Adjudication ensues after the highest bid has been called three times, and commits the bidder to accept the coins. Written bids have preference over room bids. The buyer cannot claim to act on behalf of a third person.

The authenticity of the coins is unconditionally guaranteed, without time limit. All identifications of the items sold in this catalogue are statements of opinion and made in good faith.

Toned, good very fine 1'300

The Campani

Nomos, about 415-410, AR 7.53 g. Head of Athena r., wearing crested Athenian helmet wreathed with olive. Rev. KAMIIANO retrograde above man-headed bull walking slowly r. N. Rutter, Campanian Coinages 475-380 BC, 1979, 5 (this obverse die).

This interesting coin forms part of a small series almost certainly struck at Neapolis in the name of the Campani in all probability the inhabitants of Capua. Thurian-infuenced, the coinage is die-linked with Cumae and Neapolis, sharing the ubiquitous man-headed reverses strongly indicating what is not narrowly Neapolitan, but rather represents Achelous, for whose relationship with Parthenope and the Sirens, see Rutter pp. 42-45. Campanians spring from the great Sabellian invasion of about 425, when Capua fell, of northern Magna Graecia whose culture they quickly adapted themselves, Diod, 12. 31. 76; Livy 4. 37.

Cumae

Nomos, about 430-420, AR 7.51 g. Female head r., wearing taenia, involved in short hair and pellet ear-ring. Rev. KYMAION Mussel, hinge to r.; above, fish swimming r. Border of dots. Rutter 116 (this coin).

Toned and good very fine 4'000

Nomos, about 420, AR 7. 51 g. Lion's scalp seen from above and to front; on either side, boar's head downwards. Rev. KYMAI ON Mussel, hinge to r., above, barley-corn. Rutter 144 (these dies).

Very rare. Dark tone, very fine 2'500

- Nomos, about 420, AR 7.54 g. Female head r., wearing taenia, involved in short hair and pellet ear-ring. Rev. KYMAION Mussel, hinge to l.; above, barley-corn. Rutter 158.

 Nice pale grey tone very fine/extremely fine 2'500
- Nomos, about 420, AR 7.49 g. Female head r., as previous. Rev. KYMAION retrograde, as previous, but mussel-hinge to r. Rutter -, cf. 172. Seemingly an *unpublished* variety.

The Hyrians

Nomos, about 400-395, AR 7.09 g. Head of Athena l., wearing crested Athenian helmet wreathed with olive-branch on which owl l. with closed wings, head to front. Rev. YDINAI Man-faced bull walking slowly l. over double exergual 11 line. Rutter 91 (these dies).

A lovely piece in fine classical style with a good grey tone and about extremely fine

Nomos, about 400-395, AR 7.47 g. As previous and from the same obverse die, but bull is to r., with lowered torso, and legend is retrograde. Rutter 47 (these dies).

About extremely fine 1'500 12

Rutter's O26 and O37 are appartantly the same die (as is probably also, with recutting, O41) and its steady deterioration suggests that right-facing bulls follow left-facing bulls in a short-lived large issue in need of reordering.

13 Nomos, about 395-385, AR 7.06 g. Head of Hera Lacinia three-quarter r. wearing broad diadem edged with dots and decorated with palmette flanked by foreparts of griffins. Rev. YDINA retrograde above and slightly inclined to r., man-headed buil walking slowly r. over double exergual line. Rutter 134 (these dies). In exceptional quality for this issue, toned and very fine

Coins are the only evidence for poeple of this name. Four obverse dies are linked with Nola, two with th Fenserni and one recut for Neapolis. The obverse die of our coin, with its suggestive head of Hera Licinia, is used both for the Fenserni issue and, intrigingly enough in a unique instace, for Thurium, SNG Cop. 1431, suggesting that Italic tribes and Italiote cities were to some degree allied under the protective power of Hera against yet other hostile groupings. The extreme rarity of the type at Thurium may indicate, since we know that city to have been an aggressive defender of Greek interests, a rather tentative deplomacy.

Neapolis

14 Nomos, about 4220-410, AR 7.62 g. Head of nymph Parthenope r., hair combed down from top of head to rather loose horizontal waves at brow and turned up at back of neck with hint of krobylos. Rev. ΝΕΟΠΟ-ΛΙΤΗΣ above and below man-faced bull walking r. on ground-line, head slightly raised. Rutter, pp. 49f. and pl. 11, 17 (obv. 10 and rev. 16, these dies) cf. pl. 4, 77 (Cumae, similar obv. die) Sambon 327 (this obv. die).

Extremely rare and perhaps the finest known specimen. Light grey tone, good very fine

This beautiful early issue, recorded from a small surviving group sharing one obverse die with four reverse dies, has been associated with the last wholly autonomous coinage of Cumae. The nymphs' heads are very similar, that of Neapolis possibly hiding under her with the fast whony autonomous confage of Cuntae. The hympits heads are very similar, that of reapons possibly maning under her hair the taenia (or strophion) visible at Cumae and perhaps suggested on the next and last obverse die of this Rutter group 9, 21-23. There are clear stylistic affinities with south Italy and Sicily, Terina and Segesta coming to mind. The first coinage of Neapolis is heavily Sicilian-influenced and ends with a series in which appear sporadically Nikeis and maritime symbols, presumably about 425. She shortly after resumes coining with nomoi of Graeco-Campanian type of which our coin appears to be a fairly early example.

Nomos, about 380, AR 7.28 g. Similar to previous, but hair is restrained by sphendone like broad linen taenia at brow, 15 shows two free locks at cranium and is loosely bunched at back where supported by taenia. Rev. Man-headed bull walking r., head three-quarter r., crowned with wreath by draped Nike flying r.; in exergue, [NEO]ΠΟΛΙΤΗΣ. Rutter –, cf. group 18. Sambon –, cf. p. 199. These dies seemingly *unpublished*.

