He cannot claim to have acted on behalf of a third party.
- 2. Absentee bidders can bid up to 24 hours before the start of the auction by writing, telephone or electronically. Telephone bidders must agree that calls may be recorded. The auction house does not accept liability for bidding mandates made by telephone, electronically or in writing.

Foreword to the E.E. Clain Stefanelli Collection

In 1956 Vladimir and Elvira received an invitation to become Curators of the National Numismatic Collection at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. They developed one of the most extensive and important collections in the world. When the Smithsonian opened their new building in 1961 called The National Museum of American History, the Stefanelli's secured a large area to become The National Numismatic Collection. The collection contained 60,000 coins, and upon the death of Dr Stefanelli in 1982, it had grown to more than 900,000 pieces. Due to the endless efforts of Dr & Mrs Stefanelli, they received donations from the Dupont Collection of the Mihailovich Russian Collection (one of the most complete in the world), the Norwebs, Paul Straub, Zabriski, Neiken and the Stack Family. Probably the most notable collection they were able to solicit was the Josiah K. Lily Collection of 6'200 gold coins, a complete set of U.S. gold coins including Pioneer and Territorial Collections.

The Clain-Stefanelli's also lectured and wrote many books about the National Collection, as well as creating instructive and illuminating displays. The highlight exhibit was displayed in 1975, "The Bicentennial History of American Banking", which became a major landmark learning exhibit for bankers here and abroad.

After Dr Stefanelli passed away, Elvira took the reigns and she completed the computerized inventory of the collection her husband had begun. She continued to write and publish a Numismatic bibliography. She also became the Executive Director of the Numismatic Collection and served until her retirement.

They both had a great passion for collecting and assembling coins of the Roman Republic and Southern Europe, especially Italy and Austria-Germany. Their work for the advancement of Numismatics and its studies, their writings, lectures and exhibits will long be remembered as a major milestone on the development and interest in Numismatics.

Sheikh Saoud Al Thani

My first experience with Sheikh Saoud Al Thani was by no means pleasant: one afternoon in November 2011 one of my assistants put through a call from a man telling me rather impatiently that he wanted to buy Roman gold multiples of at least 4 aurei and asking me if I had any in stock. I began to explain to him almost irritatedly that these types of medallions were not easy to come across and that his request was rather unusual, when Claire passed me a piece of paper on which she had written "Al Thani".

I wanted to start my preface with this anecdote because the common misconception that most coin collectors (who never had the chance to meet him) have of Sheikh Saoud is that he was an arrogant and superficial collector who completely monopolised the Greek coin market for at least a couple of years, purchasing, especially at the beginning, almost every important Greek coin offered on the market without a care for the price.

The reality is very different. Sheikh Saoud was not an arrogant person at all, on the contrary, he had a natural gentleness and kindness about him that instantly won over people when they met him as they never imagined that he could have been such a pleasant and simple person. Even better, he was so charming that very often collectors who had no intention of selling were so overwhelmed and fascinated by his politeness, gentleness and passion that they decided to sell him their collection. What I, myself, at first had interpreted as arrogance, was in reality a genuine passion which led him to throw himself into a new collecting adventure with incredible enthusiasm and the ambition to build the best collection in the world.

Sheikh Saoud deeply adored coins, especially Greek coins; after all, he always remarked that the art forms that gave him most joy were the ones he could hold in the palm of his hand. From a very young age he concentrated on collecting Islamic coins of the Umayyad dynasty, which he had first studied, visiting the world's most important museums, and then began to collect. His first encounter with Greek coins occurred in 1985, when at the age of nineteen, he went to Zurich to attend a Bank Leu auction of Islamic coins. Whilst Sheikh Saoud was viewing the Islamic coins before the sale, Leo Mildenberg, with his unparalleled charm, showed the Sheikh a stupendous coin of Gortyna and Sheikh Saoud fell in love with the coin immediately.

Nevertheless, his passion remained dormant within the Sheikh for almost fifteen years. During this time he was not only the man behind the creation and acquisitions of Doha's astonishing Museum of Islamic Arts, but he also purchased the most important art works offered on the market both for his country (in his role as Culture Minister) and for himself (such as: 136 photographs by Man Ray and Alfred Stieglitz and the Jenkins Venus).

His passions in the world of art were diverse and wide-reaching (collecting among other things: Egyptian archaeology, Roman glasses, photography, Leica cameras, tribal art, Chinese art, Japanese art, beads, vintage cars, fine watches, Indian art, precious stones, jewels and Russian art) and his interest in each of these areas was cultivated with the same passion and enthusiasm. Each and every time he embarked on a new field, Sheikh Saoud would visit the most important museums and would ask his advisors to show him the books and catalogues of the great collections of the past and then introduce him to contemporary collectors. This therefore allowed him to develop, very quickly, thanks to his incredible photographic memory and extraordinary sensibility, a level of understanding and appreciation that another person would need years and years of study to acquire.

Numismatics was no different and when Sheikh Saoud chose me as his advisor, he began to

ask me about the most important museums to visit, and enquired about the greatest collections of the past and current collectors. His enthusiasm was boundless and almost every week he asked me to join him in different places either visiting a museum together, attending auction viewings or introducing him to other collectors. My role as advisor was limited to confirming the authenticity of coins and pointing out any important or rare pieces that he may have overlooked. As far as prices were concerned, I always tried to advise him, but when he fell in love with something it was impossible to stop him...

Sheikh Saoud was an extremely sensitive and thoughtful man and above all, he was honest. Everyone knows the vicissitudes that coloured his acquisition of coins from the Prospero Collection and the legal dispute that ensued before his payment of the coins, and yet Ian Goldbart (then Managing Director of Baldwin's), recently told me that despite being forced to take legal action to recover the payment, he had great respect for Sheikh Saoud because he never lied to him.

Of course his passion sometimes led him to do things that a person would not normally do, but for him nothing was stronger than his passion for art and eventually at the end of the day before his death, he never left any bill unpaid.

I, personally, will never forget his compassion during my father's illness and the great respect he always treated me with, but that was Sheikh Saoud's nature. The problems of the people close to him became his problems and he treated the people whom he considered loyal to him, with the greatest respect and friendship.

Almost all of Sheikh Saoud's coins offered in this catalogue are Roman Republican, a field to which he was relatively new. We are sure that he would have explored it with his usual fervour and interest had it not been for his untimely death in November 2014, which prevented him from finalising the payment of them.

Hatria (now Atri in the Abruzzo region of Central Italy), a town of Picenum in eastern Italy, was situated close to the Adriatic Sea between the rivers Vomanus and Matrinus (modern Vomano and La Piomba). The town of Matrinum located at the mouth of the latter river served as its principal port. Although Hatria's origins are obscure, it was perhaps originally an Etruscan colony, first settled by colonists from Atria in Padanian Etruria. During Rome's steady rise to dominance over central Italy during the 4th and 3rd centuries B.C., the town came under its sway, becoming a Latin colony shortly after 290 B.C. The city flourished under Rome's patronage and later, after the roads were built, served as the junction of the Vias Salaria and Valeria. The city was attacked by Hannibal in 217 B.C., and eight years later in 209 B.C. it was one of the eighteen Latin colonies that stayed loyal to Rome during the Second Punic War, providing support to its ally in the form of both material aid and soldiers. During imperial times, during the reign of the emperor Hadrian who himself was from Spain but whose family hailed from the region of Hatria, the city received the title Colonia Aelia Hadria.

Hatria's small and rare coinage must be considered in light of the developments of coinage at Rome. At Rome and in central Italy, while bronze was plentiful, both silver and gold were extremely scarce, with the latter being practically non-existent. Commerce therefore, when not in kind, was facilitated by the use of bronze ingots. Initially these came in the form of lumps, called by numismatists ase rude, sometimes found inscribed or counterstamped, and later formed into figural quadrilateral bars and other recognizable shapes, often erroneously referred to by numismatists as ase signatum. Around 280 BC or perhaps a little later, lead-rich ingots formed into the shape of quadrilateral bars similar to the earlier figural bars and occasionally bearing the legend ROMANOM "of the Roman" appear. These probably served as war booty during the Pyrrhic and First Punic Wars (275-241 B.C.). Concurrent with these currency bars was the introduction at Rome of the first cast round coins, struck from the same sort of leaded bronze, all clearly denominated with symbols and pellets and based on a libral as of 324 grams to which they readily adhere.

It was at precisely this same time that coinage at Hatria and other central Italian mints subject to Roman influence first appears. The coinage of Hatria itself is quite scarce, and consisted of cast round coins in nine denominations from as to semuncia. Attested PROVENANCES for the early cast issues of Hatria are Rimini and Atri itself. The largest, the as, was struck at a standard of about 372 grams, although specimens as heavy as 435 grams and as light as 323 grams are known. Other than the head of Silenus found on the as and the Pegasus which appears on the quincunx, the types are a mixture of both animate and inanimate objects common in everyday life, such as male and female heads, anchors, cocks and fish, shoes and craters, as well as letters and denominational marks.

The types used on the as were the facing head of Silenus, depicted bald and bearded, with thick lips, slanted eyes, and having the downturned ears of a mule, on the obverse, and on the reverse a sleeping dog curled up to the right. The legend HAT (sometimes appearing retrograde) can be found on either the obverse or reverse, as can the denominational markings I or L that often appear in the field. It is not known why these types were chosen, but it could be that viticulture played some role in the Hatria's economic development; if so, as the tutor and drinking companion of Bacchus, Silenus would have made an appropriate type for the city's first and only coinage. The dog, an animal noted for its ability to hunt and to protect, has always been man's companion, and its use here perhaps was meant to compare the fierce loyalty it showed its owner to Hatria's loyalty to Rome. The specimen offered here is undoubtedly one of if not the finest known examples of the type if not the finest.

Originally settled by native Sikels, the city of Katane was refounded c. 729 B.C. by colonists of Chalkidian Greeks from Sicilian Naxos who forced the former inhabitants to vacate. The colony was well sited, with the rich soil at the foot of Mt. Aitna supporting a thriving agriculture, and access to the sea was provided by a natural harbor. The colony flourished, and the citizens soon fortified the acropolis and the surrounding urban area with walls, and built sanctuaries to Demeter and Kore, and a theater. No doubt attracted by Katane's prosperity, in 476 B.C. the Syracusan tyrant, Hieron I, seized the city and forcibly removed its inhabitants to Leontinoi. He then repopulated the city with Syracusans and about 10,000 Dorian Greeks, renaming it Aitna. According to different sources, in either 463 or 461 B.C. after Hieron's death, the deported Katanians returned and expelled the Dorian Greeks, reoccupying their former homes. In 427 B.C., Katane was allied along with other Chalkidian Greek colonies with Leontinoi in its war against Syracuse, and in 415 B.C. the city served as the Athenian base of operations during their disastrous Sicilian campaign. In 403 B.C., Katane again fell under the sway of Syracuse, when Dionysios I took the city and sold the inhabitants into slavery. He resettled the city with Campanian mercenaries who only remained a short time, until 396 B.C., when the Syracusan fleet suffered a resounding defeat by the Carthaginians off the coast of Katane. Throughout the fourth to first centuries, Katane welcomed the Epeirote king, Pyrrhos, in his Sicilian campaigns (278 B.C.), submitted to Rome after the outbreak of the First Punic War (264-241 B.C.), saw conquest at the hands of slaves during the First Servile War (135-132 B.C.), had its wealth seized by C. Verres, the rapacious Roman propraetor of the province of Sicilia (73-71 B.C.), and served as the primary base for Sextus Pompey's pirate fleet (43-42 B.C.) until his defeat by Octavian's admiral Marcus Agrippa. Early in the Principate Katane was refounded as a Roman colony with the name colonia Catina.

Coinage at Katane only begins after the return of the exiles in the mid-fifth century B.C. Adopting the Athenian standard of c. 17.2 g, the Katanians struck their first tetradrachms to commemorate their recent return. The initial types consisted of the figure of the local river-god Amenanos, depicted by a man-headed bull, whose spirit was embodied by the small river adjacent to the city, and the goddess of Victory, Nike. Beginning in the 440s and continuing until just prior to the conquest of the city by Dionysios I in 403 B.C., the tetradrachms of Katane employ as the obverse type the quadriga, derived from contemporary issues of Leontinoi and Syracuse, and the head of Apollo or, rarely, Amenanos on the reverse.

At the very end of the fifth century in the period leading up to the conflict with Syracuse, the tetradrachms of Katane underwent a significant transformation. At this time in Sicily, and especially at Syracuse, Sicilian mints were employing engravers who were given license to excel in the miniature arts. Famous master engravers such as Choirion, Euainetos, Eumenos, Exakestidas, Kimon and others, all boldly signed their works, were reaching unparalleled degrees of quality, expressing in miniature degrees of excellence previously unattained and simply astounding in their execution. The artists Choirion and Herakleidas both engraved a series of dramatic facing head Apollo dies for use at Katane, such as the remarkable specimen offered here which is signed by the artist Herakleidas. The obverse die used to strike this magnificent coin features the nearly frontal gazing portrait of the god Apollo, and is clearly inspired by the near-contemporary facing portraits of Arethusa used at Syracuse which were engraved by Kimon. The god is presented in a naturalistic form, with his hair falling gently downward around his face and his laurel crown resting atop his head as if placed without any thought of preparation, and though the whole evokes an image of a woodland entity or sprite, the countenance is clearly divine with the god's wide-eyed gaze suggesting one is looking into the face of a living god.



In recent decades the dates of numerous ancient coins, including the celebrated works attributed to the Demareteion Master, have been reconsidered. These coins had traditionally been placed in 480 or 479 B.C. based upon an historical association derived from a passage in the eleventh book of Diodorus Siculus. However, the numismatic component of his account, which was composed 450 years after the events described, appears flawed, and current thought places these coins firmly between circa 470 and 460 B.C.

Diodorus records the generous terms for peace given by the Syracusan tyrant Gelon to the Carthaginians, who in 480 B.C. the Greeks had just defeated at the Battle of Himera. He reports that the Carthaginians were asked to pay only the costs of war incurred by the Greeks, two thousand talents of silver, and to build two temples in which copies of the treaty were to be preserved.

That report is followed by the passage relevant to the Demareteion decadrachm: "The Carthaginians, having unexpectedly gained their deliverance, not only agreed to all this but also promised to give in addition a gold crown to Demarete, the wife of Gelon. For Demarete at their request had contributed the greatest aid toward the conclusion of the peace, and when she had received the crown of one hundred gold talents from them, she struck a coin which was called from her a Demareteion. This was worth ten Attic drachmas and was called by the Sicilian Greeks, according to its weight, a pentekontalitron [a fifty-litra piece]." (XI 26.3)

In his 1969 work The Demareteion and Sicilian Chronology, Kraay challenged the notion current since 1830 that the decadrachm mentioned by Diodorus was the first issue of silver decadrachms at Syracuse. Beyond the fact that the passage suggests the coins would have been made of gold, Kraay objected on numismatic grounds to so early a date for the first decadrachm. He noted how its incorrect date of c.480/79 B.C. had become "the sheet-anchor of Sicilian numismatic chronology" and, consequently, had skewed ideas on the chronologies of so many other coinages.

Moreover, Kraay notes that the appearance of the leaping lion on two issues of Leontini tetradrachms had led some to assume that the tyrant of Leontini must have played a role at the Battle of Himera. However, literary sources record no such involvement, and if this coinage was disassociated with the victory at Himera, the only connection needed between the Demareteion issues of Syracuse and Leontini would be of a numismatic character.

It is now believed that the earliest possible date for the Demareteion decadrachm is c.470 B.C., and that it more likely was struck in about 465 B.C. The same may be said for the associated tetradrachms of Syracuse that Kraay notes exhibit "the same peculiarities of style and design" as the decadrachm. Kraay initially had narrowed the timeframe for the decadrachm to c.466-461 B.C., between the expulsion of the tyrant Hieron I from Syracuse and the removal of foreign mercenaries from the city in 461; but a few years later had settled upon c.465 B.C.

