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The following terms and conditions are accepted by all persons participating in the auction:

- 1. Auction bidding is conducted in Swiss Francs. The highest bidder who has been acknowledged by the auctioneer when the hammer falls after the third call has legally bought the lot. Bidding usually begins at 80% of the estimate, provided no higher offers have been submitted. Written bids have priority. The successful bidder has committed himself personally to the purchases made. He cannot claim to have acted on behalf of a third party.
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- 5. A commission of 20% will be levied on the hammer price phone bidders and bidders using our Live Internet facilities pay an additional charge of 1,5%. The Swiss value added tax (VAT) of 8,0% is payable on the final price (hammer price, plus buyer's commission and any other amounts chargeable by the Auction House to the buyer). Gold coins (AV) are exempt from VAT.
 - If the purchases are exported, then the VAT will be refunded on production of a legally valid original export declaration issued by the Swiss Customs.

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- 7. Shipping and insurance are at the buyer's cost and risk. Any fees and charges payable abroad are borne by the buyer (successful bidder) who is responsible for acquiring the necessary information about any applicable customs and foreign exchange regulations. The Auction House accepts no liability for any contraventions of such regulations.
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- 11. The contractual relationship between parties is subject in all facets to Swiss law. Place of performance is the registered office of the Auction House in 8001 Zurich, and the exclusive court of jurisdiction is Zurich.

A Collection of Roman Numismatic Portraiture

This collection of Roman portrait coins was assembled over the past decade with the eyes and heart of a numismatist, portrait researcher, and coin photographer. It represents the wide range of Roman portrait types available from the late Republic to the end of Roman rule in the West. All of the coins in this catalogue were chosen based on their artistic quality and condition to represent the various portrait types for each member of the imperial family. As you will note, portraits in bronze have always been my primary focus as, for me, the beautiful colours of untouched natural patinas really accentuate the artistic quality.

My generation of portrait enthusiasts was the first to be able to benefit from the huge amount of digital coin images to become easily accessible with the introduction of digital photography and the internet. Twenty years ago some friends and I started the 'www.romancoins.info' internet museum (Roman Numismatic Gallery) to do our part in supporting our fields of interest and distributing educational material on ancient coins and archaeology via the world wide web. Since then the centuries old exchange between researchers, private collectors, and coin (art) dealers, has been tremendously enriched by this technical opportunity. Online databases of Roman coins in museums and numismatic auctions have become increasingly available to all interested parties, more so than in any other field of the Fine Arts.

Through photographing my own collection, my passion naturally progressed to taking photos of ever better examples of portrait types in many prestigious private & public collections, both in auctions and museums. My Roman coin image database grew rapidly and now includes tens of thousands of coins. It covers any Roman individual ever depicted on coinage from the late Republic to the late Roman empire. My own personal journey culminates both in this auction, and in a book on Roman coin portraits to be published in the second quarter of 2017. It will show enlarged images of the top 700 portrait coins selected from my image database. Many expert coin collectors, numismatists, archaeologists, and art dealers - now friends- supported me on this decade long journey, both in giving me valuable advice and granting me permission to photograph their coins. I owe much to all of them.

Portrait Research on Coins

From the beginning of the Roman Empire, presenting the image of the emperor and his family was a core element in imperial propaganda. The stability of their rule depended heavily on their acceptance by the Roman military and the Roman people (in that order). The most critical phase of Roman rule was the transfer of power from one emperor to his successor; this could be their son, natural or adoptive, or one of their generals through a coup d'etat. All new emperors took great care in presenting their image to the empire immediately, and projected their political messages into their portraiture.

One of the key media channels used to transmit the image and political agenda of the Roman emperor was coins. Traditionally one side was reserved for the image of the emperor or a family member, while the other side conveyed a specific official message; this could be a military victory, gods reflecting political agendas, buildings, major achievements, etc. Coins were an ideal medium, as new emissions were issued on a regular basis, minted in huge quantities, quickly distributed, broadly used even beyond the borders of the empire, and also stayed in circulation for long periods of time-allowing an emperor to "coin" his image far beyond his reign for decades, and even centuries. Even today most of us would recognize the face of Nero!

Portrait types of emperors were likely generated by the central imperial administration as an archetype, which was then distributed via different media such as sculpture, painting, and especially coins. Coins are particularly valuable for the research of portrait types as they were - in contrast to sculpture – issued in huge quantities, survived the centuries in large numbers, always show official portraits (though limited by the size of the coin and the ability of the die engraver), carry the name of the emperor, and are often dated to the year. The same cannot be said for sculpture, where in addition to the tendency of Romans to imitate imperial types for private portraits, multiple provincial styles also make it very challenging to confirm official portraits. Sculpture was perhaps also more affected by the destruction of images of emperors who fell under the "damnatio memoriae" (this meant the eradication of inscriptions as well as images). Coins of damned emperors remained in circulation at least in remote parts of the empire and can still be found in treasure hoards. This means that numismatic portraits of every individual ever shown on Roman coins are still available for research to this day. For Geta we have hardly any surviving sculpture, but an abundance of coins, which allow us to define his portrait types. The field of classical archaeology was certainly aware of this fact, but still considered coins only as supporting evidence to sculpture, which remained their primary focus.