Old cut on taenia, but with a good dark grey tone, nearly extremely fine

The coin has close affinities with many pieces illustrated by Rutter, 94-127, a class to which it surely belongs, but there are aspects, especially the down-combing of the hair from the top of the head, which suggest an early placing, if not at the very beginning, just after the left-facing head nymphs of Rutter 94-96. This is one of the earliest coins of the new style money of Neapolis with a fine classical obverse allied with a reverse revolutionary type, a walking bull with its man-faced head three-quarter looking at the observe and attended by Nike, itself a late addition in the Campanian type coinage, beginning about 390 and corresponding with the Nolan nomos, Rutter 16. By this time Neapolis has ceased to coin for the Hyrians, Festilians and Fenserni, the moment of division being marked by the nomos of Allifae which compounds a Nolan type obverse die with a reformed reverse with an old style profile bull reverse, Rutter Nola 64 and Allifae 1. This assertive new coinage must surely record a noable victory for Neapolis and her allies.

Nomos, about 370, AR 7.50 g. Head of Parthenope r., essentially as previous, but now jewelled with quasi-linear 16 necklace and circle-and-bar ear-ring with triple-pendant, taenia has become opisthosphendone, tied at brow and supporting richly waved and piled-up hair. Rev. As previous, but bull I., O beneath; in exergue, (N)ΕΟΠΟΛΙ(ΤΗΣ) Rutter 182 (these dies). Sambon 362. Cf. AMB 44 (where "380-360").

Rare. Old shallow scratches on cheek, otherwise a beautiful example of advanced style and with a fine dark tone. Extremely fine

Nomos, about 275, AR 7.33 g. Head of nymph Parthenope I., wearing taenia, triple-pendant ear-ring and necklace; behind, elephant I. Rev. Man-faced bull walking r., head to front; above, chiton-clad Nike flying r. to crown him; below, BI and in exergue, NEOΠΟΛΙΤΩΝ. SNG ANS 394 (this rev. die). Sambon 499. 17

Finely toned and well centred, nearly extremely fine 1'200

Nomos, about 270, AR 7.36 g. Head of nymph Parthenope l., wearing taenia under jewelled cord-diadem, triple-18 pendant ear-ring and necklace; behind, crater. Rev. As previous, but below bull, A. SNG ANS 418. Sambon 533. Test-cut on edge at ten o'clock, otherwise a finely toned extremely fine

Nola

Nomos, about 400-395, AR 7.08 g. Helmeted head of Athena l. as on nos. 11 and 12 above for Haria, and appartantly 19 from the same die. Rev. NΩΛΑΙΩΝ above man-faced bull walking r.; below, monogram Λ E. Rutter 14 (these dies). Rare, this die transference not recorded by Rutter. Grey tone, very fine

Nuceria Alfaterna

Time of Pyrrhus.

Nomos of reduced weight, about 279 or later, AR 7.00 g. Head of divinised Alexander the Great r., with horn of Zeus-20 Ammon and wearing taenia amid abundant flowing hair; in field r., in Oscan script, ethnic nucerinum. Border of dots. Rev. Naked ephebos, in the pose of a Dioskuros, standing three-quarter l., head l., restraining with r. hand on bridle horse stepping I. and behind and holding almost upright over I. arm long sceptre terminating in calyx and lotus bud; in exergue, in Oscan script, ethnic alfaternum. A. Sambon sale, june 1927, 96 (these dies). Garrucci pl. 90, 3 (=Sambon 1006) var., cf. Garrucci pl. 90, 1-2 and Berlin Royal Museums coll. I, p. 152, 1.

Second recorded example. Old scratch on neck otherwise toned and very fine 8'000

The obverse is a close copy of a stater or drachm of Lysimachus (who drove Pyrrhus out of Macedonia in 283), clearly showing the forward traits and upward-gazing eye of Alexander and is derived from such coins as Thompson, Essays Robinson pp. 176f., 139 and 149 (stater and tetradrachm, Alexandria Troas) and 174 (drachm, Ephesus) of about 290. The reverse type of a youthful hero, lacking only a chlamys to be Castor, and carrying a sceptre of Epirote-Macedonian type, BMC Jewellery pp. 232f, 2070, fig 65, is perhaps the nearest one could come to depicting Pyrrhus.

Nomos, after 276, AR 7.19 g. As previous, but in a later style and to l., taenia barely indicated; in field r., dolphin; around, Oscan ethnic retrograde nucr[inum alafaternum] Rev. As previous, but without exergual inscription. SNG 1'500 Good grey tone, extremely fine ANS 560 (these dies).

Dioscurus riding trotting steed l., holding palma lemniscata over r. shoulder and leading second horse; in exergue, SVESANO. Sambon -, cf. 877ff., this symbol seemingly unpublished. 1'200

26 Attic stater, about 334, AV 8.59 g. Head of Hera r., hair in heavy curled locks, wearing ampyx decorated with two annulets and palmette, ear-ring with circle and bar and triple pendant, and dotted necklace; over back of head and falling to both shoulders and below truncation, filmy veil, and in field r, downwards, TAPA. Rev. The above three coins, despite apparent discrepances of style, have been here attributed to the time of Alexander of Epirus' campaigns in south Italy, and should in fact be taken together with all the Hera head gold. Leaving aside considerations of types which at Taras are always adapted to local usage, even if, say, a veiled Hera (not therefore south Italian Lacinia) must be Epirote Dione, the monetary magistrates and supervising officials of the Italiote League by their initials form a clear chain of signing authorities; some, like Θ and Σ , were already active before 334; others, like ΣA and KON continue into the next period to perhaps 315, the time of Acrotata' arrival; the majority, together with such patently Epirote-Macedonian symbols as the eight-rayed sun or the lotiform thunderbolt, are richly represented on Alexander's Tarantine silver, K, I- and I-H, $A\Pi$ (OA), Φ , AY. As to style, A and Johnston, in her classification are nonly represented on Alexander's Tarantine silver, K, Fand FH, ATT (OA), Φ, AY. As to style, Ann Johnston, in her classification of Metapontine veiled Demeters of period A, that of Alexander, has shown the wide variations that could exist in the design of the same type, from the rich, heavy "Macedonian" style to the thinner-drawn "Italiote" version, Metapontum 3, class A, 8.15 and 22, dependent only upon the skill or incliration of the die-engraver. The stater issue parallel with Vlasto 24, ΔΙΟΣΚΟΡΟΙ VI. 21, indeed comes regularly with a "heavy" Hera, sometimes with dolphins, which characterizes the allegedly earlier issues, VI. 1-4, as can be seen from McClean 1, pl. 23, 19 (with 17, almost the same obverse die, coupled with an "early" changing ephebus type, VI. 4), as well as with an intermediate Hera head, VI. 21, seen also on the unnamed Dioscuri issue, VI. 22. We believe that there were only two gold coinages at Tarentum, both struck at moments of extreme emergency and in the presence of really large armies commanded by military geniuses, Alexander and Pyrrhus, and that the first series can readily be accommodated into a scheme of perhaps, annual issues over a three-year period.