This tetradrachm is a tour de force from the greatest age of creativity at the Syracuse mint. Though the portrait on the reverse is a sublime masterpiece, it is the obverse that demands our attention, for is perhaps the most daring and inventive of all chariot scenes produced at Syracuse. Only about a decade before these dies were cut, the chariot scene on Syracusan tetradrachms had evolved from a somber, canonical depiction inspired by an Attic vase painting into an explosive scene in which the horses were shown in high action. With this innovation it was shown at a slight angle so the artist could dwell on the physiognomies of the horses and could show the chariot with a new perspective. The style of the chariot scene in the century prior to these innovations was formulaic: though the position of the Nike varied, the chariot was shown in profile, with only the slight overlapping of the horses and the separation of their heads to indicate that more than one was present. Very few dies from that initial century diverged even slightly from the standard formula (see Boehringer dies V45, V107, V286, V291, V326), with the work of a single artist in about 440 B.C. (Boehringer dies V295 and V296) being noteworthy, if not especially accomplished. Once we enter this dynamic period of about 415 to 385 B.C. some extraordinarily talented artists energized Syracusan coins with a level of innovation that had never before been seen. Not surprisingly, several of these artists signed their dies and produced works that were influential far beyond the shores of Sicily. Leading the way was Euainetos, who seems to have been the first to express complete freedom in the way he depicted the chariot at an angle, as if it was turning the bend (Tudeer die 10).

Both his contemporaries and successors regarded Euainetos as the ultimate master. No work of ancient coinage has been copied over a longer period or more frequently than his signed Syracusan decadrachm. Most Siculo-punic issues replicate the chariot and team, as well as the head on the obverse. The female head in particular must have made an unusually deep impression on the ancients, appearing not only on gold and electrum Carthaginian issues, but also on many 4th and 3rd century B.C. coins from sites as geographically disparate as Spain and Crete. In the 3rd century B.C., the head even served as the model for the tondo on varnished Greek bowls. From copyists' embellishments of corn-ears and stalks, we can only assume that they interpreted Euainetos' female head as an effigy of Kore-Persephone. Most researchers have nonetheless interpreted the work as representing Arethusa, in which case the corn ears are out of place, although reeds of similar appearance would have fitted in very well. Such long-lasting impact and exceptional ubiquity is nevertheless understandable only in the context of a much-revered goddess, certainly not a local nymph.

Before this series, gold coinage in the Western Mediterranean was episodic, and was only issued in times of emergency. Syracuse had traditionally set trends for coinage in Sicily, so it comes as no surprise that it led the way on the issuance of gold. The need for gold coinage in such quantity must have been military, and we can speculate that these coins were used to pay the mercenaries whom Dionysios I hired to promote his ambitions.

The obverse die used to strike this coin bears the letters KI, and thus is assigned to the engraver Kimon. That he would sign this masterful die is not unexpected, for it is the original obverse die for the entire series, which in total utilized more than forty obverse dies before its exhaustion. Most of the dies do not bear signatures, but often they are assigned to Kimon or Euainetos based upon a similarity in style to signed dies. Two other engravers, who signed A and AK (or KA), also produced dies.

This coinage was probably introduced sometime around 400 B.C. and appears to have been struck in parallel with the silver decadrachms of the Kimon and Euainetos types. Though the precise date of this gold coinage is not known, the best opinions range from c.406 to c.390 B.C. as the starting point, and c.370/65 B.C. as the end. Of particular value in establishing the context of this coinage are the Avola Hoards (ICGH 2122 and 2124) found not far south of Syracuse, which contained examples of this type in superb condition. Since other gold coins were found with them, including Persian darics and Lampsacus staters, these hoards probably were deposited by c.370 or 360 B.C.

Dozens of military actions are spread over the decades of Dionysius' reign, so it is impossible to isolate one that explains the genesis of this series. However, a theory was put forth by Boehringer, who associated these coins with Dionysius' great victory over the besieging Carthaginians in 396 or 395. He suggested that because the Carthaginians were routed at their encampment on the plain at the Anapus river, to the south of Syracuse, it was meaningful that the half-denomination of this series, the gold dekadrachm (50-litra), portrays the river-god Anapus. Perhaps fortifying this idea is a report by Diodorus (14.75.1-3) that Dionysius collected 300 talents from the Carthaginian commander Himilco as a term of surrender after the defeat. That influx may have been converted into coinage to pay his troops. It is not clear why the Herakles-and-lion type was introduced with this issue, though it may be emblematic of the Greek struggle against the Carthaginians, with the lion being symbolic of that culture.

Struck at Panticapaeum, a city in the Crimea at the outer limits of the Greek world, this gold stater offers a glimpse into the conspicuous wealth and the intriguing culture of the Scythians during the age of Alexander the Great. The origins of the Scythians were a mystery to the Greeks. Herodotus offered three versions: the first suggests they arrived from the northern steppes to displace the Cimmerians, the second two describe how they were descended from Zeus and the daughter of the Borysthenes river or from Heracles and a half-woman, half-snake who lived in the woodlands. Hence we can understand why a Greek would think of the Scythians as rough and uncultured cousins. Colonists from Miletus founded Panticapaeum in about 600 B.C. to gain access to the raw materials and agricultural wealth of the Crimea, which was one of the main sources of grain for Athens. The exchanges between the cultures were substantial, as art objects of Greek manufacture are often found in the Crimea; but the Scythian-Greek relationship was sometimes hostile. Indeed, the Macedonian king Philip II caused the aggressive Scythian king Atheas to be murdered, and, perhaps about the time this gold stater was struck, the Scythians defeated a large army that Alexander the Great had sent against them under the command of his general Zopyrion. The artistry of the Scythians is unique because of its influences from nomadic, Greek and Near-Eastern cultures. It is imbued with a vitality and a fierceness that contrasts sharply with Greek art of the time, which had abandoned Archaic vigor in favor of idealized beauty. The griffin appears on Scythian art of other media which often is found in royal tombs known as kurgans. Sometimes the creature has horns - as on this coin - other times it has a row of spines along its head and neck that are connected by webbing. Though the bearded head on the obverse is clearly meant to represent a divinity most likely Pan - the long hair and beard closely resemble depictions of Scythian men on other works of art, such as a contemporary gilt silver cup excavated from the Gaimanova Mogila kurgan and a particularly famous Greek gold vessel depicting Scythian men that was excavated from the Kul Oba kurgan.

The children of Pelops and Hippodamia, the brothers Troizen and Pittheus ruled jointly over the cities of Hyperea and Anthea in Argolis along its northern coast, which after Troizen's death Pittheos unified and renamed in honor of his brother. The city had mythological ties to Athens, whose king Aegeus had stopped off in the city and, while attending to business with king Pittheus, bedded the king's daughter, Aithra, from which union the hero Theseus was born. Theseus, somewhat akin to Herakles, performed a number of impossible tasks, the most heroic of which was securing Athenian freedom from subjugation by King Minos of Crete, who previous to Theseus' intervention had each year forced Athens to supply in tribute seven youths and seven maidens as food for his ghastly beast, the Minotaur, that he kept confined in his famous Labyrinth. During the fifth century B.C., Troizen was allied with Athens, providing material support in the form of ships and soldiers during Athens' war with Persia, and prior to Salamis in 480 B.C. even provided a safe haven for the Athenian women and children at the request of the great Athenian statesman, Themistokles. Subsequently, however, Troizen was a member of the Peloponnesian League, and thus was allied with Sparta during its long wars with Athens (460-445 and 431-404 B.C.).

This exceedingly rare coin offered here – which it should be noted was lacking from the famous BCD collection – is the very first emission from the city of Troizen, and depicts the un-helmeted facing head of Athena on the obverse, and Poseidon's trident within an incuse square on the reverse. The ethnic appearing along the right side of the trident leaves no question as to the identification of the mint; but if that were not enough, we have the evidence of the second century A.D. travel writer and cultural geographer, Pausanias, who actually mentions this specific coin type some 600 years after it was struck! In the second book of his Description of Greece, he writes that during the reign of one of the earliest kings of Troizen, Althepos, "...they say, Athena and Poseidon disputed about the land, and after disputing held it in common, as Zeus commanded them to do. For this reason they worship both Athena, whom they name both Polias (Urban) and Sthenias (Strong), and also Poseidon, under the surname of King. And moreover their old coins have as device a trident and a face of Athena" (Paus., II.30.6).

Unlike their brethren in other areas of the Hellenic world, the remote Cretans maintained archaic forms of speech and insular traditions; thus it is not surprising that the adoption of coinage in Crete occurred rather later than elsewhere. The earliest coins that circulated on the island, imported Aeginetan staters of the type of a sea turtle with a T-shaped pattern of dots on the carapace and a developed skew reverse, arrived due to the close ties between Aegina in the Saronic Gulf and the city of Kydonia on the northwestern Cretan littoral, which it had colonized c. 520 B.C. The abundance of Aegina's output was severely curtailed around 480 B.C., and after its capture in 457 B.C. it may have ended entirely for some time. Having by this time become heavily dependent on imported coins of Aegina for its economy, the sudden lack of such specie drove the Cretans to develop their own native coinages, first at Gortyna and Phaistos in alliance, then slightly later at both Knossos and Lyttos concurrently. The earliest coins from these four cities were nearly always overstruck on earlier Aeginetan issues.

Beginning in the second quarter of the 4th century B.C., coinage spread to other metropolitan centers on the island, notably Sybrita, Axos and Itanos. Sybrita, which lay inland in west-central Crete atop Kefala Hill along the southern slopes of Mount Ida, controlled the Amari Basin through which the principal north-south and east-west trade routes passed. This fortuitous siting, along with its sea-port on the Libyan Sea at Soulia, which was a part of the territory of Sybrita, allowed the city to prosper commercially and culturally during the later Hellenic and early Hellenistic periods.

The early coinage of Sybrita was struck only infrequently, and the scarcity of the coins today suggests that these periods of striking were relatively short-lived. Nonetheless, it is interesting both for its variety and high artistic quality. Its first coins were struck c. 380 B.C., and show a seated Hermes on the obverse and a winged hippocamp surrounded by the city's ethnic in a disorganized fashion within a shallow incuse square on the reverse. Around 360 B.C. Sybrita replaced Phaistos as the junior partner in its alliance with Gortyna, and for a few years struck types copying the coinage of its sister city: on the obverse, a female - presumably but not conclusively identified as Europa - seated amid the branches of a tree, with a pose of patient expectation resting her head upon her hand, and on the reverse a bull standing with its head turned back to lick its flank. Like the contemporary coins of Gortyna, this type is commonly found overstruck on Aeginetan staters or earlier native Cretan issues. After a hiatus of several years, in the final decades of the 4th century B.C. Sybrita struck an especially beautiful coinage, the present specimen being a particularly splendid example. The superbly rendered types portray the city's principal deities, the head of Dionysos, the lord of the vine, with his wreath of ivy before which is a cluster of grapes on a small twig occupying the obverse, and the head of the messenger-god Hermes, wearing a petasos and accompanied by his sign of office, the caduceus, on the reverse. These lovely types were probably inspired by coins from the northern Aegean regions of Macedon and Thrace, as an influx of coinage from that area was then making its way to the island in the purses of Cretan mercenaries who had served in the Macedonian wars of Philip II and Alexander III.

Few leaders in history were as polarizing as Mithradates VI. He is admired for his intense determination and his seemingly boundless talents, and yet he is detested for his many acts of cruelty, some of which cannot be excused even if one takes into account the violent age in which he lived.

There can be no question that he was a military genius. He was one of Rome's most formidable enemies, with Cicero rating him higher than the Carthaginian general Hannibal, and second only to Alexander III among the Greek kings. It took three of Rome's best generals — Sulla, Lucullus and Pompey the Great — to defeat Mithradates convincingly enough for him to commit suicide.

Mithradates came to power by arranging the murder of his mother, who was an unwanted regent, and he is credited with murdering other close family members and executing concubines rather than allowing them to fall into enemy hands. He was so bitterly opposed to the Roman presence in Asia Minor that in a single night he ordered the murder of more than 80,000 Romans and Latins in residence there. Most of these victims, no doubt, were innocent of any crime against Mithradates, and could hardly have deserved the death sentence they received.

He is said to have been of boundless courage, to have been highly proficient in weaponry, and to have trained his body to resist the effects of poison by regularly subjecting himself to non-lethal doses. He may have been able to communicate in as many as 22 languages and was a devoted patron of art and poetry. He also was of noble lineage: he claimed descent on his mother's side from the Greek Kings Alexander III and Seleucus I, and on his father's side from the Persian Kings Cyrus and Darius. Hence his honourary title Eupator, meaning 'of a noble father.'

His coin portraits are of two types: restrained and realistic, and flamboyant and idealized. The masterful example offered here recalls the familiar image of Alexander III. The idealized type was admired by Edward T. Newell, who described them as "rather theatrical...with flowing diadem ends and dramatically flying locks of hair."

The reverses of his portrait coins bear an ivy wreath that alludes to his epithet of Dionysus, and show a stag or Pegasus, with the latter alluding to his claim of descent from Perseus. Also within the wreath are a crescent and star, the badge of the Pontic dynasty, his royal inscription, control monograms and the date of issue, exact to the month. This particular coin is dated to September, 74 B.C.

The ancient city of Cyzicus, known to numismatists primarily for its extensive and varied early issues in electrum, was located along the banks of the river Aisepos on the southwestern shore of the Propontis. It was purportedly the first of many cities founded by colonists from Miletos, chosen due to its defensible site and two fine harbors from which it derived its great wealth, both from the abundant stock of tunny within their waters and from the extensive trade networks between the Euxine and Aegean Seas. The tunny was the city's civic badge and features on all of its coinage before the advent of Rome

In addition to the tunny, the electrum coinage of Cyzicus struck over the course of the sixth and fifth centuries B.C. presents us with a great variety of designs. There are a few that seemingly derive from other coin types or possibly from historical events, but for the majority no underlying reason is evident. For instance, although Athena as presented here is magnificently centered and beautifully executed with her high-crested Attic helmet, there was no cult of significance to the goddess at Cyzicus and festivals in her honor at the city are not mentioned by ancient authors. Most cities in ancient times chose to commemorate on their coinage a specific historical event or either some mythological or religious characteristic of the city. Why Cyzicus did not, at least as can be determined by the majority of her types during this period, has led to an insightful observation by Colin Kraay (cf. ACGC p. 264), where he suggests that perhaps Cyzicus derived its coin types from designs on Greek vases and other works of art that passed through its ports during the course of trade between the Aegean and Euxine Seas.

With such a variety of obverse types known for early electrum staters it is difficult to classify all such coins on those grounds alone. Often they can be more credibly grouped by their weight standard and the characteristics of the punch-impressions on their reverse. Perhaps the most common 'reverse type' for early electrum staters is an arrangement in which a long, rectangular punch is flanked by two smaller, square punches, the fields of which sometimes are decorated. This system was ideal for raising the full design of the obverse die when using an oval planchet.

The production of such coins was discussed in depth by Lisolette Weidauer in her 1975 corpus on early electrum. She notes that the early staters required several hammer blows with different dies to bring up the obverse design; to do this in a way that did not blur the obverse design required carefully directed blows. This system also had the advantage, as Weidauer points out, of allowing flexibility in striking the sub-denominations. Since she has shown that denominations smaller than the stater often were struck using obverse dies large enough for staters, it is of interest that smaller denominations required the use of only two reverse punches, and sometimes just one.

Another common solution was the use of a single, square punch – sometimes quadripartite, other times not divided but with their fields roughened or engraved with simple designs. Unlike the three-punch system, this approach was well-suited to staters with round planchets. Occasionally, other punch arrangements were used, including two thin, rectangular punches side-by-side, a single, round punch, or, as in this case, a long, rectangular punch with an irregular, roughened surface. On smaller denominations the dynamics of striking were less challenging, and for them a wider variety of punches were employed.

