit an easy reading of the obverse legend and monogram, weak, worn or defective on the great majority of the few recorded examples.

Brilliant, good extremely fine 15,000.

Illustrated on colour plate D and enlargement plate 1

The occasion for this coinage in the name of Zeus the Liberator is again to be sought in the presence in south Italy of Alexander the Molossian. The obverse type is clearly modelled on the Eleatic Zeus, cf. Hirmer, pls. 157, 504 and 158, 505, while the issue under Dion of bronze 2-litrae from Syracuse and associated mints (Agira, Aetna etc.) will have furnished the general concept and the legend, unique in Magna Graecia. There is a parallel issue in gold in Alexander's name at Taras, a stater with the oak-wreathed head of Zeus of Dodona in the same style, Hirmer colour pl. 11, 318.

Poseidonia

Drachm, 525, AR 3,71 g. ΠΟΜ Beardless naked Poseidon, wearing chlamys over upper arms, advancing r. and striking with trident; all within double border of dots. Rev. ΠΟΜ retrograde to l., downwards. The same type, incuse, to l. An apparently unpublished variety. Cf. SNG ANS 625 cf. Gorini, 9 and 10

Rare. Toned, about extremely fine 4,000.-

Sybaris

Nomos, 525, AR 7.43 g. MV retrograde in exergue. Bull standing l., looking back, on base composed of dots between two lines; the whole within border of the same design. Rev. The same type, incuse. SNG ANS 822 Gorini 2

Nearly extremely fine 4,000.

The Sybarite bull is perhaps intended to be seen nuzzling his l. shoulder in a naturalistic way. The cult implicit in the type is that of Poseidon Taureos.

Thurium

Nomos, 420, AR 8.01 g. Head of Athena r., wearing crested Attic helmet encircled with olive-wreath. Rev. ΘΟΥΡΙΩΝ above bull walking r., head lowered; in exergue, fish r. SNG ANS 906 SNG Oxford 887 Excellent classical style; a coin of a quality rarely met within this series and exceptionally well centred.

Toned, extremely fine 2,000.-

ΘΟΥΡΙΩΝ and NI above bull butting r.; in exergue, coiled serpent r. S. Noe, The Thurian di-staters, ANS NNM 71, 1935, K2

Very rare in this state of preservation. Extremely fine 5,000.-

Rare. Toned, superb 3,000.-

Nomos, 390, AR 7.85 g. Head of Athena r. wearing crested Attic helmet decorated with griffin r. and volutes; behind bowl of helmet, Φ; before visor, A; dotted necklace. Rev. YΕΛΗΤΩΝ above lion attacking stag which it has forced to the ground, represented by a double line. SNG Cop. 1535 Mangieri 59

Ornate and vigorous work characterises this rare issue, not often found so fine. Nearly extremely fine 3,500.

- Nomos, 500, AR 7.90 g. 910 to 1., upwards. Tripod as on previous coin, but the snakes now spring from the feet of the tripod, the exergual line is plain and there is a honeycomb-pattern beneath it and in field r., crab facing outwards; double linear border with dots. Rev. The same, incuse, but without snakes and the crab is partly in relief; plain border. In field r., graffito. SNG ANS 244 Gorini 15 Good very fine 1,800.

Agathocles of Syracuse was involved, perhaps during the 290's but conceivably a decade before, in Bruttium in a poorly recorded campaign in which he captured Hipponium and Croton. Rhegium, as an ancient enemy of Syracuse, which had burnt Rhegium nearly two centuries before, should have been in some way involved. Our coin seems closely related to certain issues from Syracuse and Punic Sicily (our nos 75 and 85) and moreover depicts the solar deity Apollo and a lion, which though immemorially the badges of the city, seem singularly appropriate to the typology favoured by the tyrants of the new, hellenistic, world. These splendid dies could well have been engraved by the master who cut the best dies of the Agathocles Kore coinage (see no. 75) and perhaps also those of the vastly rare Ptolemaic-type gold stater of the same ruler, AMB 511.

Bronze, 22mm, about 270-218, AE 7.69 g. Laureate head of Apollo l., long hair falling over neck; in field r. palmbranch in vase. Border of dots. Rev. The Acragantine bronze coins of this period show the same characteristics of style and technique as the silver.

AK – PA below and above the open wings of an eagle which with lowered head grasps in his beak a snake seized in his claws; beneath the neck of the eagle is visible a tiny letter M. Rev. Crab; above, three pellets and below, crayfish l. Unpublished and apparently unique.Black patina, good very fine 2,000.

In publishing as his number 58b a tetras from the same obverse die but with a quite different variety of reverse, Calciati suggests that M signifies signed work of the die-cutter Myron who was engraving dies for silver at this time.