The warlike note struck by the reverse is contrasted with the calm atmosphere of the obverse which illustrates the formal relationship between adolescents of good family in which the older ex-ephebos or neos of perhaps eighteen to twenty who has completed his military education now instructs the young ephebe who, at about fifteen, has just ceased to be a child, paides. Such pairings were close in certain Greek states and in the parallel issue Hirmer 313, where the boy ties on the youth's cuirass, there is a distinct homoerotic element which reminds one of the alleged amour between Alexander of Epirus and his great kinsman Philip II of Macedon. Taras was founded from Sparta and would probally have followed Laconian traditions; "--- the general view in Sparta is that there is nothing disgraceful in these attachments, but that on the contrary such a love inspires modesty, ambition and a burning desire to excel --- ", Plutarch, Agesilaus 20. The types were revived by Pyrrhus, Vlasto 732-8.

Many of the facing goddess heads, after Sicilian models of about 405, on south Italian nomoi seem to belong to the latter part of the first half of the fourth century. Recent hoard evidence suggests that at a date of 370-360 at Croton, Pandosia, Heraclea, Metapontum and Velia a need was felt, perhaps not unconnected with Lucanian wars, or the death of Dionysius I in 367, to invoke Hera, Athena and Demeter in their protective capacity, as had been done first at Croton about 395, Gulbenkian 129, Naples with its attendant mints and Thurium and would be repeated later at Croton and Metapontum. The group of which our coin forms part seems to have started at Croton/Pandosia and was then diffused to the other mints. Detailing of design and technique are essentially the same, even if Pandosia is superb and Velia (misdated by Williams) merely good. The word Soteria, "of the saviour goddess" may be a personal name (an abbreviation perhaps of Soteriades) and the coin a liturgy, or a privately-sponsored issue paid for by a Soteria recognized on the coin, as perhaps Molossus at Thurium and Kleudoros, where associated with a facing bust, at Velia, or it may be a title of Demeter as patroness of the Mysteries; it is worth noting that she is wearing the vase-pendant necklace often favoured by Hera and by her Carthaginian alter ego, Tanit.

The issue is dated by Rutter's arrangement of Neapolitan nomoi loosely copying this class of reverse in Campanian Coinages, period III, groups 14-16 (end). The inspiration for unobtrusive signatures in tiny letters will have come from Syracuse in the latter part of the first phase of Dionysius I's tyranny, perhaps a little before 400, when the typically expansive artists' signatures which had appeared on the coins of the democracy very freely from about 420 were replaced by more modest, almost concealed, inscription. The little we know about Thurium in the classical period suggests that it was a turbulent democracy where, if such things as die-engravers' signatures had appeared at all, they would have been flaunted. As with the Molossos coin, no. 74 below, it is probably safer to look signatures had appeared at air, they would have been haunted. As with the Mioossos coin, no. 74 below, it is probably safer to look elsewhere for likely reasons for an unusual and un-Italiote practice on a coin of normal appearance, and it is therefore worth noting that at a time when Thurian kneeling bulls were commonly shown with heads turning to the observer, Molossos' usual reverse die shows once more this full-profile animal. It is perhaps a question of bronze statuary, like the surviving ram at Palermo or the ominous group of wolf and bull seen in the agora of Argos by Pyrrhus on his deathday, Plutarch, Pyr. 32-33. Statue-bases shown on Greek coins are, as in the obvious case of the archaic nomoi of Caulonia, represented by dotted lines with or without sills, and in this category our bull should fall. Philistion, who as ΦΙΛΙΣ or ΦΙΛΙΣΤΙ, VI. 570-4, Jenkins, AGC, 444 is found signing on gold and silver at Taras from the very beginning of the Epirote Alexandrine coinage, and as ΦΙ throughout until and beyond Alexander's death, must be seen as a great functionary of the Italiote league and therefore a minister of Alexander who would have been present when, presumably at Velia, cf. Livy 8. 17, Livy made his treaty with Rome. The presence of a Lucanian sword in the lion's mouth, revived on an as of c. 270, TV 45, illustrates the common interests of Alexander and the Romans. The die-engraver, responsible, with his associates, for almost all the finest coins at Taras, for which see nos.26-33 above, and many at Metapontum, Heracleia etc., is conceivably Lyssipus. The features of Athena, with "Venus circles" on the neck, are modelled on those of the post-338 Hellenic League Corinthian staters of Philip II of Macedon which provided flans for some regal Tarentine issues. Iconic references throughout the coin evoke contemporary series of the Italiote League, especially at Metapontum and Taras, and the fabric is thoroughly Tarentine. The signature in full is either a compliment to the eponymous statesman, or a recognition of his (or rather the league's) having subsidised the issue, which is dated by Williams to 303-302 and associated with Cleonymus (sic).