Though the rectangular punch of the kind used here is known for several issues, it is decidedly less common than the three-punch or square-punch methods already discussed. It occurs, at least, on the present coin with the forepart of a pouncing lion and on staters portraying the protome of a winged lion in the midst of attack (NAC 77, lot 64), a lactating lioness on the prowl (NAC 52, lot 152), a cow suckling its calf (see this NAC auction, lot 198), and on two staters illustrated by Martin Price in A Field In Western Thrace, Coin Hoards II, figs. 1.3 and 1.4; one shows the forepart of a rushing bull, the other a recumbent bull with its head reverted toward a floral ornament. It is probable that these staters – all struck to the Lydo-Milesian standard using similar incuse punches – were issued at the same mint sometime around 500 B.C.

Having been published by Babelon, Svoronos and Kraay, this type of electrum stater with a cow suckling its calf is well-known within a series that is defined by discovery coins. It is an exceedingly rare and important issue that, at present, cannot be reliably assigned to a minting authority. Its style, fabric and Lydo-Milesian weight suggest it was issued at a mint in Lydia or Ionia, yet the lotus flower over the cow is a familiar feature of the early coins of Thrace and Macedon, such as tetradrachms of Abdera, tetrobols and dodecadrachms of the Derrones, and tetrobols of Olynthus. It is also a prominent and recurring design element on tetrobols and tetradrachms of Acanthus, and on coins usually attributed to Stageira or Methone. Though similar staters have been found in the northerly regions of Greece, a find spot does not necessarily mark the point of origin of large-denomination coins, for they were habitually exported in regional or international trade.

This distinctive floral emblem appears on at least three other early electrum staters of the Lydo-Milesian standard. Examples in the Rosen collection (sylloge nos. 148 and 149) show a bull kneeling with its head reverted and two rampant lions standing upright with their heads reverted and paws extended. Another piece, which shows a recumbent lion, was offered in NAC 72 as lot 369. The flowers on all three pieces are comparable to that on the present coin, and are displayed with equal prominence, suggesting it may have been the symbol for electrum issued at a single mint.

Like the Phocaic stater with the archaic panther or lioness in this sale, the obverse type of the donkey advancing left upon a raised disk must have been the personal badge of the issuer. The type does not play a role in subsequent coinage from the region and therefore does not indicate its use here as a civic badge.

While at 16.67 grams this coin is quite clearly struck to the Phokaic standard, the pattern of the reverse punches deviates from the Phokaic norm: instead of two square punches of unequal size side by side, here we have a large central square punch between two smaller square punches. Additionally, the smaller squares are struck by the same punch. This is akin to what is found on early Lydo-Milesian staters which exhibit a long rectangular punch between two smaller square punches, although on Lydo-Milesian coins the punches normally include either designs of animals or a combination of pellets and irregular strokes (see, for instance, the superb Lydo-Milesian stater with the butting bull in this sale).

The early electrum coinage that began in western Asia Minor sometime during the mid-7th century B.C. for the most part adhered to three distinct weight standards: the northern Phokaic standard of c. 16.5 grams, the southern Milesian (or Lydo-Milesian) standard of c. 14.1 grams, and in between on the island-state of Samos the heavier Attic-Euboic standard of c. 17.4 grams. These three different standards came into being as a result of informal leagues or trading networks all sharing a need for a uniform system of weights in order to efficiently transact business with one other. The reverses were stamped with square and rectangular punches, and it seems that in addition to a uniform weight standard each trading network also used a unique punch pattern which was consistently applied within its sphere of influence. For example, on this coin two square punches of unequal size were applied to the reverse, one beside the other, and this is seen throughout the zone where the Phokaic standard was prevalent. As opposed to the weights and punch-patterns, however, the obverse designs on these early coins often leave no indication as to where a particular type was struck. There are some exceptions, of course, one of the most notable being the device of the seal which served as a punning allusion to the city of Phokaia. This lack of obvious reference is simply due to the fact that the designs used as types were only occasionally civic badges of a static nature, instead being the personal badges of the individuals responsible for their issuance, be it the ruler or someone else within the administration assigned the task. All we can say about the present coin with any certainty is that it is from the northern region that used the Phokaic standard; the obverse type of either a panther or lioness does not in itself lend assistance in identifying the mint.

Though separate from the prodigious issues of stephanophoroi of Myrina, located some fifty miles to the north, this example from Colophon must have been produced with dies engraved by an artist responsible for producing dies at Myrina. The stylistic affinities are undoubted, both for obverse and reverse, and the fabric suggests the Colophon coin was struck at the same facility that was striking for Myrina.

The nature of such a cooperative effort is a matter of conjecture. However, both coinages celebrate an oracle of Apollo and we might suspect that that alone was sufficient. The familiar issue of Myrina depicts Apollo Grynius holding a phiale and a filleted branch, with an omphalus and an amphora at his feet, whereas that of Colophon shows Apollo Clarius in the same advancing pose, also holding a filleted branch and placing his right hand on a lyre. The inscriptions to the left of the figures, of course, differ, as each identifies its minting authority.

Apollo Clarius, whose shrine was in the oracular sanctuary in the vicinity of Colophon, was famous in both Greek and Roman times. Its shrine existed far back into Greek history, and is mentioned in one of the Homeric Hymns to Artemis. Its popularity persisted, and may have reached its peak in the 2nd Century A.D. Inscriptions originating from or relating to the oracle have been found as far away as Dalmatia, Olbia, Rome, Sardinia, Algeria and Britain.

The sanctuary was located less than ten miles from Colophon, and was much closer to Notion, the port of Colophon that sometimes was called "Colophon-on-Sea" or "New Colophon". The original city had been magnificent in the late Archaic period, but it was greatly reduced by Lysimachus, who forced its people to relocate to Notion or to Ephesus. Thereafter, Colophon was of no importance, and the Ephesians apparently made an effort to assure it did not recover.

The ill-fortune of the old city, however, did not prevent Notion from thriving as a port, and did not prevent the activities of the oracle at Clarius. Archaeological work has revealed much about the structure and inner-workings of the precinct, which today is partly submerged.

The temple of Apollo had beneath its cella the innermost shrine, the adyton, accessed by passageways lined with blue marble. The adyton was comprised of two vaulted chambers, one of which had benches, a statue of the seated Apollo and the sacred omphalus of blue stone. In this chamber the prophet, the thespoidos and scribes awaited the appropriate hour of the evening, when the prophet entered a second chamber in complete darkness.

In that most sacred chamber he drank from a rectangular well that contained water from the subterranean fountain at the core of the shrine. He recited poetry prepared by the thespiodos and performed sacred customs, after which he answered in verse questions posed by those seeking predictions of the future.

The sanctuary, built upon a narrow tract in a valley, had important buildings other than the temple of Apollo, including a smaller, Ionic temple devoted to Apollo's sister Artemis, a stone sundial, and a square, Doric-style propylon at the edge of the precinct's sacred woods, through which delegations that had arrived by sea would approach.


An incredible rarity amongst early electrum coinage, this beautiful stater is by far the finest of just three known specimens (the others are Weidauer 131 = ACGC 58, ex Robinson collection and Bourgey 1959, 477; and Weidauer 132 = Babelon 38, pl. 2, 1, ex Borrell 1840). Although the mint is uncertain, at 14.02 grams the weight standard is clearly Lydo-Milesian. The type of the butting bull seemingly does not occur elsewhere within these early electrum pieces, nor is it associated with a particular city of the region subsequently. However, the types found on early electrum of this period – which are quite varied – probably represent the personal badges of individuals, either rulers or persons in charge of minting, as opposed to the civic badges of different cities (with a few notable exceptions, of course).

The reverse punches used on this coin, with two smaller square punches either side of a long rectangular central punch, are all decorated with pellets and strokes. This same tripartite division of punches occurs with other obverse types, although sometimes instead of a series of pellets and strokes there are distinct depictions of animals or animal heads, such as on the famous staters with a recumbent lion within a rectangular border (see, e.g., Weidauer 126-127). However, there are also examples of the latter that employed the same punches that were used to stike the present coin – thus our probable attribution to Miletos here. This indicates a transition at Miletos, where there was certainly a need for a plentiful coinage, from the use of non-civic or personal types to a static civic type featuring the recumbent lion. According to Kraay, ACGC pp. 25-6, this would have occurred by the middle of the sixth century B.C. Of further interest, the designs of the two smaller squares sometimes also show that both were struck from the same punch, thus indicating that the punchmarks were applied separately. This is indeed the case here, with the designs of both of the smaller square punches being identical and therefore from the same punch, which was also the same punch that was used to strike Weidauer 132.

In the Roman Republic gold coinage was struck only on rare occasions. It was introduced during the Second Punic War, when Rome and her Italian allies struggled to defeat the Carthaginian invader Hannibal, and it was not struck again for nearly 125 years. This next occasion was a crisis that equally tested the Romans, for they suffered an uprising of their Italian allies in 91 B.C., and for the first time Roman armies invaded the capital. The circumstances behind these terrible events had long been forming. For centuries Rome had relentlessly subdued its neighbours, and in the process it had constructed a system of alliances which allowed her to collect taxes and levy troops every year. It was a double-edged sword for the allies - while it was better to join Rome than to oppose her, Rome could only remain powerful because it used their young men for its conquests. There were several levels of alliance membership, and neighbouring cities within the same regions often had a very different status. The ultimate prize for Rome's Italian federates was obtaining Roman citizenship, and in 91 B.C. that cause was taken up by the tribune Livius Drusus. But his swift and brutal murder dashed all hope and a rebellion erupted throughout Italy. Leading the way were the Samnites, a fierce people living in the hills and mountains near Rome. After suffering initial defeats, Rome was able in 90 and 89 to satisfy most of its former allies with promises of Roman citizenship (which, remarkably, remained unfulfilled until the census of 70). Though Rome pacified most of its opponents, the Samnites continued to resist, and in 88 even appealed to king Mithradates VI of Pontus for help. Mithradates sent financial aid and, in the meantime, he caused the murder of 80,000 Romans and Italians living in Asia before ravaging Roman territories in Asia Minor and Greece. These two crises - the resistance of the Samnites and the aggressions of Mithradates - set the stage for a conflict between the Roman warlords Sulla and Marius. Through many tribulations, Sulla overcame all of his opponents, in part by unleashing Rome's own armies against the capital, something which had never before occurred. Sulla was able to impose what later Roman historians called the Regnum Sullanum, a dictatorial era during which he executed his enemies with appalling cruelty. However, he eventually restored the senate's power, and in 79 retired to Campania shortly before he died. This rare aureus celebrates the triumphs Sulla was awarded for his defeat of Mithradates, and of the Samnites at the Battle of the Colline Gate in 82. On the reverse a triumphal quadriga bears the figure of Sulla, who is crowned by a Victory flying above. The inscription L SVLLA IM makes it clear that Sulla is the figure in the quadriga. This aspect should not be overlooked, for it is an early example of a Roman coin depicting a living person – something that would eventually become a defining feature of coins of the Imperatorial period. In this aureus we have a precursor to the royal portraiture initiated by Julius Caesar nearly four decades later. Also, since this coin was issued either contemporarily or soon after Sulla's triumphal procession through the streets of Rome, it serves as a document of that great event.

Few military campaigns have been more closely studied than the one Julius Caesar led in Gaul in the 50s B.C. It is well-documented in Caesar's own words, involved years of intense warfare, two crossings of the Rhine, a brief 'invasion' of Britain, and secured Gaul as a Roman province. Caesar's skills as a commander were tested most severely in 52 B.C. when he besieged the Arverni chieftain Vercingetorix in the oppidum of Alesia, only to be besieged himself by a massive army of Celts that arrived afterward. In an almost unbelievable turn of events, Caesar's legions emerged victorious against a combined Gallic army perhaps 350,000 strong. His conquest of Gaul was complete by 51 B.C., by which time the senate and his former ally Pompey Magnus had united against his growing authority. During his campaigns Caesar attained hero status by sending back reports of his exploits in the seven books of De Vello Gallico and the three books of De Vello Civili. On January 7, 49 B.C. the senate demanded that Caesar disband his army and relinquish his Gallic command. Recognizing that he needed his legions for protection, Caesar refused. He famously crossed of the Rubicon on January 10, 49 B.C., forcing Pompey and many senators to sail for Greece, where, after much preparation on both sides, they were defeated by Caesar at the battle of Pharsalus on August 9 of the following year. Since this denarius likely was produced in the aftermath of Pharsalus, Caesar had to select his designs carefully, making it clear that the victories celebrated were those in Gaul, not in Spain or Greece against the Pompeians. Thus, the arms and armor are of distinctly Gaulish types, and the bound captive - often thought to represent Vercingetorix himself - is a wild-haired Gaul. Two other issues are associated with the present type, denarii and quinarii depicting on their obverses the heads female divinities and on their reverses Gallic trophies. They also bear the formulaic inscription for the number 52 that on this denarius appears behind the head of the divinity. This has long been recognized as an indication that the coins were struck in the 52nd year of Caesar's life, allowing all three issues to be dated to the one-year period beginning July 13, 48 B.C.

Among the towering figures of the late Republic was Gnaeus Pompeius, better known as Pompey 'the Great', who by his mid-20s had already had earned his surname Magnus. Alongside his father Pompeius Strabo and later in alliance with the warlord Sulla, Pompey lived in the eye of the storm that challenged the authority of the Senate. Time and time again Pompey (like his father) defied the Senate's requests to disband his armies. He was a merciless commander, crushing remnants of the Marian party in North Africa, fighting the rebel Sertorius in Spain, crushing the slave-army of Spartacus in Southern Italy, cleansing the eastern Mediterranean of pirates, and delivering the final defeat to Rome's great enemy in Asia, Mithradates VI of Pontus. After his great successes in Asia, Pompey joined Crassus and Julius Caesar to form the First Triumvirate in 60 B.C., which remained intact until 53, when Crassus died in battle against the Parthians. Soon Pompey found himself allied with the Senate against Caesar, which resulted in Caesar crossing the Rubicon in 49, forcing Pompey and his allies to flee to Greece. In the following year their conflict shifted to Greek soil, at Pharsalus, where Pompey was defeated in the famous battle, after which he fled to Egypt and was swiftly murdered. This rare denarius was struck by Pompey's eldest son, Pompey Junior, presumably at the Spanish mint of Corduba shortly before the Battle of Munda on March 17, 45. At this battle the Pompeians suffered another crushing defeat to Julius Caesar. With the possible exception of civic bronzes of Soli-Pompeiopolis in Cilicia, no portrait of Pompey appears on coinage until after his death, thus making the series to which this coin belongs his first securely dateable portrait coins.

The second type of the M. Arrius Secundus struck in 41 B.C. is one of the rarest issues of all republican coinage. The portrait on the obverse, while purportedly that of an ancestor - probably Quintus Arrius, perhaps the moneyer's father, who defeated Spartacus' lieutenant, Crixus, during the Servile War (73-71 B.C.) - displays the same ambiguity as discussed under the denarius of C. Numonius Vaala in this sale, except that instead of the portrait with a strong resemblance to Julius Caesar that appears on the denarius of Vaala here it more closely resembles Octavian.

The reverse scene is quite interesting. It depicts two solders, the one on the left holding two military standards while the one on the right holds a spear and reaches back to retrieve one of the standards from the first soldier. The significance of the type is obscure, but may be interpreted as illustrating an important event from M. Arrius Secundus' father's career during the Servile War. On occasion when the Roman army was facing difficult odds during a pitched battle - which happened time and again during Rome's struggle with the rabble army of Spartacus - a soldier might cast a legionary standard into the ranks of the enemy soldiers. The purpose for doing this was to spur on the soldiers to defeat the enemy forces in their efforts to retrieve the standard, a symbol not only of Roman military might, but also, at least from the perspective of the individual legionary, a sacrosanct emblem of his personal virtue. The loss of a legionary standard brought shame upon the legionaries. If Secundus' ancestor committed such a heroic gesture thereby inspiring his troops to inflict heavy casualties upon the enemy during the heat of the battle, it would certainly have served as ready fodder for his coin type.