Racing quadriga r., about to turn around Ionic column (meta) to r.; the charioteer holds reins in both hands and long rod (kentron) in r., and is crowned by Nike who flies l. over galloping horses with open wreath; in exergue, KATANAIΩN, below which, prawn r. Rizzo, pl. 14, 10 and 13 (rev. die) Hirmer, colour pl. 3 (this obv. die) Gulbenkian coll. The master-engraver Herakleidas, according to some the originator of the facing head type on Sicilian coins of the finest classical period, worked both at Syracuse and Catana. The smooth moulding of forms, suggesting flesh rather than metal, is the aesthetic triumph of this series. Apollo, patron of the city, is given, although half smiling, a gaze of almost frightening intensity, relieved by his rather boyish hairstyle. The reverse, more usually associated with the obv. die signed by Choirion, is full of life and action, though the quadriga is from now on relegated to the lesser side of the coin. Our coin seems to be the second recorded example of this diecombination, the first being Rizzo, pl. 16, 3. Furthermore, although obverse dies of this class are notoriously difficult to tell apart (Robinson in Gulbenkian I, p. 66, 190 and 191 n., "Nos. 190-1 are from very similar but probably different dies."), our obverse may well be from a new die transitional between the two dies already known, Rizzo pl. 16, 2 and 3.

Entella in the name of the Campani

Overstruck on an uncertain earlier issue of which traces are visible on both sides, an interesting piece. Extraordinarily broad flan (32 mm), some scratches, otherwise very fine 10,000.

The light, Phoenician weight of the under-coin indicates an import, perhaps from Thracian Abdera.

The late archaic issues of Messana are often ill-struck; our specimen however is remarkably well-centred on a broad flan; the details also are very sharp.

Some doubt exists as to whether these coins, like those of Syracuse on which they are modelled, belong in time to the last period of Dion or the first of Timoleòn.

Unique and unpublished. Pitted dark patina, good very fine 3,000.-

For the obv. type (but three-quarter r.), see Morgantina Studies II, 1989, pl. 1, 11-17 and for a Syracusan prototype, pl. 2, 1; for the reverse, the model may be the rare Tarentine diobol of the same period, Vlasto 1325. For a Timoleonic dating and south Italian connections, with associated issues, see again Morgantina Studies, pl. I, pp 9-14 and 31. The legend Enakrios (of the highest point = of the acropolis) may relate the coin either to a temple of Athena there, or to a garrison occupying the heights of the city.

Rare and of good Greek style. Nearly extremely fine 8,000.-

The head of Kore-Persephone is derived from the Arethusa of the Syracusan decadrachms of the school of Euainetos (see below, no. 66) which is here copied with some fidelity by a clearly Greek hand.

This tetradrachm can be only a little earlier than the similar coins attributed to the Syracusan engraver $EY\Phi$, Schwabacher obverses Q14b and d, which share with it an advanced treatment of the horses of the quadriga, the second horse being particularly upright relative to the first, quite differently from previous versions, and the presence of a laurel-wreath which may allude to the victory of 417 over Segesta or, with less probability, to the defeat by Syracuse, Selinus's ally, of the Athenians at the Assimarus in 413. These factors, together with the generally well developed style, lead one to date this rare coin, the third recorded specimen, to between 417 and 412. Such a dating would offer the temptation to read the H on the obverse as the initial letter of Herakleidas, given that it much resembles the H on the tetradrachms of Catana, Rizzo pl. 14, 1, 2 and 3, usually credited to this engraver.

The master-engraver Eumenes belongs to the first period of signed tetradrachms at Syracuse, and his early work is characterised by a certain austerity in the reverse dies, though already softened by that fleshy sweetness characteristic of the mint; the obverses however show a stiffness neither archaic nor classical.

Obverse a little double-struck, the reverse die in much better state than usual. About extremely fine 10,000.

Small areas of erosion on the reverse lower l., and the obverse a little double-struck with a die-flaw beneath the neck, the flan also a trifle small, otherwise a very fresh and sprightly example of the work of the great die-cutter Euainetos. Lightly toned, extremely fine 25,000.-

Decadrachm, 400-390 or later, AR 43,34 g., unsigned style of Euainetos. Obv. as previous coin. Rev. Similar to previous, but (ΣΥ-ΡΑΚ-Ο-ΣΙΩΝ) above head of goddess and before her neck, pellet, and behind it, four-pointed star. Gallatin obv. XXII rev. J.VI

Well-centred on a rather large flan, practically everything but the ethnic visible, and in strong bright metal, rare in this condition. Extremely fine 40,000.