The obverse and reverse types are linked as an emblem of happy marrage, in this sense no doubt also alliance as between the two sea-powers great Carthage and the lesser Brettioi; Poseidon and Amphitrite are themselves an ideal divine pair, like the couples shown with them on a Attic bowl of about 425, LIMC 1, 1, p. 728, 52, Zeus-Hera, Dionysus-Ariadne, Ares-Aphrodite, Hades-Persephone, and like Dionysus and Ariadne have a triumphant thiasos, with erotes, naiads and tritons, and are borne in a car drawn by hippocamps, LIMC 1, 2, pp. 588f, 69 and 73, Roman mosaics from the late Republic and late Empire. The symbols in this issue are all indicative of loyalty, wealth and abundance.

The bronze coinage of the Bruttians, ferocious and hated enemies of the Romans, was under the distressing obligation of following the pattern established by the dominant loacal power. The silver, sharing in the general reduction of Hannibalic weight standards in the south, appears to have lowered further the Tarentine reduced-nomos weight, for which see nos. 38-40 above, until, sliding from a standard almost compatable with that of the quadrigatus, it fell to only about 5% above what the Romans in their typical way were shortly to sieze as the foundation of their all-conquering denarius, the Attic drachm. The gold is conventional in weight, though adventurous in typology. Silver and bronze types are partly Italic, and therefore effectively Roman, or Graeco-Bruttian and drawing from the conventional store of images available.

The appearance of birds and beasts as symbols on generally late incuse nomoi is not easily explained. They tend to reflect the esturine characters of the issuing cities: crabs, dolphins and herons, as here, at croton; sea-shells and sea-serpents at Taras and Poseidonia. Metapontum, looking both ways, has grasshoppers and lizards as well as dolphins. There is an early grasshopper at Ami... . No unifying sacral characteristic emerges; they are then, perhaps, by way of trade, emblems and talismans of commercial prosperity. All examples cited are taken from Gorini's pretty book.

Agathocles of Syracuse was involved, perhaps during the 290's but conceivably a decade before, in Bruttium in a poorly recorded campaign in which he captured Hipponium and Croton. Rhegium, as an ancient enemy of Syracuse, which had burnt Rhegium nearly two centuries before, should have been in some way involved. Our coin seems closely related to certain issues from Syracuse and Punic Sicily and moreover depicts the solar deity Apollo and a lion, which though immemorially the badges of the city, seem singularly appropriate to the typology favoured by the tyrants of the new, hellenistic, world. These splendid dies could well have been engraved by the master who cut the best dies of the Agathocles Kore coinage and perhaps also those of the vastly rare Ptolemaictype gold stater of the same ruler, AMB 511.

This enormously influential Persephone head, concieved and developed by Euainetos as a modest adaption of Arethusa so as not to shock convention, and copied prodigiously in the fourth century, especially on the Agathoclean and Siculo-Punic coinages, should perhaps be associated with the politics of Dionysius I. Three types of Persephone heads, Tudeer 46, 47 and 66, had appeared for the first time, experimentally, at a period when only Athena, once, was able to dislodge Arethusa from the coinage, Tudeer 58. After seven years of preparation, a second war against Carthage was initiated in 397 and ultimately successfully concluded in 392/390, leaving Dionysius master of most of the island, "archon of Sicily". The mass employment of Persephone coins - and decadrachms of Euainetos type were certainly coined in large quantities - would serve to identify the goddess, who is, of course, the Punic Tanit, with the Syracusan cause and remove her power from the enemy, of whom she was the principal divinity. If the parallels will hold, it should be noted that in 396 the Romans practised evocatio and "called out" Juno Regina from Veii, which then fell to their arms, Livy 5, 21 ff. and above all, should the Servian gloss on Aeneid 12. 841 be reliable, "evoked" "Juno", that is, Tanit again as Juno Caelestis, from Carthage in the fateful year 146.

Jenkins in his penetrating study inclines towards seeing in the so-called Didd obverses of this coin and others (270, 271, 272) forms of Tanit-Artemis which, given the many-sided and ambiguous nature of the divinity in question, must be at least partly true, especially in the case of the chaste and undecorated head on his no. 270, but fails to observe that the band she wears on our coin corresponds closely to that worn by Hera Lacinia on the well-known series of facing head nomi from southern Italy which, as adumbrated by Burnett in SRN 56, 1977, particularly pp. 108, 109 and 115, and following the ample inidcations given by post-war hoard evidence to date, must be brought down to 340-330 or later (Taras period IV, Velia V), a time at which hostile movements among non-Greek populations followed by the campaigns of Alexander of Epirus stimulated the moneyers of Magna Graecia to frenetic activity, and perhaps little more than a decade before the wars of Agathocles and Hamilcar son of Giscon did the same for The Syracusan and Carthaginian mints.

The goddess pictured would be, then, Tanit-Hera, with warlike attributes, wearing the tiara favoured by Graeco-Persian war-gods, warriors and rulers, accompanied by her victorious lion which elsewhere she rides as Mater Deum (for which see especially the Roman third-century imperial cults of Iuno Caelestis, Venus Caelestis and Cybele, all aspects of the same divinity). The Carthaginian Tanit in her earliest form as the Ishtar of the Gilgamesh cycle, at once hysterical slut (Aphrodite) and potent Queen of Heaven as daughter-consort of the sun-god Shamash, whose animal is, as on the coinage of Caracalla, the solar lion, cannot be said to have changed at all, following the conservative icons of eastern religion. For the Greeks the nearest approximation might have been Artemis-Hera, or even Athena-Hera, though Pausanias 3.13.9. refers to an ancient statue in Sparta called Hera-Aphrodite. Agathocles' wars and endless intrigues seem to have produced a renaissance of high-quality numismatic propaganda, for which see our nos. 105 (Rhegium), where long-haired, rather manneristically-handled divinities became suddenly fashionable. A comparison with the companion"Dido" tetradrachm, Jenkins 272, on which Tanit seems to wear a murex or sea-shell tiara suitable for the Astarte of Tyre from which Carthage was founded, suggests that the latter might indicate victory at sea, while our coin would refer to war on land.