The portrait aurei of 42 B.C. are devoted to the three members of the second triumvirate – Octavian, Antony and Lepidus. All were produced by four moneyers, Clodius, Mussidius, Varus and Regulus, and Buttrey's proposal that the four moneyers struck in the same year has generally been accepted. Each moneyer struck portrait aurei for each triumvir, making it a comprehensive series. The aurei of L. Livineius Regulus are unique within the group because they are not die linked with coins of the other three moneyers. This aspect, taken with the unusual characteristics of some of Regulus' silver coins, allowed Buttrey to argue that Regulus was the primus, or leading member, of the college of four moneyers. If so, the coins of Regulus may have been struck first, with those of Clodius, Mussidius and Varus following in a manner that allowed them to be die linked among each other. Based upon the inscription PRAEF.VR on one of Regulus' denarii, Buttrey suggests Regulus was serving as the praefect of the city of Rome in 42 B.C., and that his duties included control of the coinage when consuls were absent. Thus, Regulus out of necessity may have become one of the moneyers so he could perform his expanded duties as praefect. Regulus' portrait aurei were carefully conceived, as the reverse type associated with each triumvir refers to the divine forbearers of the men: Octavian claimed descent from Venus, which is implied by Regulus' type of Aeneas carrying Anchises; Lepidus counted Mars among his ancestors, which is alluded to by his type depicting the Vestal Virgin Aemilia; and Antony is said to have been descended form Hercules, who is shown on the aurei Regulus produced for him. As Buttrey points out, offering descent from a divinity as a qualification for authority was not original to this series; similar overtures had been made on earlier coinage by Sulla (with Venus), Pompey (with Neptune) and Julius Caesar (with Venus). However, Regulus' coins show a strengthening of that trend, and imply that "...the Fortune of the city was to be assured by divinity as it were made flesh." The portrait die of this specimen was paired only with one reverse die, assuring us that it did not have a particularly long life. Stylistically it is perhaps the finest of all the Antony portrait dies employed by these moneyers. The inscription IIII VIR A P F is instructive, if not entirely clear. It almost certainly abbreviates quatuorviri argento publico feriundo or quattuorvir auro publico feriundo, with the latter representing the first time gold was included as part of the regular issues - something of a landmark in the development of Roman coinage.

The year 42 B.C. was extraordinarily rich in coinage. The obvious explanation is that the Caesareans were confiscating vast amounts of property in their proscriptions, which they in turn were using to prepare for the upcoming war against Brutus and Cassius. Crawford attributes more than ninety different coinages to 42 B.C., struck by four moneyers and eight commanders operating in Africa, the East, Greece, Italy and Sicily. This aureus was struck by Lucius Mussidius Longus, one of the four moneyers of 42 B.C. Its reverse depicts Mars, nude except for his Corinthian helmet, holding a spear and sword, and placing his foot on a fallen shield, which must refer to the preparations being made by the triumvirs' desire to wage war on Brutus and Cassius. This reverse is known from only three dies, which Mussidius used interchangeably with portrait dies of Octavian, Antony and Lepidus.

Coins with the portrait of Brutus are among the most desired of all objects from the Roman world. Here we have a remarkable aureus with a realistic portrait of the conflicted nobleman who forged the plot to murder Julius Caesar, and whose legacy is still subject open to a wide range of interpretations.

The fact that Brutus placed his own portrait on coinage is clear testimony to his confusion about his principles and his mission, for it contradicts some of the lofty Republican sentiments that he proclaimed as a defence for his murder of Caesar. When Brutus came to lead his own political movement he, too, behaved as a despot, and like Caesar before him, he succumbed to the temptation to place his image on circulating coins.

Cassius, his principal ally, did not follow suit. This is a double-edged sword: though we may admire the nobility of Cassius' restraint, it is a great loss that no coin portraits of him exist. This deprives us not only of an assured image from coinage, but it means we are unable to assign to him any un-inscribed portraits in other media, such as marble or gemstone.

As with all coins that Brutus produced as Imperator, this aureus was probably struck in the late summer or in the fall of 42 B.C., not long before he and Cassius were defeated at Philippi by Mark Antony and Octavian. Since these Republican warlords were operating in the eastern Mediterranean, a host of mints in Asia Minor and Greece emerge as possibilities, though we may best describe them as products of "moving mints" that accompanied the imperators and their vast armies.

Brutus struck two issues of aurei with his portrait. We are fortunate that this issue of Servilius Casca offers a sober and realistic image, especially in comparison with his other aurei, struck by the legate Pedanius Costa, which bear what Sheldon Nodelman rightly describes as a portrait of "neoclassic" style.

The features of Brutus on this piece are fully developed, and there is no attempt to portray youthfully this noble Roman, who was probably forty-three at the time. In that respect, these aurei may offer the most truthful depiction of Brutus, perhaps eclipsing the very best portraits on the Eid Mar coinage.

Perhaps no coin of antiquity is as familiar, or as important, as the 'Eid Mar' denarius of Brutus: its dagger-flanked liberty cap and explicit inscription are a simple and direct monument of one of the great events in western history. This type is so remarkable that, unlike the anonymous mass of ancient coinage, it elicited commentary from the ancient historian Dio Cassius (XLVII.25). The murder of the dictator Julius Caesar in the Senate House on the Ides of March, 44 B.C., is one of the major turning points in western history. It is impossible to know how the Roman world would have changed had Caesar not been murdered on that day, but the prospect certainly taxes the imagination. Caesar was a populist and an opportunist bent upon dismantling the traditional arrangement of senatorial authority that concentrated power in the hands of the ancient and elite families. In the minds of Brutus and his fellow conspirators, theirs was a struggle to maintain the traditional hold on power, and with that aim they struck down Caesar. This class struggle was couched in the terms of the ancient form of Republican government, and of Rome's hatred for kings and autocrats; thus it is no surprise that the two leaders, Brutus and Cassius, follow the twin-symmetry of the two consuls, and even of Castor and Pollux, the mythical saviors of Rome. The designs are worth visiting individually, in detail. The reverse testifies to the murder of Caesar by naming the date of the event, by showing daggers as the instruments of delivery, and by displaying the pileus, or freedman's cap, which symbolizes the professed goal of the assassins' work. Though dozens of men were involved in the plot against Caesar, all are represented by only two daggers – a clear allusion to Brutus and Cassius as leaders of the coup and, subsequently, of the armed opposition to Antony and Octavian. The portrait is also of great interest and importance. The only securely identifiable portraits of Brutus occur on coins naming him imperator: the Eid Mar denarii of Plaetorius Cestianus and the aurei of Servilius Casca and Pedanius Costa. Indeed, all other portraits on coins or other media are identified based upon these three issues. S. Nodelman has made careful study of the Eid Mar series from the art-historical view, and H. A. Cahn has similarly done so from the numismatic perspective. The former has divided Brutus' inscribed coin portraits into three main categories: a 'baroque' style portrait on the aurei of Casca, a 'neoclassical' style on the aurei of Costa, and a 'realistic' style on the Eid Mar denarii of Cestianus. Nodelman describes the Eid Mar portraits as "the soberest and most precise" of all, and he divides them into two distinct categories, 'plastic' and 'linear', suggesting both were derived from the same sculptural prototype. The portrait on this particular coin belongs to Nodelman's 'linear' group.

This coin was presented and subsequently withdrawn from our auction 84 in May 2015. The reason being a denial of export from the Spanish authorities. Such denial has since been lifted and the coin is offered with an export licence issued by the Spanish State.

By the time he was appointed governor of Africa Vetus (the 'old' province) in 44 B.C., Quintus Cornuficius already had enjoyed a distinguished career in government and as a poet and orator. He counted among his friends Catullus and Cicero, and had been a loyal ally of Julius Caesar in his struggle against the Pompeians. After the murder of Caesar, Cornuficius voiced his opposition to the Triumvirs: he sided with the senate in the War of Mutina (43 B.C.), refused to allow Antony's nominee to replace him as governor, and thus was named in the Triumviral proscriptions. From his base in Africa, he aided Sextus Pompey and allowed many of those who also had been proscribed to take refuge in his territory. Cornuficius' vocal opposition to the Triumvirs, however, proved to be his undoing, for in 42 B.C. he was attacked by Titus Sextius, governor of neighbouring Africa Nova (the 'new' province). The fact that Cornuficius was hailed Imperator and was able to produce an intriguing coinage with his title suggests his defense was initially successful before, late in the year, he was defeated and killed near Utica. His coin designs are highly personal, and the few dies used to produce them were engraved in unusually fine style. He chose for the obverse of his coins the portraits of Ceres-Tanit, Africa and Jupiter Ammon, all of which celebrated his province. These were paired with a single reverse type that showed Cornuficius being crowned by Juno Sospita. The fact that he is veiled, holds a lituus and includes AVGVR in the inscription underscores the pride he held in the augurate to which he had been appointed by Julius Caesar in 47 B.C. Since he is crowned by Juno Sospita, we should assume that is a reference to his Lanuvine origin.

This aureus depicting the bare heads of Marc Antony and his youngest brother Lucius Antony is one of the rarest of the dual-portrait coinages of the Imperatorial period. The family resemblance is uncanny, and one wonders if they truly looked this much alike, or if it is another case of portrait fusion, much like we observe with the dual-portrait billon tetradrachms of Antioch on which the face of the Egyptian queen Cleopatra VII takes on the square dimensions of Marc Antony. When Antony fled Rome to separate himself from Octavian and to take up his governorship in Gaul, Lucius went with him, and suffered equally from the siege of Mutina. This coin, however, was struck in a later period, when Lucius had for a second time taken up arms against Octavian in the west. Marc Antony was already in the east, and that is the region from which this coinage emanates. Since Lucius lost the 'Perusine War' he waged against Octavian, and subsequently was appointed to an office in Spain, where he died, it is likely that he never even saw one of his portrait coins. Crawford has "misgivings", yet in a coinage riddled with cacography, a simple scribal error as here is almost predictable. The die-engraver, instead of mindlessly copying his model, paused to think about what he was doing and started to make AVGVR which he was obliged, when he returned to his senses, to continue as AVGVIR, omitting III for lack of space. The early imperial bronze coinage abounds in such errors.

Gnaeus Domitius Ahenobarbus ('bronze beard') was well acquainted with the risks and rewards that faced noblemen in times of civil war, for his father Lucius had opposed the First Triumvirate and paid for it with his life at the Battle of Pharsalus in 48 B C

Ahenobarbus was present at Pharsalus, but unlike his father he survived and was pardoned by Julius Caesar. The self-serving purpose of Caesar's mercy did not fool him, and after Caesar was struck down on the Ides of March, he fled to Macedon with Brutus. When he was named in Octavian's proscriptions of 43 B.C. Ahenobarbus had little option but to cast his lot with the cause of Brutus and Cassius.

Ahenobarbus patrolled the Adriatic for the Republicans, and together with Murcus, the naval commander of Cassius, he defeated the Caesarean Calvinus in a sea battle. For this critical victory, which prevented additional supplies and men from reaching the main forces of Antony and Octavian in Illyria, Ahenobarbus was hailed Imperator. Since this coin bears the inscription IMP we must date it to soon after that event at the earliest.

After Brutus and Cassius were defeated at Philippi in October, 42 B.C., Ahenobarbus patrolled the seas until 40 B.C., when the political tide shifted yet again, and he allied himself with Marc Antony just when war between Antony and Octavian seemed imminent. The Treaty of Brundisium restored peace, Ahenobarbus was made governor of Bithynia and then witnessed Antony's disastrous campaign against the Parthians in 36 B.C., and in the following year helped capture the renegade Sextus Pompey.

Having thus far survived the civil war, Ahenobarbus was returned to Rome to assume the consulship in 32 B.C. However, the inevitable showdown between Antony and Octavian began when Octavian marched on Rome and forced the consuls Ahenobarbus and Sosius to flee to the East along with some 300 senators who opposed Octavian. By this stage of his life Ahenobarbus' health was suffering and he was not enthusiastic about throwing his lot in with Cleopatra, so he defected to Octavian just before the battle of Actium took place on September 2, 31 B.C. He did not long survive, dying of natural causes late in 31, or early in 30 B.C.

In 40 B.C., when this denarius is thought to have been struck, the conflict between Octavian and Marc Antony reached a new peak and found an uneasy resolution in the Pact of Brundisium. Octavian had returned from the Battle of Philippi with the hard task of settling some 40,000 veterans on their promised lands. As Octavian acquired land in Italy by force, his popularity was threatened. While Antony was away in the East, his wife Fulvia and brother Lucius Antonius preyed upon Octavian's misfortune by harassing him with political attacks that stirred the veterans of Antony against those of Octavian. Lucius gathered his brother's veterans and gained permission to wage war on Octavian, who was able to intercept Lucius' northward trek and force him to take refuge in Perusia. The Perusine War (41-40 B.C.), which had all of the potential to become a new civil war, was reduced to a brief event when the threat of starvation caused Lucius to surrender in February of 40 B.C. Though Octavian took revenge upon the Perusians, he took no direct action against Lucius or Fulvia. Indeed, he pardoned Lucius and soon assigned him to a promagistracy in Spain, where he died soon thereafter. Fulvia also died in the aftermath of the war. The siege in Perusia, the deaths of his brother and wife, and perhaps more importantly, Octavian's assumption of power in Gaul upon the death of Antony's governor there, alarmed Antony, who sailed West in October of that year. Upon arriving at the port of Brundisium in the spring of 40 B.C., Antony was refused entry to the harbor by Octavian's commander. Antony responded by besieging Brundisium and strengthening his ties with Sextus Pompey, Octavian's nemesis in the West. Hoping for damage control, Octavian hastily divorced his wife Claudia, married Sextus Pompey's sister-in-law, and led an army to the southern port. Fortunately for Rome, cool heads prevailed, and the triumvirs ironed out their differences. The resulting pact confirmed Antony's control of the East and Octavian's control of the West, and bound the men through the ultimately incendiary marriage of Antony and Octavian's sister, Octavia. The two men were now able to focus on their regional goals: Antony received legions from Octavian for his planned invasion of Parthia, and Octavian received war vessels from Antony to use against Sextus Pompey. This denarius of the moneyer Q. Voconius Vitulus was struck in the midst of these alarming events. The portraits of Octavian and the deified Julius Caesar on Voconius' coinage demonstrate his allegiance to Octavian, and though the inscriptions on his coins tout his status as quaestor designate, nothing further is known of his career or fate. Some of his issues - including the denarius offered here - show a lituus beside the portrait, an indication that both Caesar and Octavian had held the augurship. The reverse type of a standing calf is strictly personal, being a punning allusion to the cognomen Vitulus, which means calf.

The relationship between Marc Antony and Octavian was adversarial even in the best of time. They clashed twice in less than two years after Caesar's murder, after which they formed a Triumvirate with Lepidus, preferring it to a winnertake-all contest. Both lived uncomfortably in their new skins, biding time in the hope they might gain the upper hand with there passage of time. However, the battle they avoided later in 43 B.C was only postponed until they faced off at Actium a dozen years later. Their cooperation in the short term allowed Antony and Octavian to jointly defeat Brutus and Cassius at Philippi later in 42, after which victors went their separate ways: Antony departing for the east, and Octavian returning to the east. Upon arriving in Italy, Octavian was faced with the two unexpected foes, Antony's wife Fulvia and his youngest brother Lucius Antony, who took up arms against him Octavian. The young triumvir scored a military victory against them in the Perusine War, and both of his opponents died of natural causes within moths of war's end. Civil with Antony was now imminent, but was averted when the two meet in southern Italy in October 40, and signed the pact at Brundisium, by which they divided the Roman world between themselves. Not surprisingly, Antony took the east and Octavian took the west, and together they confirmed that Lepidus, the "third wheel" of triumvirate, should remain restricted to North Africa. In an effort to strengthen the new agreement, Antony entered into an ill-fated marriage with Octavian's only sister, Octavia. This rare and impressive aureus was struck at the Italian mint by Ocatvian soon after the pact was signed. The portraits are of exceptional quality, especially when compared with the more common dual-portrait struck by Antony in the East. The youth Ocatavian is shown bearded in the style that, rather ironically, is reminiscent of Brutus "Eid Mar portraits.