Perhaps only a metal analysis could demonstrate convincingly the existence of a secondary late issue of decadrachms of about 340-330. This is the first appearance of Agathocles's name on the coinage with a design indicating with skill and wit his successes in war and peace against the enemies of Sicily in general. For a more ambitious but less skilful contemporaneous treatment of the same theme, see our tetradrachm, no. 158, of Seleucus I of Syria, and for similar style and execution in parallel issues of Rhegium and Carthage, our nos. 29 and 85. We cannot know who initiated this splendid competition of coinages, nor whether Agathocles struck this coin in a votive, pre-war issue or as a triumphant vindication of his policies after success was assured, but its stylistic similarity to the Egyptianising gold stater (AMB 511) suggests the latter, with a date of about 308-305/4.

Jenkins in his penetrating study inclines towards seeing in the so-called "Dido" obverses of this coin and others (270, 271, 272) forms of Tanit-Artemis which, given the many-sided and ambiguous nature of the divinity in question, must be at least partly true, especially in the case of the chaste and undecorated head on his no. 270, but fails to observe that the band she wears on our coin corresponds closely to that worn by Hera Lacinia on the well-known series of facing head nomoi from southern Italy (see our nos. 2 and 27) which, as adumbrated by Burnett in SRN 56, 1977, particularly pp. 108, 109 and 115, and following the ample indications given by postwar hoard evidence to date, must be brought down to 340-330 or later (Taras period IV, Velia V), a time at which hostile movements among non-Greek populations followed by the campaigns of Alexander of Epirus stimulated the moneyers of Magna Graecia to frenetic activity, and perhaps little more than a decade before the wars of Agathocles and Hamilcar son of Gisgon did the same for the Syracusan and Carthaginian mints.

The goddess pictured would be, then, Tanit-Hera with warlike attributes, wearing the tiara favoured by Graeco-Persian war-gods, warriors and rulers, accompanied by her victorious lion which elsewhere she rides as Mater Deum (for which see especially the Roman third-century imperial cults of Iuno Caelestis, Venus Caelestis and Cybele, all aspects of the same divinity). The Carthaginian Tanit in her earliest form as the Ishtar of the Gilgamesh cycle, at once hysterical slut (Aphrodite) and potent Queen of Heaven as daughter-consort of the sun-god Shamash, whose animal is, as on the coinage of Caracalla, the solar lion, cannot be said to have changed at all, following the conservative canons of eastern religion. For the Greeks the nearest approximation might have been Artemis-Hera, or even Athena-Hera, though Pausanias 3.13.9. refers to an ancient statue in Sparta called Hera Aphrodite. Agathocles' wars and endless intrigues seem to have produced a renaissance of high-quality numismatic propaganda, for which see our nos. 29 (Rhegium) and 75 (Syracuse), where long-haired, rather manneristically-handled divinities became suddenly fashionable. A comparison with the companion "Dido" tetradrachm, Jenkins 272, on which Tanit seems to wear a murex or sea-shell tiara suitable for the Astarte of Tyre from which Carthage was founded, suggests that the latter might indicate victory at sea, while our coin would refer to war on land.

The lack of *epi* before suggests that here we are dealing not with a magistrate, but rather with a local despot who has appended his name to what might pass, given its respectable early posthumous style and full weight, as a proper stater of Lysimachus, in precisely the same manner in which Scostoces takes advantage of the reputation of the great diadochus on his tetradrachm, our no. 96.

Our specimen, which comes from the same dies as the Berlin coin, is struck on the same weight standard as the almost contemporary Macedonian issues made for local circulation. Its considerable historical interest derives from its bearing the portrait of a living Roman more than a century before it was to be acceptable to a republic which at that time was only just beginning to allow magistrates' monograms to appear on the Roma head denarii. It was surely struck immediately after the victory of T. Quinctius Flamininus over the troops of Philip V of Macedon in June 197 at Cynocephalae. The most likely explanation for the issue is to be sought in a desire to publicise, in a land accustomed to see the heads of its kings upon the coinage, the appearance of the conquering Roman general, not as part of a personality cult (unthinkable for a Roman of the time), but rather in order to convey through the medium of coinage, here certainly used for the first time by the Romans in so dramatic a way, yet in a fashion wholly comprehensible to the native population, the importance of the Roman victory.