Zograph's view, op. cit., is that it was made to circulate with Cyzicene electrum staters of equal value. The two opinions are not mutually exclusive. This previously unknown coin raises a number of interesting problems which can be resolved only by a close analysis: (1) The obverse amphora is of a sort very close to that of Terone, Asyut 223, but differs markedly in the form of the shoulders and resembles in that respect, as in all others, nothing so much as an early and simple form of the vessel shown on the fourth-century trihemiobol of Thasos, Le Rider in Guide de Thasos, 26, with which it shares very similar types (2) The serpents which accompany the amphora are evidently the good genii known as agathodaimons and have particular connection with fertility of crops and growth of vines, so being closely linked with the cult of Dionysos; there is a marble relief in the Graeco-Roman Museum of Alexandria which shows Agathodaimon and Isis-Thermouthis, in the shape of a cobra, encircling an oinochoe, LIMC 1, 2 pl. 205, 15 (3) The reverse has ample affiliations, up to a certain point, with late sixth century Attic wares which depict a kneeling Silenus offering grapes, an oenochoe or, as here, a cantharus to a seated Dionysos, LIMC 3, 2 pls. 333, no. 326 and 347, nos. 419 (Silenus shown also running) and 417, but differs in two important respects, since the running figure, having no obligatory horse's tail, is evidently not a seilen, and moreover is carrying a cantharus of a non-Attic type, that is to say, constructed in three sections rather than two in the body, and having almost no, as opposed to a long, stem to the foot. Parallels to the first are hard to find and uncertain, but in the subjects of the symposium or thiasus of Dionysus the god is sometimes accompanied by a young man who is now clearly a satyr or boy-silen, LIMC 3, 2 pl.363, 560 (late fifth-century crater) and now something less than a fellow divinity but more than a wood-spirit, LIMC 3, pl.339, 370 (pediment relief of about 500 from the temple of Dionysus in Corcyra), a naked olive(?)-crowned youth with a cylix reclining beside Dionysus; compare also SNG ANS 7,1, 1009-10 (= Svoronos, L'Hellenisme primitif, pl.17, 6-10, "Pierioi"), a stater with a winged naked daimon running-kneeling r., from, according to Kraay in ACGC pp. 133ff., one of the first issues of Acanthus. For the second, a Thracian context shows the cantharus to be a normal sort for the time and region, sometimes evolving, as at Maroneia, A.B. West in ANS NNM 40, pl.7, la-12, to an "Attic" shape, sometimes not; Naxos, Asyut 600-1, is a foreign example, as is the third-century tetradrachm of Heracleia Bithyniae SNG von Aulock 366-7, while the Silenus gate at Thasos has a 2m. tall stone relief of the daimon, dated to the late sixth century, actually bearing a cantharus of precisely the type seen on the coin, Guide de Thasos fig. 23.

The coin is to be attributed to the island of Peparethos on the grounds of fabric, weight and shallow reverse incuse, but Peparethos, as Balcer has shown in SNR 46, 1967, pp. 25-32, has several fabrics, cf. 2 and 6, two weight standards in tetradrachms, 1-7 Attic, as Balcer has shown in SNR 46, 1967, pp. 25-32, has several tabrics, cf. 2 and 6, two weight standards in tetradrachins, 1-7 Atic, 8 "Milesian", is die-linked except for the anomalous 6 and 7, linked only with each other, and 8, which appears to be later, is on another weight standard, and is alone in bearing an ethnic. Attibuation is to be given Peparethos also on the grounds of a general resemblance to the reverse types within square reservation of Balcer, ("Agon") and 8 (Staphylos). Staphylos, the son of Dionysus and Ariadne, was the *oekistes* of Peparethos and as such is identified as the reverse type of Balcer 8. He is otherwise shown with abselute security only as an infant with his parents on Attic vases, LIMC 7, 2, pp. 257 f. Other attributions doubtful, including LIMC 7, 1, p. 808, 9 (as a Thracian divinity worshipped at Thasos, bit it is not impossible that he is the reverse type of our coin. Price and Waggoner in Asyut p. 49, 232 incline to an attribution of all coins of "Peparethus" except Balcer 8 to the wine-producing area of Macedonia.

Athenian material recently on the market confirms the picture presented by the Decadrachm Hoard: a rapid evolution from Starr Groups II to V demonstrate by the relative states of wear of the coins with Group II being generally about extremely fine (including the two classes of decadrachms) and state characterising Group V, clearly demonstrating that the period elapsed between the former and the latter cannot be more than five years and may be much less. The historical points d'appui are the battle of the Eurymedon river, about 467, where the Persian booty (with attested distribution of a sort, Plutarch, Cimon 13. 6-8) is known to have been enormous, and the capture of Thasos and its mines in 463/2, Plutarch, op. cit.14. 2, when the plunder may be supposed very substantial. The dole of ten drachmae per citizen certified for 483 (by its refusal, Herodotus 7. 144, Plutarch, Themistocles 4) may see its later reflection, pace Seltman and Wallace, in the actual decadrachms and didrachms turned up in the last decade.

It may be, if Kagan's belief that the non-Lycian elements in the Decadrachm Hoard terminate in 465/2 is correct, that the common sort of Athenian silver money derived, at least initially, from the Thracian mines of Thasos and began in 462.