This dupondius belongs to a series of nine aera issued by Tiberius in 22/23 in his name, and that of his son and heir Drusus. The series is meant to introduce a new dynastic arrangement and to celebrate some of Tiberius' proudest achievements. It has three dupondii – including this Pietas type – each of which bears a portrait of a woman that traditionally has been described as Livia or merely as the personification named in the accompanying inscription. The bust on this coin does not seem to be Livia or Pietas, but Drusus' wife Livilla. It was first described as such in the 1880 Numismatic Chronicle by A. Colson. Since his new identification was not published in time for Cohen to consider it for

the second edition of his eight-volume catalogue on Roman coins, Colson's epiphany had little effect on researchers who compiled the standard works of the twentieth century. The confusion on the identification of the portrait may be attributed to the great influence of Cohen's catalogue, in which he attributed to Livia all three portraits on the dupondii in the dated aes of 22/23. In reality, only one of them – the SALVS AVGVSTA dupondius – portrays Livia. Of the remaining two, the Pietas bust represents Livilla, and Justitia is the personification herself, as the type reflects the justice Tiberius achieved in court against Piso, who was said to have murdered Tiberius' first heir Germanicus. There is much evidence to support the identification of the Pietas bust as Livilla, which has been gathered for a forthcoming monograph. Foremost is the fact that the coin is the centerpiece of the only three imperial coins issued in the name of Drusus during his lifetime: an as bearing his portrait, this dupondius with the portrait of his wife Livilla, and a sestertius showing cornucopias topped with the heads of their twin boys Tiberius Gemellus and Germanicus Gemellus. The three coins represent a 'family set' of coinage organized in descending denominational order, which celebrates the relatives that Tiberius intended to succeed himself and his mother Livia. Though Tiberius must have issued these coins with great satisfaction, his joy vanished when Drusus died soon thereafter. Nearly a decade would pass before Tiberius learned his son had been poisoned by Livilla, who was in league with the prefect Sejanus, to target not only Drusus, but Tiberius himself.



Few of Rome's emperors enjoy as foul a reputation as Gaius, who is generally known by the nickname Caligula, meaning 'bootikin' or 'little boots', which he received from his father's soldiers while he was still an amiable child. He grew to despise the nickname almost as much as everyone grew to despise him. There is little need to revisit the list of his debaucheries, incests and acts of depravity — we need only note that his behaviour was a special blend of intellect and insanity, and that he has few peers beyond Nero, Commodus and Elagabalus. On the bright side, Caligula was dutiful when it came to his well-produced coinage. Caligula honoured his great-grandfather Augustus, very likely Tiberius, his murdered parents, Germanicus and Agrippina Senior, and his murdered brothers, Nero Caesar and Drusus Caesar. Among the living he honoured his three sisters — in whom he had more than a casual interest — and, on provincial coinage, his final wife Caesonia and their daughter Drusilla Minor, both of whom were murdered within an hour of Caligula. Beside these issues honouring his family, Gaius struck a very small quantity of coins in silver and gold portraying himself alone. Both his denarii and aureii are extremely rare and almost impossible to find in good condition.

The Civil Wars of A.D. 68-69 began as a revolt by the governor of Gallia Lugdunensis, Gaius Julius Vindex, in opposition to the autocratic regime of Nero. Although the circumstances under which he revolted are unclear, Cassius Dio recorded that he "had a passionate love of freedom and a vast ambition" (Cassius Dio, 63.22.2). Vindex's revolt may have been a reaction to excessive taxes, or perhaps simply there had been a threat to his existence. In any case, in order to gain military support, Vindex allied with the governor of Hispania Tarraconensis, Servius Sulpicius Galba. While Vindex was soon eliminated through the intervention of the armies of Germania Superior under the command of Lucius Verginius Rufus, Galba continued in open revolt, and began a long march on Rome. Galba's popularity grew, and he remained unopposed as he marched towards Rome. Nero fled the city, where he was immediately declared a public enemy by the Senate, and lacking any sort of military support and opposed from all sides, he committed suicide, thus bringing an end to the Julio-Claudian dynasty and paving the way for Galba to enter the city unopposed.

This wonderful coin was struck under Galba at an undetermined Spanish mint - probably at his capital of Tarraco where there already existed an established mint - sometime between April 2, A.D. 68 when he was hailed imperator by his troops at Carthago Nova, and early June when Nero committed suicide. All of the anonymous Civil War coinage is rare today, though initially it must have consisted of a very large output as numerous die-links exist within groups and between separate issues. In fact, denarii with these types also exist, and die-links between both the aurei and denarii of this issue have been noted. Sutherland notes that, along with the Bon Event / Rom Renasc type depicting a filleted female bust on the obverse and Roma standing to right, holding a small statuette of Victory and eagle-tipped scepter on the reverse (RIC 8-9), this coin "proclaimed the main motives for Galba's support of Vindex's revolt – the role of the senate in the restoration of constitutional freedom, and the happy outcome of the movement which would lead to a reborn Rome" (RIC I, p. 198).

Trajan's restoration aurei are distinct from the denarii of that series not only for their denomination but because they restore coin types of quite different periods that overlap only during the late Republic and the principate of Augustus. While the 50 recorded types of denarii replicate issues from the early Republic through the reign of Augustus, the 28 known types of aurei restore issues of rulers from Julius Caesar through Nerva. Due to their different ranges of coverage, the aurei consist mainly of portrait types, whereas the denarii usually bear portraits of deities.

Just one reverse type – Libertas standing – was used for Galba; however, there are two variants of the obverse, with the inscription GALBA IMPERATOR being arranged differently in each case. The style of Galba's laureate bust is extraordinary, in keeping with the exceptionally high standards applied to every issue in the series. This shows that some of the mint's most gifted and experienced engravers were given the task of engraving dies for the series. That, alone, demonstrates that the series was somewhat of a priority in A.D. 112/3, when these coins are believed to have been struck. Though no evidence survives describing who was responsible for creating this series, it is tempting to believe it was Trajan himself, for it would have been yet another impressive domestic project for him to undertake prior to his departure on the Parthian campaign of 114-116.

Each of Romes emperors (except Otho, whose lineage was not particularly distinguished) had celebrated their ancestors as a means of buoying their own legitimacy. Augustus made the most of his relationship with Julius Caesar, Tiberius did likewise with Augustus and Livia, Caligula and Claudius honored the many nobles from whom they were descended, and Nero initially trumpeted Agrippina and Claudius. Even Galba – the first non-Julio-Claudian emperor – trumpeted his close ties to the deified Livia. On this rare aureus, the newest emperor Vitellius acts likewise: he celebrates his illustrious father, Lucius Vitellius, who, as the reverse inscription indicates, was Censor and held the Consulship three times. Vitellius' father was undoubtedly the most important politician of his age. He was a shameless flatterer who would avert his eyes and prostrate himself in the presence of emperors and empresses; we are told he would even kiss the feet of Claudius' third wife Messallina. He was pragmatic in his dealings with Tiberius: not only did he 'provide his son (the future emperor Vitellius) to Tiberius as one of his male prostitutes during his final years on Capri, but also he was skilful enough to survive the reign of Caligula. Under Claudius – who was perpetually at odds with the senate – Lucius reached the zenith of his career, running the government while Claudius was leading an invasion of Britain. After an illustrious, if not prideful, career, Lucius Vitellius probably died late in the reign of Claudius or early in the reign of Nero, long before the most famous of his four sons became emperor.

Trajan's restoration coins have been appreciated as much for their rarity and historical interest as for the proof they offer that the Romans occasionally studied their coins as objects of independent interest. As a series, these coins represent a nostalgic and truly numismatic indulgence on the part of the emperor and his officials at the Rome mint.

The traditional view put forth by Mattingly, Sydenham, Sutherland, Hill, Carson and others placed the series in 107 (or soon afterward) in relation to the mass-withdrawal of obsolete coins from circulation that is described by Dio Cassius (lxviii.15). However, Kent was less than convinced when in 1990 he wrote that the series "...has been associated with a supposed recall of old coinage in 107, but the connection is far from clear." In recent years Trajan's coinage has undergone a particularly intensive study, and researchers, including Komnick, Beckmann and Woytek, prefer to date the restorations to c.112/3.

The restored types range from denarii of the early years of Republic down to aurei of Trajan's predecessor, Nerva, and thus cover a period of about three centuries. Trajan issued the Republican restorations as denarii, and the imperial types as aurei, with some overlapping in the issues of the imperatorial period. Most are relatively faithful copies of known coin types, whereas some are inexplicably modified from the originals and others are outright inventions.

Among the seven emperors honoured with restorations were Vespasian and his eldest son Titus. Vespasian was accorded one reverse type for his lifetime-issue restorations and two for his divus issues; Titus received one type each for his lifetime and divus coinages. In both cases their lifetime issues have trophies as a reverse type and each also has a divus issue showing a winged thunderbolt on a draped throne.

The selection of a trophy of arms and armour for their lifetime issues clearly shows that in Trajan's era the first two Flavian emperors were remembered most fondly for their leading roles in the Roman victory in the Jewish War of 66-70. It is peculiar, however, that Vespasian's issue shows a bound Jewish captive crouching at the base of the trophy (for that composition is clearly derived from Titus' aurei and denarii of 79) and that Titus' show merely the trophy (for this must have been taken from his father's rare DE IVDAEIS aurei of 71-72 or – even more likely – it was a modified version of Titus' aforementioned issues of 79).

Coinage in the name of Domitilla has long been a source of confusion, for the denarii and aurei bear portraits with the designation DIVA, and the sestertii, which are dated to the sole reign of Titus, have no portrait and no indication that the lady they honour was deified. The obvious conclusion is that they are separate coinages that presumably honour different women. Fortunately two candidates are known, Vespasians' wife Flavia Domitilla and their daughter, who bore the same name.

Both women died before Vespasian became emperor in 69, an appropriate circumstance for the memorial in nature of these coinages. Titus' sestertii for his mother, the elder Domitilla, are inscribed MEMORIAE DOMITILLAE SPQR and show a carpentum drawn by mules. Metrological study by Carradice has shown that the aurei and denarii of the deified Domitilla were struck by Domitian sometime after his monetary reform of 82. This conclusion is reinforced by their portraits, which incorporate the features of Domitian (as can clearly be observed on the coin offered here).

Despite having died before her family came to rule the empire, the younger Domitilla had at least one daughter who, rather inconveniently, bore the same name as her mother and grandmother, and who is thus called Domitilla III. This young woman eventually married Flavius Clemens, a grandson of Vespasians' brother Flavius Sabinus. The royal couple had several children of their own, though coins were struck for only one of them, the unfortunate Vespasian Junior, who eventually was murdered by Domitian

Historians disagree about the date of Marciana's death: some place it in 105, the year that she and Plotina jointly took the title of Augusta, while others suggest a date as late as 112 or 114. One of the two later dates seems more likely. This posthumous coinage does represent a novelty in Roman numismatics, for the word consecratio first appears here, and thereafter was employed frequently for posthumous coinages. Following Marciana's death, her daughter Matidia was raised to the rank of Augusta, and coinage was struck in her name in addition to that already being struck in the name of Trajan's wife, Plotina.

Authorities disagree about the identification of the figure who steps through the circle, which, like the phoenix, is symbolic of eternity. Mattingly and Sydenham, in RIC, described him as Hadrian, representing "the spirit of the Golden Age" - a conclusion they seem to have drawn from Cohen, who suggested the figure might be Hadrian with the attributes of Eternity. Seth Stevenson thought he might be the Genius of the Senate. Mattingly's view in BMCRE (published a decade after his original opinion in RIC) that it is the Genius of the Golden Age is accepted by Hill, who attributes the type to the start of A.D. 121. However, perhaps due to wear on the specimens he examined, Mattingly did not notice the signs of the zodiac that are clear on our coin. This detail - which is not mentioned in either RIC or BMCRE - securely attributes the figure as Aion, a deity associated with cyclical time or eternity, and who represents the Saeculum. Here he is shown walking through the cosmos, represented by the wheel decorated with the signs of the zodiac, exactly as he is depicted on the large silver Parabiago patera found near Milan in 1907, and on mosaics from both Sentinum and Hippo Regius. No less remarkable than the type is the quality of its engraving. The artist responsible for this reverse die was extraordinarily gifted, for he created a significant depth of field within a relatively low pane of relief. Much consideration was given to the circle, which takes on an oval shape since it has been foreshortened in perspective, with its interior visible on the right and its exterior, with the zodiacal symbols, visible on the left. More remarkable, though, is the figure of Aion himself: the engraver has imbued this figure with a sense of confidence as he steps on to the bottom of the circle and hangs on the top rim with his right hand. All of these aspects create the effect that he is casually passing through a celestial portal into a new age of prosperity. Though many claims made by emperors on their coinage contain no element of truth or reality, Hadrian's boastful claim on this aureus of the dawning of a 'Golden Age' (Saeculum Aureum) was more than mere rhetoric. With the luxury of hindsight, historians have long recognised that by Hadrian's reign the empire had entered the peak age of its existence. Mattingly, in BMCRE, comments on this issue: "A type of exceptional interest shows a youthful genius stepping out of an oval frame—the round of the years, perhaps—holding in his hand the sign of unending succession, the phoenix on a globe. He is, as the legend [tells] us, the 'Golden Age'." He notes that in using a phoenix Hadrian links his new 'Golden Age' with the earlier one under Trajan; this is a valid observation since coins that Hadrian had just recently issued for Trajan's deification use a phoenix as a reverse type. This aureus clearly is related to Hadrian's celebration of the Parilia (Romaia), the festival of Rome's birthday, which he renamed Natalis Urbis. We may presume this aureus was struck in A.D. 121, not only because of the events staged by Hadrian in that year, but also because a related type that honours the 874th birthday of Rome (see lot 217 below) actually bears the date of April 21, A.D. 121. Aleius Aristides reports that some years afterward the ceremonies for Rome's birthday were held at the tempulum Urbis, which Hadrian had begun to construct in this same year, 121.

This beautiful aureus is related to the very important series of commemorative issues that the mint at Rome struck during the latter part of Hadrian's reign, and which fall into three classes or categories: 1) a series of coins commemorating the visit or arrival (adventus) of the emperor to each province; 2) another series which commemorates the restoration (restitutor) of the province by the emperor; and 3) an additional series which commemorates the military strength (exercitus) of province, for those provinces which had legions stationed within them. In addition to these three categories of commemorative issues that are collectively known as Hadrian's 'travel' series, there are a further two related groups of coins. The first is quite extensive and simply commemorates the various provinces, with the provinces of Egypt, Africa, Hispania and Gallia being the most common. Then there is a much smaller issue which commemorates the emperor's final return (adventus) to Rome, after his subjugation of the Jewish zealots under Simon Bar Kochba led to the pacification of the province of Judaea, of which this coin is a particularly handsome specimen. After spending more than half his reign on the road, and especially after having just inflicted such a crushing defeat on the recalcitrant Jews, Hadrian's homecoming was a momentous occasion in the capital which was warmly welcomed by the citizens. The reverse shows the city of Rome personified as the goddess Roma, helmeted and draped in military attire, holding a spear and clasping the hand of the now elderly emperor who is depicted togate and holding a roll in the guise of a citizen, standing before her. The legend which appears on the obverse of this coin was only employed ca. A.D. 134-138. As Hadrian returned to Italy during A.D. 136 and died not two years later, this coin belongs to the very last issue of coinage struck at Rome during his principate.