The obverse signature Zoilou (of Zoilos) is that of perhaps the chief commissioner of the mint, or finance minister, as has been commonly supposed, of both Philip V and his son Perseus, since he signs dies in full (in this unique instance) or in abbreviated form or monogram for both rulers. Given the exceptional quality and unreduced weight of this emission, it may reasonably be assumed to have been a coronation or donative issue. Zoilus, whose name last appears as $\mathbb{T} - \Omega$, patronymic (?) to Hermias signing the innovative tetrobols or pseudo-Rhodian drachms of the Larissa 1968 hoard (Price, Essays Mørkholm 1989, p. 241), laid down a few years after Perseus's final defeat by the Romans at Pydna in 168, seems to have been, especially in the light of his perhaps unparalleled prominence on our coin, the éminence grise of the Macedonian kingdom, his numismatic activities in part analogous, though in an honourable way, to those of the rebellious minister Tryphon, guardian of Antiochus VI of Syria a generation later, who is also to be found signing his master's dies.

Philip VI Andriscus (?) pretender 149/8

Naxos, famous for its wine and the worship of the wine-god Dionysus, was mistress of the Cyclades in the late sixth century under the tyrant Lygdamis, who may have initiated the island's coinage in about 540. Ross Holloway suggests that the wreath on the cantharus commemorates the repulse of a Persian attack in 500, earlier, commoner coins having a plain cantharus. The mint's activities terminated with the Persians' sack of the island in 490 during the Ionian Revolt.

The complicated symbolism of the reverse presents Mithradates as legitimate ruler of Pontus (badge, star and crescent, i.e., sun and moon, indicating Persian satrapal origins), descendant of the hero Perseus (who slew Medusa, mother of Pegasus) and the new Dionysus, liberator from the Romans, (ivy-wreath as on cistophori); further allusion is perhaps intended to Pontic connections with the royal house of Macedon, whose last representative was king Perseus.

Head of Mithradates r. as previous, but the diadem is obscured by long hair flowing backwards as in a divine wind and the features are thrust forward, with long side-locks. Rev. The meaning of the stag is obscure. Jenkins in Gulbenkian coll. II links it to the Ephesian Artemis (who is equated with the Persian Anahita, the Lydian and Pontic Aphrodite/Artemis) and to the coin type of Mithradates' grandfather, Pharnaces I, showing a syncretic deity feeding a doe on vine-shoots. The stag would then also relate to the cult of Dionysus and to western Iranian religion, where its appearance in Parthian and Scythian iconography is commonplace. In the early part of his reign, Mithradates had overcome the Scythian tribes of the Transcaucasus.

Amastris was founded about 300 by the tragic Achaemenid Amastris, sometime wife of Lysimachus, and her choice of types reflects her Iranian background. Mithras here is not the Roman mystery-god, an invention of the first century A.D., but the Persian champion of Ahuramazda, god of light and goodness, whose sun-sign he carries on his tiara, almost precisely that worn by Tanit on our tetradrachm, no. 85. Anahita, the Persian Artemis, much loved in western Asia Minor, was goddess "of the healing waters" (see Zend-Avesta).

"Ariarathes", a name taken when he was put as a child on the Cappadocian throne, his father having extirpated the previous dynasty, although kinsmen, was a son of Mithradates VI Eupator of Pontus, and here copies faithfully his father's types (see our nos. 126-128). The tetradrachm for portrait and monogram corresponds to the drachms for years 4 and 5 in Mithradatic style and is quite unlike Ariarathes' first, purely Cappadocian coins; it belongs perhaps to a time in the confused chronology of the reign when Mithradates wished to be seen, through his son, as anti-Roman.

This interesting tetradrachm, closely related in typology to the coin of Agathocles with Kore and trophy-building Nike (our no. 75)

with which it must be roughly contemporaneous, may well have been struck to celebrate the complete overthrow in battle at Ipsus in Phrygia in 301 of Antigonus king of Asia and his son Demetrius by the combined forces of Syria, Thrace and Macedon under Seleucus, Lysimachus and Pleistarchus, brother of Cassander. Seleucus had brought his army back from successful campaigns in India to fight in Asia and his portrait (or that of Alexander, also a conqueror of India) wears a helmet covered with the hide of one of Dionysus' animals, the panther, and decked with bull's horn and ear for divine power; see our coin of Demetrius, no. 109. The god Dionysus had himself conquered and civilised India, Diodorus Siculus ii, 38 and iii, 63, after having been taught the mysteries of Cybele in Phrygia, Apollodorus iii, 5, 1. The reference to Seleucus-Alexander as victorious liberator of mankind, descended from the divine sphere, as with Mithradates Eupator two centuries later, is unambiguous; his later more splendid cult-title was Zeus Nicator.