The origin of the name of Clazomenae and the function of the swan as Apollo's mount are dealt with in the Kunstfreund note. The obverse is of the type of Apollo del Belvedere, LIMC 2, 1, 79 p. 198, a Roman copy of a Greek bronze statue of about 330 (or earlier) which is attributed by F. Winter to the hand of Leochares ("young and good", letter of Plato after 366, Ep. 13. 361 a) and would be that located by Pausanias, 1. 3. 3., in the temple of Apollo Patroos at Athens. An ambitous city like Thurium could hardly be left behind in the new fashion for bronze coins sweeping Magna Graecia. The magistrate Damon seems to have been changed with the task of producing the new coinage, for which, first of all, the heaviest denomination was a pentabol, the bronze equivalent of 5/6 of an Attic silver drachm and weighing about 40 g. Extremely rare today and unusually found unworn, its awkward tariffing would have made it a failure. Quite the contrary is true of the next denomination down, the tetrobol of about 32g., which almost immediately became the new head of the system and was struck in several issues and in considerable numbers together with a wide range of divisionary pieces. The pentobal had been given a new standing bull reverse type, as on the celebrated silver dinomos significantly signed Δ , Noe D z and SNG ANS 959, but all others denominations combined the normal Athena obverse with a conventional bull with lowered head. Our lead weight, once more authorized by $\Delta A(\mu\omega\nu)$, at almost 33 g. gives the standard of the new heaviest bronze, the tetrobol, with the reverse type repeated to avoid ambignity.

The high artistic standard and detailed workmanship shown in this issue points to a date in the early part of the second century, presumably that of the refoundation of the city as Copia. The gentle replacement of the Thurian Apollo/Artemis series with new Roman denominations in the reduced form familiar to the local population would have been a sensible political. Such a programme may also have been employed at Panormus where reduced republican asses were were substituted for greek style coinage with retention of the weight standard of about 8 g., obols becoming asses. Caruso's excellent work publishes only 110 coins of Copia, from 17 different issues, in public collections, a remarkably low survival rate.

Bruttium

The Bruttii

The coinage of the Bruttii is particularly impressive in its complexity and has been thoroughly studied in modern times by F. Scheu in: The earliest coins of the Bruttians, NC 1955, pp. 101-112, and The silver and gold coins of the Bruttians, NC 1961, pp. 51-66. These excellent studies followed the traditional dating of the material to the First Punic War period (264-241). It was H. Pfeiler in Die Münzprägung der Brettier, JNG 16, 1964, pp. 7-50, who correctly attributed the series to the Second Punic War (218-201) when the Bruttii went over to Hannibal in the hope of regaining their independence and the half of the Sila Forest which had been seized by Rome for their support of Pyrrhus. Finally, E. Arslan in Monetazione aurea ed argentea dei Bruttii, Glaux 4, 1989, produced a die study of the gold and silver series which confirmed the Second Punic War as the period of issue, attributing most to the mints of Croton and Locri. The bronze series is a fascinating example of a military coinage compatable both with the triental bronze reduction money introduced by Rome in about 215 and the double-litra and litra bronze coinage of Syracuse under Hieron II, SNG ANS 909-963 (dilitrae) and 964-977 (litrae). The Bruttians supported Hannibal after the devastating defeat of Rome at Cannae in 216 and by 213 were themselves defeated by Rome and as a political force entirely ceased to exist. An oddity of the Bruttian coinage is the regular occurence in minute lettering of Γ , K and Π in the field of many dies in silver and bronze is discussed at length by Scheu, NC 1962 pp. 46-50 and Arslan, Glaux 4, p. 83.

The fabric and the sheer technical competence of the above two coins suggest a mint, most probably Metapontum, striking on behalf of the evidently small settlement signing itself *Breig*; the typology (river, stag, plough, dolphin) indicates a classic northern Calabrian up-river port with a low mountain range behind and an agricultural *chora* around, for which confirmation is provided by the rivergod's name (Traes, now Trionto) and by the find-spots. Consideration of occasion for striking brings us again to Metapontum, where the last (?) issue in silver for Alexander the Molossian, Johnston Class B 4, with accompanying bronze, Johnston, Essays Kraay-Mørkholm pl. 36, 25, both with symbol thunderbolt, provides a reverse schema very similar to that of our hemiobol, and is moreover preceded and followed by issues of similar type with, where our dolphin is, symbols mouse, Johnston Class A 8.10, and plough, Class CI, with additional mouse dichalkon, K-M 28. Furthermore, both late Molossian silver and immediate post-war issues bear magistrates' names on the obverse, as here, Johnston Classes B. 4 and C I, while Class A 7-8 is signed by the (Italiote League?) official ΦI or Φ, frequently represented also at Taras in the Molossian period. Together with ΦI often appears K or KAA, Vlasto 538-541, who may be the magistrate represented on the obverses of the *Breig* bronzes by K-A, an inscription not otherwise explicable where, with differing types, an ethnic and a second monogram BA are already present. The latter monogram is not inconceivably, appearing as it does on Alexander III "Poros" 5-and 2-shekels, M. Price, Alexander pl. 159, G-J, of after 324, to be interpreted as an early use of the title *Basileus*, and indeed it was near Pandosia, no more than about twenty miles from the alleged site of the issuing city of our bronzes, that the Molossian was assassinated in late winter 331.

Pace Crawford, but mostly following Morel, MEFR 1962, this huge military coinage (c. 300 pairs of dies) must reflect the Roman carrot- and -stick policy towards the Italian allies in revolt. Apart from the pun on the moneyer's name, which the Romans would have taken seriously, see Varro and Aulus Gellius passim, the reference is to reconciliation with Italians, Tatius and Romulus ruling jointly, and to their punishment and exploition if they remained intractable (raptus Sabinarum). The other two issues of the same moneyer combined with the same obverse, Cr. 344/2-3, illustrate the killing of Tarpeia (treachery summarily revenged) and Victory in biga, the last linking with the enormous earlier issues of M. Porcius Cato (c. 120 pairs of dies for denarii, over 400 for quinarii) with reverse of Victory, and for the quinarii, with an obverse of Liber with, as Crawford suggests, association of the Porcii Catones with the leges de provoctatione which were certainly a sop to Italian feelings.