Of all Rome's provinces, Spain was perhaps the most Romanized. It had been won by the Romans through centuries of contests with Carthaginians and local Celt-Iberians and it proved to be one of the empire's most useful possessions. Though Hadrian was born and raised in Rome, his father was a member of the Aelii, a Roman family which had prospered at Italica since the time of the Scipios, and his mother was from nearby Gades. The only evidence we have of Hadrian spending time at his family estates in Spain is in the year 90, just after he assumed his toga virilis. He spent less than a year there, during which he became involved in military training and no doubt continued to be tutored. Before the end of 90 Hadrian seems to have returned to Rome with the future emperor Trajan, who was preparing to assume the consulship on January 1, 91. When Hadrian's father had died five years before, Trajan was appointed one of his wards, for he was a first cousin once removed who also hailed from two noble families of Italica, the Ulpii and the Traii. We have no good details about Hadrian's brief stay in his ancestral homeland, but the fact that he did not visit Italica during his travels to Spain as emperor more than three decades later suggests that the young aristocrat considered his time in Italica uninspiring; indeed, while there we are told he indulged himself in hunting, perhaps to pass the boredom of provincial life.

The Nile and the Tiber were the two most important rivers in the Roman world. The Niles annual inundation allowed the farmlands along its banks to be fertilized anew every year – no minor concern to the Egyptians and the Romans who relied on Egyptian grain to feed their people. To Hadrian the river had further significance as the place where his lover AntinoŸs perished in 130, six years before this aureus was struck. We shall never know whether his drowning in the Nile waters was an accident or a ritual suicide to benefit the emperors failing health, but we can be sure the river had special meaning to Hadrian in his waning years.

The river-god is represented as a bearded man, nude to the waist, reclining against a sphinx, holding a cornucopia and a river-reed; a hippopotamus stands before him and a crocodile floats on the waters of the Nile below. At Tivoli Hadrian had statues of the Nile and the Tiber side-by-side to adorn the Canopus, the most famous attraction on the grounds of his villa. Hadrian was nostalgic and wanted to recreate memorable aspects of his travels – in this case the Canopus was a long pool imitating the canal that linked the cities of Alexandria and Canopus.

There is a great variety from die to die on these coins, and on some other examples Nilus rests upon an urn or a rock, the hippopotamus is replaced by two reeds or is accompanied by reeds; and on others there is no identifying inscription. The most elaborate versions occur on sestertii. The central design remains more or less the same as on the aurei, though children are added in most mischevious ways: climbing on the cornucopia, dancing in the background among reeds, and perhaps even picking fruit that flows from the mouth of the cornucopia. On at least one die the usually inanimate hippopotamus wanders toward Nilus, raising its snout toward his cornucopia, perhaps to nibble on some fruit.

There can be no doubt these images (on the sestertii, in particular) are copied from statuary, perhaps represented by a surviving copy now in the Vatican. That statue, which benefits from the scope of a massive sculpture, includes sixteen childlike figures of putti, symbolizing the number of cubits required to achieve the perfect annual flood level of the Nile. On one die used to strike sestertii there are four children, which Hill suggests in that case represent the four seasons rather than putti.

Aelius Caesar, formerly known as L. Ceionius Commodus (Aelius Spartianus recounts his life in Historia Augusta) was of Etruscan origin. He became consul in AD 136, having been adopted by Hadrian in the summer of that year. His appointment came as a general surprise: according to the gossip, Hadrian chose him for his beauty, or perhaps because he considered him a suitable caretaker who would make way for his own favourite, M. Annius Verus, just fifteen years old at the time. In the opinion of Carcopino, Aelius had been adopted because he was Hadrian's illegitimate child. A wan figure with delicate constitution, he suffered a heavy fall while making an address of thanks for Hadrian and died of an haemorrhage. The Historia Augusta (Vita Ael 7) tells us that "Hadrian had gigantic statues raised to Aelius Verus in all regions of the empire, temples too in some cities, and desired that Aelius' son Verus, who had remained within the imperial family after his father's death, be adopted as his grandson, by Antoninus Pius together with Marcus."

Beginning with Julius Caesar's expeditions of 55 and 54 B.C., the Romans had taken an interest in ruling Britain to levy taxes, acquire army recruits and slaves, and to gain access to a variety of raw materials and finished goods. The first true invasion occurred under the emperor Claudius, who annexed the island in A.D. 43. Aiding him was Vespasian, long before he became emperor. As a general, Vespasian led the second legion to capture more than 20 fortresses, including Maiden Castle in Dorset. Overall, Claudius' invasion was a limited affair, but far more substantial than the forays of Julius Caesar. From 58 to 60, Nero's governor of Britain, C. Suetonius Paulinus, extended Roman influence well into Wales, capturing the island of Anglesey in what Tacitus describes as a most brutal assault. Upon his success, though, he found himself in the midst of the terrifying response of Queen Boudicca in 60 or 61, which he was able to halt, and then punish with great severity. Under Flavian rule an outward push began, resulting not only in the conquest of Wales, but advancement deep into Scotland, notably by the general Agricola. Later still, perhaps in about A.D. 118, the ninth legion stationed at York seems to have suffered greatly at the hands of Britons. There is no consensus on what occurred, but the ninth is last recorded at York in 107/8. Since the orator Fronto discloses that many Roman soldiers perished in Britain during Hadrian's reign, and Hadrian took such a personal interest in Britain (including a visit in 122), we might presume the ninth was ambushed or endured a sustained attack. Q. Pompeius Falco, Hadrian's governor of Britain from 118 to 122 seems to have effectively waged war in response, and to have initiated the construction of Hadrian's Wall, a massive undertaking that began in about 122. Early in the reign of Antoninus Pius, hostilities arose yet again. Unlike Hadrian, who had pulled back the Roman frontier and fortified it, Pius instructed his newly appointed governor of Britannia, Q. Lollius Urbicus (138/9-c.144), to lead a re-conquest of Southern Scotland. Lollius seems to have led the Second Legion Augusta, auxiliary units and contingents from other legions against a variety of foes, which likely included factions of the northern Brigantes and the Scottish Votadini, Selgovae, Damnonii and Novantae. His success in the Scottish lowlands allowed for the construction of the Antonine Wall, a turf wall behind a deep ditch that linked nineteen forts between the Forth and the Clyde, and which defined the new frontier. The success of Lollius' campaigns is marked by coins struck in Rome at the end of 142 and the start of 143. Issues that seemingly allude to Roman victories in Britain (though without naming the province) depict Jupiter Stator, the emperor as Virtus, and Victory. This particular variety, which includes BRITAN in its inscription, is one of the rarer and more important types. A later coinage of Antoninus Pius also relates to Britain - copper asses dated to Pius' 18th tribunician renewal (A.D. 155) which show a subdued Britannia. Whether she is mourning or merely at rest cannot be determined, though our understanding would be greatly enhanced if the historical circumstances of the mid-150s were clear. It has been suggested that at this time another uprising occurred in Britain, with the Brigantes attacking fortifications along both walls, but current archaeological research does not appear to support the prospect. The manufacture of these asses is uncharacteristically crude for Rome mint issues of the era and they are rarely found outside of Britain, which has led to the suggestion that they were produced in Britain, even if from dies engraved elsewhere.

Although Antoninus Pius succeeded Hadrian as emperor of Rome, he truly was third or fourth down the line of preference. Hadrian's first choice as successor was the nobleman Aelius, who was hailed Caesar in 136, but who died unexpectedly after a year in office. Hadrian then determined he would pass the throne to Aelius' son Lucius Verus – then only seven years old – and to the 17-year-old Marcus Aurelius, who was a distant relative and a close companion. In truth the middleaged Antoninus Pius was merely a surrogate emperor in the eyes of Hadrian, and he remained truthful to his promise to act as guardian for Marcus Aurelius and Lucius Verus. Indeed, he was so faithful to the memory of Hadrian that he earned his surname "Pius" because he fought so diligently to convince the senate's to deify Hadrian. Over the years of his own principate, Antoninus Pius groomed both as his eventual successors, and thus continued the tradition of adoptive succession. He enjoyed a productive and mostly peaceful reign, and unlike Hadrian, who travelled extensively, Antoninus Pius never once left Italy in his twenty-two years on the throne. Unlike the great variety of Hadrian's coinage on which he celebrates his extensive travels, Antoninus' reverse types are localized, and on occasion they reflect the attention he paid to the betterment of Rome and Italy. This aureus is one of his more interesting types, as it bears the portrait of Antoninus Pius on the obverse and that of his elder heir Marcus Aurelius on the reverse.



Lucilla was the second of six daughters born to the emperor Marcus Aurelius and his wife Faustina II. She was a twin of Titus Aurelianus Antoninus, but he died within a year of their birth. When the emperor Antoninus Pius died in 161 and was succeeded by Lucilla's father and his co-heir Lucius Verus, Lucilla was betrothed to Verus in a gesture meant to tie the two emperors along family lines as well as by their collective Imperial duties. However, since she was just twelve years old, the marriage was delayed until 164, when Lucilla was fifteen or sixteen. At that time her prospective husband was in Asia Minor leading a campaign against the Parthians, so she sailed east and he took leave of campaign to marry her at Ephesus. The imperial couple had at least one child, but the fate of it or any others they may have had is unknown. After Verus' unexpected death in 169, Lucilla's personal life worsened. The young woman was next married to an elderly senator and she engaged in frequent infidelities. A decade later Lucilla was involved in the plot to assassinate her only surviving brother Commodus, who had become unstable and despotic as emperor. However, her role was discovered in the plot before it came to fruition, and in 182 or 183 she was banished to Capri where she subsequently was executed

A self-made man who rose to prominence through dedication and talent, Pertinax's career was illustrious. His father was a former slave and merchant whose wealth bought Pertinax a good education. Pertinax began his adult life as a teacher, but afterwards he embarked on a military career. He rose through the ranks serving in Parthia, Britain and Noricum, and he subsequently served as governor of several provinces. In 189 the emperor Commodus appointed him prefect of Rome, and he was still serving in that capacity when Commodus was assassinated on New Year's Eve, 192. Though Pertinax has often been portrayed as an unimpeachable moralist, he was more likely an opportunist who was intimately involved in the plot against Commodus. After his accession, Pertinax may have viewed himself as a benevolent dictator, but the praetorians nonetheless murdered him after a reign of just eighty-six days.

Certainly among the most famous Roman coin types, this issue occurs only as an aureus. With the exception of a possibly unique aureus of c. 209 that depicts the confronted heads of Septimius Severus and Julia Domna on the obverse, and the confronted heads of Caracalla and Geta on the reverse, this is the only Severan dynastic coin that depicts all four members of the imperial family. More importantly, though, it is the first instance in Imperial coinage where the principal type includes a facing bust. The specific positioning of the three heads on the reverse – mother facing between the confronted heads of her sons – brings to mind a heated piece of advice Julia Domna gave to her quarrelsome sons about a decade after this aureus was struck: "You may divide the empire, but you cannot divide your mother!".



From the outset of his reign, Philip I displayed a general gift of incompetence. He clearly was skilled enough to climb the ranks and then to treacherously eliminate the prefect Timesitheus and the emperor Gordian III, but once he had no peer to overcome it was clear that he did not have the talent to rule. Philips first mistake was to make peace with the Sasanians on terms which were not only disgraceful to the army, but expensive. Zosimus (I, 20, 2) tells us this was the spark for the revolt of Jotapian among the Syrian legions. Philip had to pay a severe ransom to the Persians in exchange for Roman captives, while also having to absorb the expense of building his home town of Philippopolis in Arabia from the ground-up and staging lavish games for the millenary celebration in Rome. Another mistake was entrusting the administration of the East to his brother Priscus, who ruled harshly and increased taxation beyond what could be sustained. These circumstances brought forth Jotapian, an army commander who Aurelius Victor says was related to Severus Alexander, and who may in fact have been a descendant of the royal house of Commagene. Jotapian was proclaimed emperor by his soldiers and for several months may have controlled a vast area, for Polemius Sylvius places the revolt in Cappadocia and Victor describes it as having started in Syria (which, if true, could only include the northern part, for he did not strike coins at Antioch). Opinions on when the uprising began vary, with the conventional view being the summer of 248. But much light was shed on the subject by Roger Bland in a 1993 study, in which he suggests the revolt did not occur until the fall of 249. More importantly still, Bland produced convincing evidence that Jotapians coins were struck at Nicopolis, a city located about 100 miles north of Antioch, quite near the former kingdom of Commagene. Bland catalogued only double-denarii for Jotapian, but since his study was published a piece of double-denarius weight but with a laureate bust has surfaced (CNG 61, lot 2027), allowing for the possibility, at least, that Jotapian coined aurei or intended to do so.

If we believe the ancient sources, Salonina was the equal of Agrippina Senior or Faustina Junior for her intrepid spirit and her support of the army; indeed, she was hailed Mater Castrorum ('mother of the camp') early in the reign of her husband Gallienus. Many other virtues are attributed to her, generally in an attempt to contrast her dutiful qualities with those of her husband. However, we must remember that Gallienus was unfairly maligned by hostile literary sources from the senatorial class, for whom Gallienus had no sympathy in these troubled times. Both Salonina and Gallienus were patrons of the arts, and were great supporters of Plotinus, the Neoplatonist philosopher of the mid-3rd Century. We have no reason to doubt that she indulged in the flamboyant lifestyle of her husband, for on certain provincial coins, notably from Ionia and Lydia, she is accorded the unusual title Crysogone, meaning "Golden Born" or "Begotten of Gold". Salonina married Gallienus in about 240, and by him had three children, all of whom are represented on the reverse of this aureus. Because the main figure, representing Salonina, is not veiled, we should presume that the piety she expresses is to her family, not the gods. Two of these children, Valerian II and Saloninus, held imperial rank under their father, but both died tragically before their parents - the former while on campaign with his father in Illyricum, and the latter by execution in Gaul during the rebellion of Postumus. Contradictory information survives about the third child on the reverse, who may have been a three-year-old boy named Licinius Egnatius Marinianus or a daughter named Licinia Galliena. This child perished in September, 268 or shortly thereafter, in the purge of Gallienus' partisans; dying with this child were Gallienus's brother and his youngest child Marinianus, who was consul in 268.



Marcus Cassius Latinius Postumus, usurper of imperial power in the third century and one of the group known as the "thirty tyrants", is portrayed in a favourable light by Trebellius Pollio in the Historia Augusta, where the historian even attempts to free him of all responsibility for the death of Augustus Saloninus. This is how Pollio recounts the story: "He was valiant in war, fair in times of peace and serious in all situations in life. Thus, when Gallienus sent his son Saloninus to Gallia, believing in these qualities, he entrusted him to Postumus in the belief that the latter would guard his life and watch over his every action and behaviour. According to the majority, he did not keep his word and subsequently had Saloninus killed in order to seize power for himself." However, this behaviour is not in keeping with Postumus' character and as such, the following version of events is more likely: The Gauls, who hated Gallienus and could not bear to be ruled by a child, had Saloninus killed by soldiers so that they could declare the emperor regent to be a fully-fledged emperor. What is known, however, is that whilst Gallienus spent his time in taverns and engaged in revelry, aged beyond his years through his love for a barbarian woman, Postumus, when he had been elected by the troops and citizens, spent seven years dedicating himself to improving conditions in Gallia. Postumus actually governed Gallia for ten years, not seven, as the coins which were issued at the time testify and as Eutropius (IX 10) also confirms. Once he had become emperor (sometime between 258 and 260), Postumus successfully defended the empire's eastern borders. His victory over Laelianus' rebels at Magotiacum proved fatal for him, and Postumus was assassinated by his own soldiers 'due to his excessive strictness' (also confirmed by Pollio), in that he refused to allow them to sack the city.

Severus II certainly ranks among the least fortunate of the rulers of the Tetrarchic period. When Diocletian and Maximian abdicated their thrones in 305, their loyal Caesars, Constantius I and Galerius, assumed the vacant titles of Augustus, and in turn selected replacement Caesars. For himself Galerius chose his nephew Maximinus Daia, and for Constantius I he chose his old comrade-in-arms Severus II (though Constantius was Senior Augustus, the true power was held by Galerius, who had the ear of Diocletian). Passed over in all of this was Maxentius, son of the just-retired emperor Maximian. Incensed at the turn of events, Maxentius revolted in Rome, first declaring himself Princeps and Caesar, and soon thereafter Augustus. Since the affected areas of Italy and North Africa were in the territory of Severus II, the grim task of marching on Rome and overthrowing Maxentius landed squarely on his shoulders. It might have seemed an easy task – the rebel had a small, ill-trained army – but that was before Maxentius lured his father out of unwanted retirement. Most of the soldiers Severus II was leading had served under Maximian, and through liberal bribes and crafty politicking Maximian turned the tide against Severus II, who fled north and eventually surrendered on the condition that his life would be spared. Father and son rebels were true to their promise until Galerius himself invaded Italy to finish the job, at which point they executed Severus II, and managed to expel Galerius from Italy.