Alexander's successors may wear the bull's horn of Poseidon, the earth-shaker, but to the great dead king himself are given the elephant's scalp as conqueror of India and the ram's horn of Zeus-Ammon, lord of the universe. Pheidias's great statue of Zeus at Athens was of ivory and gold, and it is his colossal bronze statue of Athena the Champion, Zosimus V, 6, identical with the Macedonian Athena Alkis or Alkimache, the mighty, or mighty fighter, that will have inspired the reverse type. Athena, as protectress of all heroes distinguished for prudence and good counsel, was well suited to Ptolemy's careful politics.

Alexander is linked again, as on the previous coin, with Zeus, whose thunderbolt he carries, and Athena, whose aegis he wears, thereby associating his successor Ptolemy with the will of Heaven. The elephant, the ultimate weapon of the age, will stand for secular power as well as a reminder of Alexander's vast empire, which, in theory at least, each diadochus had sought to uphold.

XXXIV, 42, loved her so dearly that after her death he planned a mortuary temple with a magnetic roof in which her iron statue would float in the air.

The dating and mint-identification of this didrachm have for long been a source of controversy for students of the coinage of the period. Only recently has there been a convergence of opinion toward putting it to 312-285, an opinion we fully share; the purpose of the issue remains however obscure and Crawford's theory 'for the construction of the Via Appia, Crawford and CMURR, is scarcely convincing. As far as the mint is concerned, in our view Neapolis is the only possible choice, as already suggested by Crawford, and CMURR, p. 29. The weight standard is that of Neapolis, but that alone would not be sufficiently persuasive if there were not other pressing historical and political considerations to take into account. At the time Neapolis was Rome's sole dependable ally in the region and the only one with a mint equipped for the production of such a coin; furthermore, we believe that the enormous issues of Neapolis for this period were directed exclusively to the supplying of Rome with the means necessary to develop its commercial relationships with Magna Graecia and to sustain our theory we would pray in aid the two bronze issues (Cr. 1/1 and 2/1) with the legends PΩMAIΩN and ROMANO, obviously struck at Neapolis.

Didrachm, Neapolis, after 275, AR 7.06 g. Diademed head of young Hercules r., draped with lion's skin and with club over r. shoulder. Rev. The Roman she-wolf standing r., looking back, giving suck to Romulus and Remus; in exergue, ROMANO Syd. 6 Cr. 20/1 Good very fine 2,800.

We would argue that this didrachm was struck at the same time and at the same mint as the Apollo / horse didrachm, Cr. 15/1, that is, immediately after the battle of Beneventum in 275 and in conjunction with the didrachms in the names of Cales, Suessa, Teanum, Nuceria and Arpi also to be assigned to Neapolis, forming a unified production with those issued in the name of the city itself.

It seems impossible to maintain the thesis of the obverse head's being Hercules, who is usually depicted on coins as a beardless child or youth, as on another coin of Faustus's, Cr. 426/4, or as a mature man with light or full beard. A Hercules-Melqart attribution is marginally possible, given the plump, self-indulgent orientalisation of the face, but the extensive late Tyrian silver coinage (a locus classicus for the iconography of Melqart) never gives him a moustache, and one might ask why Sulla's cult of Hercules should choose a markedly non-Italian version. Bocchus I of Mauretania might be represented, were it not that he is already on Faustus's coinage, reverse of Cr. 426/1, and his sons were adherents to Caesar's cause. Jugurtha is a likelier candidate, though he is already shown on the same coin as Bocchus and moreover bearded, with a young portrait derived from a portrait bust. Yet on a coinage which evokes the memory of great Sulla and links it with the achievements of Pompey, summoning up the personal cults of the dictator as passed on to his political heir, Venus, Diana and Hercules, there should be room for his greatest military triumph over non-Roman enemies which resulted in a successful conclusion to the first Mithradatic war. In a speech made at the end of his splendid triumph in 81 for his Mithradatic victories, Sulla claimed for himself the surname of Felix (spelt archaically FEELIX on the coin, as though taken from a painting or inscription of L. Sulla's time), as one specially favoured by the gods. The problematic head would therefore be that of Mithradates Eupator, portrayed in a rather general way as a hellenistic monarch in the prime of life, Dionysus's panther-skin over his shoulders. Roman coin portraits need not closely resemble earlier coin originals, for which see the denarii of L. Philippus of 113 or 112, Cr. 293/1, with a portrait of Philip V of Macedon quite unlike that on his own coins, or the grotesque parody of Alexander the Great on Aesillas' tetradrachms, BMC 81, given that the model might be a painting, a statue or a gem. Certainly the broad characteristics of Mithradates on his portrait money are reflected on this coin: the tousled hair in diadem with floating ends, the exaggerated side-locks, the fleshiness and the forward-jutting features