Corduba seems an unlikely mint if, even with an obverse die link to Cr. 470, it produced the abominable denarii of Sextus Pompey after Munda, Cr. 477. Given the carefully differentiated tycheis displayed on Gnaeus coinage, it should be possible to find a pentapolis in "Baetica" or Carthaginiensis whose divine patronesses might conform to the detailed iconography. No. 605, for instance, shows what is apparently a port-city receiving Gnaeus' flagship amid the detritus of a battlefield (Carthago Nova?) *Pace* Buttrey, p. 91, "the type was hardly meant to be photographic in its realism", the converse is true on coins where the smallest recognizable elements that mark out Gnaeus as a Roman general are clearly realised.

The best arrangement by far of Caesar's lifetime ans early porthumous. Portrait coinage, with which the above denarius is to be counted, is by Kraay in NC 1954 refurting Alföldis extravagancier in Studien über Caesars Monarchie, 1953. Crawford has merely made it incoherent. The reverse type has, on the basis of a few superficial resemblances and a wholly suppositive belief that the moneyer was a Sullanus by descent or been called "Sulla's dream" when, on the contrary, it can be shown that at least one element of the type, Luna, is precisely the circensian type of the name of the Acisculus denarius Cr. 474/5, with her whip held as by Victory on the similar reverse type of Carisius, Cr. 464/5. The present cataloguer is inclined to bring together portrait and non-portrait moneyers in such a way that Mettius, whose Juno denarius must be dated to around the feriae of Sospita, 1st February 44, a date accordant with Caesar's titulature, has a first coinage parallel with the early part of Acirculus' and, later, Buca's and Macer's; his second coinage ends before Caesar's death, so that it is into the coinage of Acisculus, with bearded Apollo in mouning, Macer and Buca that the disaster falls, while, Macer continuing into the posthumous Parens Patriae issue, Maridianus replaces Acisculus and Buca sometime in late March April, just before the abolition of the dictatorship.

An earlier age identified this portrait with Fulvia's as adumbrated in simplified form on Antonius' Lugdunum quinarius of 43-2, Cr. 489, and, repeated exactly on the Vaala aureus, Cr. 514/1, of 41. The ancient use of the word litra, a Greek term for a Sicilian bronze unit, in the the context of a purely Romano-Etruscan coinage without any contemporary parallel in Italy, seems unlikely and certainly not contemporary usage. It may be better to describe this interesting military issue in Roman weight terms and monetary units with their customary nomenclature. From c. 270-240 the weight standard of the Roman as fluctuated around 270 g. (10 unciae) indicating \pm 6.75 g. as the theoretical weight of the quartuncia, comfortably accommodating the Rome and Cosa bronzes which range between 5 and 8 g. and a 1/16 uncia Roma/dog bronze with an average weight of 1.65 g.

The anomalous series Cr. 39/1-4 to which this ambitious triens belongs must by its post-semilibral (triental) weight standard belong to the early years of the Second Punic War. The types, indeed, seem to fix it quite closely to the period immediately after Cannae, 216, when the Romans under Fabius began slowly to recover from the crushing defeats inflicted upon them by Hannibal. It is perhaps proper to exclude from the group the so-called semuncia, Cr. 39/5, as its types evidently show the bust of Cybele associated with a rider in the Megalensian Games, commemmerative events of the highest magnitude recorded under the year 204 by Livy · 29 · 14; it is perhaps a medalet, analogous to the sporadically appearing commemorative are recorded by Crawford as 82/1 (Ceres/Cerynaean stag captured by Hercules, 97/11 (Apollo/Dioscuri) and 97/23 (Proserpina [not Ceres, pace Crawford] /Victory in biga), the later long series perhaps alluding to victories at Nola, 215, and Locri, 205, Livy 23, 44-6 and 29, 7-8.

A. Triens No. 643: on at least one occasion during the war, Rome performed an evocatio (or exoratio) on Carthage, Servius, Comm. on Aeneid 12.841, calling out the goddess Tanit (Latine Iuno) from her overseas stronghold to support instead Roman arms; the coin is in weight affiliated to the heavy aes current at Carthage, copying also the obverse type, turning it from left to right and adding a dolphin and rudder (?) to signify a transpontine emigration; the former attribute is repeated on Etruscan "triumphal" bronze of slightly later date, Vecchi 4, 25/2. The reverse symbolizes the triumph of civilization over barbarism, Ovid, Met. 12. B. Quadrans (no.644): Herculcan efforts are recognized on the part of Italian allies whose badges were the boar (here punning on the Erymanthian beast) and the bull, shown trampling the Tryphonian serpent of Hannibalic perfidy. This anomalous piece, found in Rome, would be attributable by Augustus' "Lysippan" hairstyle and early portrait to 27, were it not die-linked to the MARTIS VLTORIS aureus, RIC 28, which cannot antedate 20. Galbae imperatoris Aug", and where occasion permits identification, MARS VICTOR, PIETAS AVGVSTI, HONOS ET VIRTVS, VICTORIA IMPERI ROMANI for example, the original models seem to have been located in Regio VIII, from the Capitolium to the Forum Iulii, Hill, Monuments p. 112. Galba entered into his second consulship on 1st January 69, and a set of reverses evoking his career and achievements would have seemed appropriate at this time, given his advanced age of seventy-two; this date appears to be confirmed by the appearance of aes in this series celebrating Aesculapius and his daughter Salus (Hygeia), above all the sestertius with an Apolline Aesculapius type, ACG 373 and LIMC 2,1 pp. 869f., 9-19. Aesculapius dies ferialis, was 1st January, vota publica, and Ovid, Fasti 1, 289ff. implies a close association between Jupiter and his medical grandson. This spectacular coin is perhaps, as J.P.C. Kent supposed, a record of part of a public show, not improbably linked to a display or reconstruction of a well-known hellenistic painting at the games in the amphitheatre given in 206, Hill 805, 8, 11, 16 and 21, to be associated with the unique Caracalla head right aureus depicting Hercules feasting with Pinarius and Potitius, Hurter op. cit., which appears to have preceded our coin by a short interval, the unusual presentation of Geta facing left suggesting a backward look to the