This rare and impressive aureus belongs to a period when relations between the rebel Maxentius in Rome and his supporters in Carthage were still strong. Maxentius was in a difficult position from the outset of his rebellion for he was headquartered in Rome, an enormous city with a population that was largely dependent on government subsidies for their day-to-day survival and entertainment. This meant Maxentius had to generate large sums of money for rent subidies, chariot races and dozens of annual festivals, all the while assuring enough grain came into Ostia to prevent starvation of the masses. Here Maxentius celebrates what was perhaps the greatest asset in his empire, for his allies in North Africa provided tax revenues and a bounty of grain each year, all at a minimal cost, for Maxentius had only a skeletal army stationed there. The cooperation between Rome and Carthage lasted for eighteen to twenty-four months before Maxentius turned his wrath upon the people of Carthage, demanding more tax money and grain to subsidize his fragile regime in Italy. These unreasonable demands caused the Carthaginians to stage a counter-rebellion against Maxentius in the summer of 308. It was led by a certain Alexander and probably was inspired or supported by Constantine, who had much to gain as a result. They denied Maxentius all grain and money, nearly causing his regime to topple in the winter of 308/309. Starving Romans rioted in the capital and Maxentius responded by sending out the praetorian guardsmen, who killed about six thousand of the rioters. Maxentius responded with an expedition against Carthage late in 309 or early in 310. This was no simple task since his regime already was unstable, it required valuable naval resources, and he still had to protect himself from possible invasions by Galerius or Constantine. Maxentius entrusted the campaign to his praetorian prefect Rufius Volusianus, who captured and killed Alexander, and then ravaged North Africa, confiscating a vast amount of wealth which he brought back to Rome in triumph.

This aureus of Licinius represents an impressive attempt to capture the spirit of the emperor as an individual, not merely as a universal being. Four important issues of gold with facing busts were produced from c. 310 to c. 321. The first was by Maxentius on aurei of c. 310-312, and the second by Constantine on solidi of 316; the former was shown Bare headed and bearded, in the guise of a model Tetrarch, the latter was shown nimbate and clean-shaven, as a reflection of his unique brand of monotheism, which embraced solar worship and the Christian faith. Similarities in the style of the two issues make it possible that both were the work of the same artist, who initially worked for Maxentius, and who remained in Italy after Constantine's takeover and produced a facing-head for his new master. Following these two coinages are the solidi of c. 321 struck for Licinius I and Licinius II, and we should not doubt that they were inspired by one or both of the predecessor issues. The Licinian solidi mark a special event, the taking of imperial vows. The statue of Jupiter in this specimen rests upon a monumental base inscribed SIC V SIX X and clearly alludes to the quinquennalia (fifth anniversary) of Licinius II. Equally worthy of comment is the reverse type, on which Jupiter makes one of his last appearances on Roman coinage. This can be seen as evidence of the simmering hostilities between Constantine and Licinius II father's Licinius I, who not only were co-emperors, but were brothers-in-law. Their rivalry increasingly took on a religious tone, with Constantine now favouring Christianity and Licinius I embracing the supreme pagan god - partly because of his own beliefs, partly in opposition to Constantine. Licinius I had initially adopted religious ambiguity in 313 as a token of good faith toward Constantine, who early in that year had issued the 'Edict of Milan' in both of their names. Here that position is rejected: the inscription describes Jupiter as the protector of Licinius, and the god is represented by an especially powerful and ancient image, seemingly derived from Phidias' famous gold and ivory statue in the Temple of Zeus at Olympia.

An interesting collection of coins of Julian II (the Philosopher) and the Festival of Isis

The emperor Julian II, known as the Philosopher or the Apostate, was born in 332 to Julius Constantius, a half-brother of Constantine the Great, and his second wife, Basilina, daughter of Licinius' Praetorian Prefect, Julius Julianus. Upon Constantine's death in 337 and subsequent division of the Empire by his three sons, Julian's father, uncle, and other male relatives were massacred in order to secure the thrones of the co-emperors. Precisely who instigated this purge has never been satisfactorily determined; however, once in open revolt from Constantius II, Julian baldly charged Constantius with the murders (Julian, Ep. Ad Ath. 270D, and Caesares 336B). After the purge, Constantius foresaw possible uses for both Julian and his elder half-brother, Constantius Gallus, and secluded them in the remote fortress of Macellum in Cappadocia, providing them both with pious instruction. Julian found these studies not to his temperament, but he did acquire a passion for the old gods from his tutor, Mardonius, and from him and other tutors studiously received instruction in philosophy and the classics. Later, in 351, Julian was sent first to Ephesus, then Athens, where he was able to further his pagan studies. In 355 Constantius summoned him to the West and proclaimed him Caesar, giving him command over the dioceses of Britannia and Gaul.

In Gaul, the Rhine frontier had been overrun by tribes of the Alemanni and the Franks, and their frequent incursions had caused significant destabilization to the region. Although having no previous command experience, Julian earned the adoration of his troops by sharing their hardships and then leading them to a decisive victory over the Alemanni at Argentoratum. Hearing of Julian's popularity with the troops in Gaul due to his astounding success, Constantius became jealous of his underling and commanded that he send troops to the East. While Julian obediently agreed to fulfill Constantius' request, his troops refused to go. Instead, in February 360 they mutined, proclaiming Julian as Augustus. While Julian made repeated overtures to negotiate a compromise with Constantius, the emperor refused any such division of authority, thereby dashing any hope of reconciliation. This left Julian in the unfortunate position of having to lead his troops in open revolt against the rightful emperor. Before Julian even reached Constantinople, however, Constantius fell gravely ill, dying at Mopsucrenae in Cilicia. On his death-bed, seeing the futility of an unnecessary civil war, the infirm emperor nominated Julian as his successor.

Shortly after becoming emperor, probably in early January 361, Julian renounced his Christian upbringing and openly professed his paganism. Although he did not actively persecute the Christian population, he did actively promote paganism by restoring temple lands that had been confiscated, and he transferred the imperial subsidies and immunities that had benefitted the early Church and Christian clergy to the pagan high priesthood which he established throughout the provinces. While this revival of paganism was welcomed by many in the Empire, the Christian intelligentsia denounced Julian as apostate, and certain communities in the eastern provinces, notably Antioch, openly mocked him.

In the early summer of 362, Julian moved his court from Constantinople to Antioch in preparation for a military campaign against the Sasanid Empire of Persia. Although it is likely that peace with the Persians could have been maintained, Julian felt it necessary to impose a definitive solution to the heightened military tensions that had existed between the two empires for the past several decades, and invaded in early March 363. Over the course of the campaign Julian was unable to capture any major Persian city, nor was he successful in bringing about a decisive engagement with the Persian army, which was the only means of victory. Shortly into the campaign during a sudden Persian counterattack, Julian received a fatal spear thrust to the neck, either from an enemy combatant or, perhaps as was rumored, from a Christian soldier under his command, and succumbed to his wounds later that evening. The army then elevated to the throne Julian's comes domesticorum, Jovian, who negotiated a disgraceful treaty with the Sasanids and marched the army home.

Julian's main coinage provides only a limited reflection of his pagan faith. His coinage before Constantius' death follows normal patterns and presents little of interest. The principle solidus type issued during his reign shows a solder holding a trophy over his shoulder and placing his hand on the head of a captive, with the legend celebrating the virtue of the military (VIRTVS EXERCITVM) in various manifestations. The types on the silver show a bit more variety, but again they are standard fare with little innovation from the types employed during the reign of Constantius II. The principal innovation in Julian's coinage occurs with his billon and bronze issues. He introduced a large billon coin (£1) depicting a bull on the reverse, and his smaller bronze issues (£3) with a votive reverse show him in full military attire, wearing a helmet and cuirass, and holding a spear and shield, facing to the left. Both of these issues depict Julian heavily bearded, an outward sign of his philosophical and pagan leanings. The bull of the larger £1 is enigmatic and has been the subject of much debate, with interpretations of its significance as the Apis bull which was discovered in late 362 (Amm. 22.14.6), a sacrificial animal, Julian's presumptive natal sign (Taurus), or a symbol of the emperor as guardian of his people. According to Kent, only the last two suggestions are of any plausibility (cf. RIC VIII pp. 46-7).

In addition to Julian's main coinage, he also struck a variety of medallions and other issues of a ceremonial function, including so-called Festival of Isis coins as well as contorniate medallions. This collection offers a number of Festival of Isis issues, all remarkable for their extreme rarity. However, it should be noted that with the exception of one coin depicting the bearded portrait of Julian as Augustus, none can be positively attributed to the reign of Julian as they were struck throughout most of the 4th century, from the reign of Diocletian until the reign of Valentinian II. In addition to these interesting rarities, the collection includes a number of contemporary imitations of Julian's types, perhaps minted with official approval to make up for a shortage of coinage in commerce, especially in Spain in the far western part of the Empire.

The reverse of this interesting Festival of Isis of Julian II medallion shows the husband-wife siblings Serapis and Isis with serpentine bodies, holding between them a large, sacred vase from which emerges a uraeus-snake. The snake is clearly flat-headed, which suggests that it is a cobra, an extremely venomous serpent native to Egypt and which was closely associated with the goddess as amongst all beings only she held the antidote to its venom. The serpentine bodies of the two gods are an unusual feature, but should be construed as dually representing both their chthonic, or underworld, natures, as well as their roles in guaranteeing bountiful harvests. Isis is frequently represented in classical art in the company of serpents (see, e.g., the frescos from Pompeii in the Museo Archeologico Nazionale di Napoli, inv. nos. 8929 and 9558, the latter of which shows Isis holding a cobra with its body entwined around her forearm), and although we lack specific knowledge of the rituals associated with Isiaic worship – our only account of them is the fictitious work, Metamorphoses (or The Golden Ass), by the second century AD author Apuleius – they had to do with death and rebirth, and are putatively related to the Christian concept of ascension. Interestingly, many scholars have also noted the syncretistic nature of the frequently seen image of Isis nursing Horus to that of the Virgin Mary holding the infant Christ.

Of further interest is the small eagle inset in an oval behind the head of Julian on the obverse, which shows that this medallion was at one time in the collection of the Gonzaga family of Mantua in Italy. The collection was first formed under the guidance of Isabella d'Este (1474-1539), a humanist and trendsetter of the times who was deeply committed to the arts and had been educated in the classics – and, very interestingly, has recently been identified as a plausible candidate for Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa (see Frank Zöllner, Leonardo da Vinci – Sämtliche Werke, 2007, p. 241) – and was further built upon by her descendants. The mark was applied to all of the coins in the collection by the early 17th century, usually in silver for gold coins, and in gold for silver and bronze. Although some or all of the coin collection may have been sold to pay off family debts, whatever remained was certainly looted in 1630 during the sack of Mantua by imperial Landsknecht forces who pillaged the city over the course of three days. Afterwards, coins from the collection appeared in all of the major coin cabinets of Europe. Although they are rare, coins with the Gonzaga mark still occasionally come up for sale on the coin markets of today, and conveniently provide proof of a pedigree to the early 1600s at the latest if not to the original collection formed by Isabella d'Este herself.

Evidence for the worship of the Egyptian goddess Isis is very ancient, indeed extending all the way back to the 5th Dynasty (2494-2345 BC) during the Old Kingdom. She was the first daughter of Geb and Nut, the gods of the earth and sky respectively, and always held a high position in the Egyptian pantheon. As the sister-wife of Osiris, she resurrected him after he had been murdered and his body cut into pieces by his brother, Set. Much later, under Ptolemy I, her cult and that of Osiris, now assimilated with the god Apis as Serapis, were fostered as the state religion in an effort to assimilate the Greek and native Egyptian peoples of his kingdom. Over the course of the succeeding centuries, Isis' worship spread throughout the Mediterranean region, and her temples, called Iseums, are found all over the classical world, even as far away as Roman Britain.

The Roman emperor Caligula was the first to institute the festival celebrating the arrival at Rome of the *Navigium Isidis*, or Ship of Isis, which occurred annually on March 5. Beginning in the early fourth century under Diocletian and his colleagues, and continuing annually for about 80 years or so into the reign of Valentinian II, small medallions commemorating the festival which celebrated the goddess were struck at the mint of Rome. The types depict Isis in her guises as the protector of harvests and the patroness of sailors, as well as other members of the Graeco-Egyptian pantheon, Osiris, Horus, Anubis, Harpocrates and Nilus. They fall into two categories, 'anonymous' and 'imperial portrait' issues, and often share reverse types. Virtually all known examples of Festival of Isis medallions are made of brass, although one silver example of Julian II is known. It is not known if they were distributed during the actual festival on March 5, or perhaps earlier on January 3 when the emperors celebrated the imperial vows: the standard reverse legend is VOTA PVBLICA which suggests the January date.

The Festival of Isis medallions were only ever struck in small quantities and are all quite rare today. Specimens often show considerable wear and were frequently pierced in ancient times, which indicates that were sometimes kept for years as keepsakes and often served as amulets which were worn by their owners. In light of this, it is perhaps most remarkable the overall quality of the small collection of Festival of Isis pieces offered here, with many showing only minimal wear or other problems.

Like her husband, the emperor Theodosius, Aelia Flaccilla was born to a good family in Spain, and when she married in about 376 it may never have occurred to her that Theodosius' career would draw her far from her homeland. After a year or less of marriage Flaccilla gave birth to her first son, Arcadius, and about six years later (long after she had moved to Constantinopolis and been hailed Augusta) to her second son, Honorius. Throughout her life – even as an empress – she bore a reputation for her piety and her generosity to the poor. Her coins were the first struck for an empress since the 330s and they reinstated the practice, which soon took an especially firm hold in the East. On her coins it is easy to see the iconographic connection to earlier issues of Fausta, Helena and Theodora, and to observe how they influenced future empress coinages. Additionally, her name Aelia, which is abbreviated AEL on her coin inscriptions, apparently was assumed to have been part of her title, for it was adopted as a title by later Augustae.

History records little of Eugenius, a professor of Latin and rhetoric who gave up teaching to occupy the throne of the Western Roman Empire for two years and a few days. The very fact that he was not qualified to be emperor made him the perfect candidate, for the Frankish general Arbogast wanted him as a puppet. It was a perfect follow-up to his murder of Valentinian II - the young Western emperor whom Theodosius had entrusted to Arbogast's regency. Afterwards the throne remained vacant for three months as Arbogast sought a replacement. Although only Theodosius I, the senior reigning emperor in the East, had the constitutional right to appoint the next emperor in the west, this did not deter Arbogast, who was firmly in control of the West. The elevation of Eugenius was of value to Arbogast on some level, for the old professor was not prone to religious fanaticism, and (as his bearded effigy attests) he was tolerant of pagans. When the army backing Eugenius seized Italy in 393, Theodosius responded with a campaign of his own, and routed them in September, 394. In the aftermath Eugenius was executed and the former Master of Infantry, Arbogast, was driven to flight and soon took his own life. During the six months between the defeat of Eugenius and Theodosius' natural death in January of 395, he remained in Milan and from there ruled over a united empire. Unity occured on only two occasions after the empire had been divided by Valentinian I and Valens in 364, both of which were equally brief and transient. With the death of Theodosius the temporary unity of east and west ceased, and the empires entered a period of great unrest under his two incompetent sons, Arcadius and Honorius, who promptly divided the empire between themselves.

Constantine III, a general of obscure origins but considerable talent, was proclaimed emperor in Britain in 407 by his soldiers following the assassinations of the usurpers Marcus and Gratianus (neither of whom issued coins). He led his troops across the Channel into Gaul, where his authority was swiftly accepted locally, but was opposed by the reigning Western emperor Honorius, who sent his general Sarus from Italy to harass his defences. After initial setbacks, Constantine gained the upper hand and occupied all of Gaul up to the Alps, establishing his base at Arles. At its greatest extent, the territories controlled by Constantine included all of Western Europe, from Britain in the North and Spain in the South. Soon, however, his grip began to loosen. First Britain rose in revolt, and then Gerontius, Constantine's own magister militum, whom he had sent to Spain to quell another revolt, ended up turning against him. His fate was sealed in 411 when Honorius sent a general by the name of Constantius (the future emperor Constantius III) to defeat him. Although he had taken refuge in a church and was ordained before surrendering, the former rebel was murdered in captivity and his head sent to Ravenna where it was exhibited for some time.

Like many of Romes emperors, Avitus was hailed Augustus outside of Italy. In his case the location was the provincial capital of Arles, and the circumstances were grim. In September, 454 the emperor Valentinian III murdered his magister militum A'tius, which was repaid by his own murder six months later. Valentinian was replaced by Petronius Maximus, a usurper whose tyranny invited an invasion of Italy by the Vandals, who sacked Rome on June 1.

The void in the summer of 455 was considerable: there was no emperor in the West, and every portable item of value in the capital (including royal hostages) had been carted away by the Vandals. It was at this moment that Avitus courageously became emperor of the West. He did so with the support of the Visigothic king Theoderic II, but he only received the consent of the Eastern emperor Marcian later in the year, when he had made his way to Italy.

Avitus had strong connections with the Visigothic court at Tolouse, for whom he was serving as an imperial envoy. He also had extensive experience in government and had acquired military experience under Avitus, one of the most accomplished soldiers of his age.

Without Avitus to lead the western armies and fleets, Avitus found a new magister militum in Ricimer, who in 456 scored a major victory against the Vandals off the coast of Corsica. The talent of the new commander was a double-edged sword, for Ricimer became the most important man in the West for the next 16 years. Of more direct interest to Avitus was the fact that Ricimer soon deposed him and replaced him with a sequence of puppet emperors.

Local circumstances began to weigh against Avitus, including a famine in Rome and the loss of support from the Visigoths, who were occupied with a war against the Suevi in Spain. All the while, the popularity of Ricimer was on the rise because of his follow-up victory over the Vandals. Finally, on October 17, 456, Avitus was deposed by Ricimer, who made him bishop of Piacenza, an appointment he did not long survive.

This solidus was struck at the mint in Arles, which Avitus reopened using workers from Ravenna. Thus, it should not surprise us to see the mint signature of Arles (AR), but the style of Ravenna. Avitus strong ties with the Visigoths also resulted in a large production of imitations of his solidi and tremisses, which presumably were struck at Tolouse for distribution among the Visigoths.

As the wife of Leo I and the mother-in-law of his successor Zeno, Aelia Verina held the title of Augusta for nearly the last three decades of her life. We have relatively detailed accounts of her machinations from 474 onward, and considering all of the power plays being made at court during Leo's reign, we might presume she was deeply involved in the intrigues.

When her husband Leo I was ailing in 473, Verina helped arrange his adoption of their six-year-old grandson, Leo II, as successor rather than their son-in-law Zeno, a healthy man in his mid-30s with significant military experience. Despite his ideal qualifications, Zeno was not well liked, a feeling that Leo and Verina must have shared. The child Leo II was first raised to Caesar in October, 473, and finally to Augustus in January, 474, less than a month before his grandfather died.

The saga continued when the already fragile health of Leo II began to fail and it was necessary on February 9, 474, to have the boy proclaim his own father, Zeno, his co-emperor. When Leo II died in November, the cause of his demise must have been the fodder of palace gossip. Zeno was now sole emperor, and this displeased his mother-in-law Verina so much that she caused a false rumour to be spread of an impending palace coup, upon which she recommended that Zeno and Ariadne flee Constantinople for their own safety.

Verina now hoped to get her lover, the magister officorum Patricius, installed as emperor, but she met unexpected resistance in the senate which instead hailed emperor her brother Basiliscus. Thus, after her initial plot against her son-in-law, Verina now plotted against her brother, who responded by executing her lover Patricius. Once again, Roman history proves truth is stranger than fiction.

The old empress was forced into hiding as she worked for the return of Zeno as the lesser of two evils. Once Zeno recovered his throne from Basiliscus, Verina still devoted the rest of her life to undermining Zeno, which resulted in her exile to a fortress in the wilds of Isauria. Two of her counter-revolutionary efforts included backing a coup in 479 in the name of her other son-in-law, an ambitious young nobleman named Marcian, and her support of the rebellion of Leontius in 484.

Verina's coins are rare today, but the must have been issued in some quantity at the time. Her solidi, tremisses and £2s all bear her profile portrait, and she is also portrayed on some of Leo's smallest bronzes as a standing figure flanked by the letters bE, representing the Greek version of her name. Berina.

The date of the present solidus is not certainly known. Kent, Grierson and Mays all describe it as an issue under her husband's successor Zeno, with Kent suggesting it may have been struck in 462 or 466, two of the five occasions on which Leo I held the consulship.

By the time he was hailed emperor in 457, the nobleman Majorian had seen considerable experience in government and military affairs and, in fact, he had almost become emperor in 455 after the murder of Valentian III. By the standards of the time, Majorian was an uncommonly gifted and dutiful emperor, and we may attribute his downfall to a stroke of bad fortune. During the reign of the puppet emperor Avitus (455-456) Majorian began to cultivate an alliance with the Master of Soldiers Ricimer, and together they ousted him in 456. As they awaited approval from Constantinople for Majorian's appointment, the old emperor of the East Marcian died, at which point Ricimer did not hesitate to hail Majorian emperor of the West on April 1, 457, but he was not officially installed until December 28.

Majorian soon left Ravenna to campaign in Gaul against the Visigoths and Burgundians in 458 and 459. He then returned to Italy to take on the Vandals, who he first encountered in Campania in the form of a raiding party that he drove back out to sea. By 460 he had assembled a fleet of about 300 warships to sail against the Vandals, but the entire fleet was captured while in port in Spain, and Majorian had to make peace under humiliating terms. He returned to Italy in 461 to a dispirited public and a wary Ricimer, who turned against him. The dejected emperor was captured on August 2, 461, and five days later he was dead, either by execution, suicide or dysentery.

In 472 the West descended into a state of crisis, for two emperors and the emperor-making general Ricimer all died. Ricimer was seamlessly replaced by his nephew Gundobad, who kept the throne vacant for four months, until he appointed as emperor Glycerius, a man of no particular distinction who had been the last emperor's comes domesticorum. The Eastern emperor Leo I was enraged by this and sent an army to Italy to remove Glycerius, who had been appointed illegally. The expedition was led by Julius Nepos, the magister militum of Dalmatia, who captured Glycerius without a fight on June 19, 474. However, Nepos made the fatal error of sparing Glycerius' life and appointing him bishop of Salona, within his own family's fiefdom. During the course of Nepos' expedition Leo I died, and a struggle for power erupted in the East. Lacking any direction from Constantinople, Nepos claimed the western throne for himself, only to be overthrown about fourteen months later by his magister militum Orestes, who then hailed his own son Romulus Augustus emperor. Nepos fled to Dalmatia, where he continued to rule autonomously until 480, when he was murdered, seemingly at the instigation of Glycerius, who apparently had no gratitude for having been spared six years before. The coinage of Glycerius is quite rare: virtually none of his silver coins survive, and his gold coins seldom come to market. He struck solidi at Ravenna and Milan, and tremisses - the most popular denomination of gold in the West - at Rome, Ravenna, Milan. All of his solidi seem to have been struck in his own name, whereas he appears to have struck tremisses not only in his own name, but also in the name of the eastern emperor Leo. Both Kent and Lacam attribute this tremissis to Rome, though with some hesitation as the portrait style is considerably more compact and appealing than those on other tremisses attributed to Rome, which have a rough and unsophisticated style.

The last legitimate ruler of the Western Roman Empire was Julius Nepos, who remained the constitutional emperor in absentia from his base in Dalmatia. However, traditionally that honour has been incorrectly given to Romulus Augustus (sometimes surnamed Augustulus, "the little emperor"), who, after Nepos fled Italy, was hailed emperor as a figurehead of his father's army. His reign lasted just ten months before Germans under Odovacar withdrew their support and deposed both the young emperor and his father. The Germans allowed the former boy-emperor to live, and provided him with an ample pension so he could engage in an early retirement to an estate on the Gulf of Naples in Campania, where he is said to have lived for at least thirty more years.

A minor treasury official, and thus an unlikely candidate for the throne, Theodosius was elevated against his will by soldiers stationed at Rhodes, who were revolting against the burdensome rule of Anastasius II. After a six-month siege of Constantinople, Theodosius took the city in November, 715. His reign lasted just less than two years, and he abdicated in favour of Leo III, who had captured his son in Nicomedia. Both Theodosius and his son were permitted to retire to a monastery, and the former emperor subsequently became the bishop of Ephesus.

Late in the reign of the unfortunate and unpopular emperor Nicephorus I a contest was growing between the Romans and the Bulgars, then under the Khan Krum. Nicephorus had little option but to lead an army against them, scoring an impressive victory at Pliska. But he unwisely pursued the enemy into the wilds, where the Byzantine army was ambushed and much of it destroyed. Nicephorus was killed – the first emperor to suffer that fate in more than four centuries.

To make matters worse, the emperor's son and heir, Stauracius, had his spine severed in the battle, but he was carried to Adrianople, where he was hailed emperor in place of his father. He then returned to Constantinople where for months he suffered increasingly from his wound, until he realized he would soon pass. We are told that Stauracius resented the popularity of his brother-in-law, the master of the palace Michael I, who all presumed to be his successor. Apparently he tried to have Michael murdered on the pretence that he intended to introduce democracy to the Byzantine state. The plot failed and Stauracius resigned himself to his fate. He named his brother-in-law his successor and entered amonastery where he later died of his paralyzing wound. Soon after being crowned, Michael named his son Theophylactus co-emperor, for whom he tried to arrange a marriage to a daughter of the Frankish King Charlemagne. Their joint reign was brief and unsuccessful, for it seems that Michael was too great a humanitarian to succeed in that office, and he was not an experienced general.

The Bulgars intended to build upon their recent triumph, which caused Michael to meet Krum with a superior army, which he failed to use to his advantage: it is impossible to know if it was poor judgment or a lack of courage. After having lost the spirit of the moment, Michael reluctantly led his legions into battle at Versinikia, where he was abandoned by his Asian troops, who were loyal to their commander, the future emperor Leo V the Armenian.

Michael had suffered enough, and returned to Constantinople. During his absence the inevitable discussions took place among generals and common soldiers wintering at their encampment in Thrace. The army proclaimed Leo V, commander of the imperial army in Armenia, their candidate and marched on the capital. Michael offered no opposition despite it being the will of the people that he remained at the helm.

No harm came to Michael, who was deposed and sent into exile, where he survived for more than three decades. Michael's family was not so fortunate. His son Theophylactus was blinded before being exiled and his wife Procopia, whose forceful and insolent personality offended the soldiers, was separated from him. Under the skilled generalship of Leo V, the next Bulgar assault on Constantinople failed, not long after which a longstanding peace was made.

The extremely rare piece represents the first instance in which the Virgin is depicted on a Byzantine coin. It was struck at a time when almost no gold coinage was issued and was apparently ceremonial in nature (the vast majority of Leo's gold has in addition to his own name, that of his son, and thus it must have been struck between 908 and 912). Since gold was plentiful during the first twenty-two years of Leo's reign, it is curious that it was not coined. The most likely explanation is a law (Novel 52) passed during Leo's reign. He greatly disagreed with a previous edict, perhaps issued by Basil I, that demonetised a previous ruler's coinage. Leo felt that as long as a coin was of the proper weight and finesses then it should pass current at the same rate, and therefore he probably did not issue a gold coinage for several years. From a modern perspective it seems that this was somewhat irrelevant, as hoard evidence proves that attempts at demonetisation were generally ineffective, or only rarely were practised, as the gold hoards tend to be of a mixed nature.

The sequence and dating of solidi from the reigns of Constantine VII and Romanus I are far from certain. If an undoubted sequence could be determined, it would contribute much to our understanding of this complex period, in which there was a power struggle between a legitimate emperor and his ambitious general.

Since Constantine VII was two years old when elevated to the throne, and merely seven when he became sole emperor in 913, he was especially vulnerable to court intrigues. Among the opportunists was Romanus I, who rose to become the principal military figure in the empire. Romanus I arranged for his daughter, Helena, to marry the young emperor Constantine VII, allowing for his own rise: first he was made Basileopator in 919, then Caesar in September, 920, and finally co-emperor with his new son-in-law three months later, in December. Since Constantine VII had not by then reached majority, Romanus I became the senior emperor.

Romanus I had no interest in the welfare of Constantine VII and he wasted little time before raising his own sons to the purple. In 921 he made his eldest son, Christopher, co-emperor, and in 924 extended that same honour to his two younger boys. Meanwhile, Constantine VII remained in the background more than two decades before he could triumph over his unwanted in-laws early in 945 and establish a court that centred on his own family.

Though the coinage shows that Romanus I took careful, incremental steps to marginalize Constantine VII in favour of his own sons, authorities disagree about the order of events. Two rare and remarkable issues of solidi from this period show on their obverse Christ crowning Romanus I, and on their reverse the figures of Christopher and Constantine VII. One of them shows Constantine VII in the position of primacy (at the left, and with his hand higher on the patriarchal cross) and the other with Christopher in that position.

Exactly when these coins were struck is still a matter of debate. Traditionally they are attributed to 921, essentially at the time of Christopher's coronation. However, in his 2007 Corpus of the Nomismata from Anastasius II to John I in Constantinople, 713-976, Franz Füeg argues for a later date. He attributes the solidi with Constantine VII in primacy to 923-924 and to 924 the issue with Christopher in primacy (the type offered here, which he suggests was produced in haste, with only one pair of dies).

Füeg notes that on the issue that portrays Christopher subordinate to Constantine VII, both are bearded, and their busts are of equal size. However, on the subsequent issue, Christopher not only assumes the primary position, but is shown to be physically superior, as Constantine VII is now un-bearded and shorter.

The next series appears to be the common solidi that show on their obverse the seated figure of Christ, and on the reverse Romanus I and his son Christopher holding a patriarchal cross. Constantine VII is not present on this massive issue, and if Füeg's order is correct it would represent the completion of the triumph of Romanus over his royal, but out-maneuvered, son-in-law.

When Romanus II ascended the throne in 959 at the age of twenty-one, having ruled jointly with his father, Constantine VII, since 945 he showed no interest in the affairs of state, instead indulging his tastes for drink and pleasure-seeking. His lack of concern in governing the empire seems odd given that his first acts upon becoming emperor were to purge his father's advisors, banish his mother, and force his sisters into convents, all things that might be construed as securing his position. It may be that his wife, Theophano, the daughter of a poor tavern-keeper from Laconia, played a part in these events. Despite her humble origins, she was intelligent and shrewd, and at the time it was rumored that she and her husband had poisoned Constantine VII.

Regardless of the circumstances under which Romanus ascended the throne, his reign was short, for he died in 963, just three years after becoming sole emperor. Having had little time to strike coinage due to his short reign, and perhaps also partly due to the prolific coinage of his father that was still in circulation, very little coinage in Romanus' name was ever struck. His first issue of solidi seems to have been coins using dies of his father with the legend on the reverse crudely recut, and in recent years a small handful of these have come to light (see F. Füeg, "Vom Umgang mit Zufall und Wahrscheinlichkeit in der numismatischen Forschung, SNR 76 [1997], app. IV, 15.B.4; DO class XV, 22). His only other solidi are two excessively rare types, DO 1 and 2, both of which were thought to be unique at the time the Dumbarton Oaks catalogue was published, although a further example of DO 2 came to light after the publication of the catalogue. The coin offered here is the second known example of DO 1.