previous year. The rarity of these two types implies donativa, perhaps the Caracalla for the Saturnalia, appropriately for subject and die-linked as it is with the January (?) of 207 Aesculapius aureus and the Geta for the vota publica festivities of the early part of the same month. The feriae of Hercules, significantly, ad Circum Maximum, and Bacchus (Tiber), the Liberalia (Naevius in Festus, "Libera lingua loquimur ludis liberalibus"), at 12th August and 17th March respectively, should not however be forgotten, although it is conceivable, though unrecorded, that Severus had established a separate feast-day for his dii auspices, and patrons of his sons, from Leptis Magna at the same time as erecting a temple for them, Dio. 77.16.3, the former possibly on 22nd December, Macrobinus 3.11.10. The reverse type is an odd miscellany drawn from the rich vocabulary of Bacchic imagery and the findings of Ariadne, and combines diverse elements from such subjects as the *Thiasos*, or rout, the finding of Ariadne and the conquest of India, for which see LIMC 3, 2, pls 446-453, where every detail can somewhere be found; of particular interest are the Augustian came opl. 448, 200, showing an archaic herm, and the relief fragment, pl. 449, 209, representing the "boat" (for the isle of Naxos?). We know from contorniates how the Rome mint cherished original models, so that "revivals" were always possible. Catullus' Carmen 64 is too general a description of bacchanalia to have served as the inspiration.

The odd trophy carried by Victory cannot be identified with certainty.

Of the five argentei with *Moneta* listed by Shiel, all confined, as is natural to such a type, to the unmarked first denarial issue which precedes the RSR coinage, none has AVGG for AVG, and indeed the termination seems restricted to this coin, the *Adventus Augg /RSR* piece Sh. pl. F, 9, RIC 541 and the irregular (?) Sh. p. 125, 36, RIC 1074. As RIC 541 and our coin are both notable, one for type (emperor charging on horseback) and the other for style, and undoubtedly official, error cannot be assumed, but so little is known of this early period that, while the Auggg coinage of 292-3 seems to refer to a genuine treaty for which die engravers may have been sent from Treveri to London, no conclusions concerning a double termination (for Carausius and Diocletian?) can as yet be drawn.

The equestrian figure, both Constantius and all the tetrarchs in one, would normally ride above a defeated enemy, as no. 937 above, but in this case surmounts a warship which, ambiguously enough, resembles a (dismasted) quinarius reverse of Allectus, say RIC pl. 19, 10 (his other deep-draughted galley, RIC pl. 19, 16, being copied by the aureus B. and M. 230), while at the same time it is clearly derived from the *Abundantia* imperial flagship on the reverse of the X.ET.I billon of Carinus, Bastien, Lyon 2, 443 - 4, which inspired the Carausian nummi argentei with *Felicitas* legend, RIC pl. 16, 4, by way of the Rotomagus billon RIC pl. 18, 7, the whole programme of maritime propaganda having begun with Postumus, RIC 26, 73, 143. This exceptional class of divisionary are seems to precede, and to have been a failed model for, the successful copper 3 g. radiates from several mints including Cyzicus, RIC 15 - 19. If the obtrusive exergual pellet can be assimilated to the number $1000, \infty$ or Φ (M not being a figure, but an abbreviation of mille), it will represent a thousand to the aureus, already prefigured on Allectus' 294 aurei with reverse symbols D and •, for five hundred billon units and a thousand quinarii respectively, cf. RIC 14. Copper at double the weight of very base, 2 - 4%, billon might have worked to absorb redundant "antoniniani" from the reformed "follis" (= 3 - 4 worn Aureliani by metallic content) system, but this first issue may have been insufficiently profitable for the authorities. Made as a tentative issue, presumably in the presence of Diocletian who seems to have been between Illyricum and Syria at this time (see no. 937 above) at an easy notional ratio of, say, gold to silver to bronze of 1:10:1000, it will have been susceptible to market forces without respect for governmental systems. Temporarily under-rather than over-valued, it will have been replaced almost immediately by the unmarked 3g. radiate (at 800 to the aureus), RIC p. 99, of the same types but, wisely, without mark of value, the real denarius communis of the Maximal Edict which was to be hopelessly devalued by the inexorable rise in the worth of precious metals which caused practically a cessation of gold and silver issues from 299 to 303 and must have been a principal cause of the appearance of the Edict in 301. The mixed notation on Nicomedian aurei, RIC 44 - 7, states the official relative values of coins in late 308 where N-K V-L XC should signify, (this aureus is worth) 20 n (ummi argentei) and 90 (pieces containing notionally) 5 [(ibellae, i.e., units = denarii communes), "folles", suggesting that the state was endeavouring to impose a copper (and, by implication, a base billon) coinage at between three and four times its worth on the market.

The mystical significance of the labarum, a talisman of praeternatural importance to Constantine since it had accompanied him to victory over Maxentius, is discussed by P. Bruun in RIC p. 567 and in Arctos, N. S. 3, pp. 5 - 35. In type it was a normal vexillum but ornamented with medallions of the emperor and two (varying) sons and above all with the Christogram, "Hoc signo victor eris", and heavily encrusted with jewels and gold. What Constantine saw in his vision before the battle at the Milvian bridge was translated as the Chi-Rho, and carried before him afterwards as the badge of an irresistible military standard. Eusebius describes its miraculous ability to protect its bearer, and how Licinius himself was in fear of it; "he had warned his soldiers never to direct their attack at this standard, or even incautiously to look at it, for he believed it had a terrible power, and was especially hostile towards himself", De vita Constantini 1, 31, 2, 16. It is of course Licinius himself, in the familiar rôle of the serpent rebel against divinelyappointed authority, who is shown spiked on this reverse which, with others, commemorates the first quinquennium of the battle of Chrysopolis, September 18th 323, at which the pagan east fell.