Most Romans never saw the emperor in person, so recognition was best achieved by minting the emperors name and a 'branded' portrait that was used across all media. This official portrait type will have had some resemblance to the emperor, although that was likely only of secondary importance as the intended political message was priority. Some typical examples of political messages expressed through portrait types were to show 'maturity' for a young emperor by adding a beard, 'energy and youth' for an old emperor by using an idealized portrait, 'dynastic continuity' with portraits of multiple sons, or military success as a general wearing military armour.

Below are some examples of Roman portrait types illustrated on coins in this catalogue:

- We can follow emperors such as Nero, Marcus Aurelius, Commodus, Caracalla and Geta, Elagabal, Severus Alexander, Gordian III, Herennius Etruscus, Hostilian, Volusian, and even in the late Roman Empire the sons of Constantine the Great, over multiple portrait types from childhood to adolescence to finally being presented as mature young men. The lead feature of this sequence of portrait types is often an increasing growth of their beard. The longest line of such portraits was issued for Marcus Aurelius over four decades.
- Most dramatic in my eyes is the "portrait battle" between the brothers Caracalla and Geta. As their father wanted to express dynastic strength, he had them presented in brotherly 'similarity' and Concordia, and their "aging" portraits were virtually indistinguishable until his death. Shortly after, when the brothers returned from Britain to Rome, they turned on one another and fighting ensued. Geta began to stylize his portrait on coins with a striking similarity to their father, with a long forked beard, while Caracalla's portrait remained unchanged. The message intended by Geta was clear: "I am the more worthy successor!". As we all know Caracalla got the upper hand over his brother's rather academic claim to sovereignty with the strike of a Roman *gladius*, having Geta killed in the arms of their mother Julia Domna.
- Highly elaborate and differing hairstyles were the pride of the imperial ladies, and were clearly "branded" on their portraits. Certainly women across the empire scrutinized such changes in fashion and followed their lead (perhaps carefully observing the newly issued coins?). A clear example of this phenomenon can be seen in the coinage of Marcus Aurelius' wife Faustina junior, who is shown on coins with no less than 9 different hairstyles. The differing types of coins can also be related to her many child births, again a dynastic topic.
- Augustus' never-aging portrait types after the battle of Actium show him as a young beardless man and reflect his political attempt to stay away from both the portrait elements of Hellenistic kings, as well as from the traditional "mature" Republican portraits, favoured by the generals of the late Republic. It has been speculated that Augustus wanted to connect rather to an even older portrait tradition, based on early Italic roots. His portrait types as Augustus were never adapted to his increasing age, he had to stay forever young.
- Commodus attempted in his final year to be seen as a God, Hercules of the Romans. This was a propaganda theme that was delivered across multiple media: coins, medals, and sculpture (as can be seen in the famous marble statue of Commodus in the Capitoline museum in Rome).
- Caracalla's portraits after the murder of his brother Geta develop an aggressive, sinister facial expression, with a short haircut and beard of a soldier. He also cites portrait elements of Alexander the Great, in whose shoes he wished to follow.
- Finally there is a phenomenon of portrait style "renaissance". For example, Constantine the Great's coins for his mother Helena and his wife Fausta were to bring back the 'Golden age of the Antonines' by quoting earlier portraits and hairstyles of Faustina the younger and her daughter Lucilla.

I hereby wish my fellow collectors many enjoyable moments and continued learning experiences with these, soon to be "their", coins, and I am sure many more interesting insights can be made by studying and enjoying Roman portraits on coins. Private collectors can be equally worthy custodians of our cultural heritage, and I am delighted to know these precious objects will be in your good hands. Lastly, may this NAC catalogue of Roman Numismatic Portraiture serve as your printed reference of Roman portrait types on coins.

Foreword

It is a great honour for Numismatica Ars Classica to present the AMP Collection of Roman Numismatic Portraiture.

To add something to the wonderful introduction the collector has written is no easy feat. In it he explains in an impeccable manner all the reasons that make numismatics not only fundamental for the study of Roman portraiture, but also for understanding the mind, spirit and political message any emperor intended to portray through his coinage.

As AMP points out, classical archaeology often sadly overlooks the importance of coins, even though they are without a doubt the most reliable form of official art accessible to us from the ancient world. Coins are the only medium of classical art capable of capturing a specific historical moment that gives a precise chronology and the only one whose trace cannot be deleted just because its image and message might have become politically unwelcome later. Our knowledge of Roman history is reliant on ancient written sources, but these should always be read critically in the light of the political orientation of the writer, whereas coins provide a snapshot of history without any possible alteration. It is true that some express the propaganda of the ruler and should therefore also be analysed critically, but coins often capture moments that other sources tried to erase or lessen in later history for opportunistic reasons.

The website www.romancoins.info which AMP initiated and continues to curate not only demonstrates beautifully the passion and expertise of our collector, but moreover confirms the importance of the contribution that collectors provide to the study and dissemination of numismatics and how fundamental a collaboration between enthusiasts, scholars and dealers is.

Unfortunately, only a small portion of public institutions have understood the importance of making their immense collections accessible online to the public. Paradoxically today the biggest contribution to the study of numismatics is provided by auction houses and collector like AMP, who provide all their images free of charge to any inquisitive requester.

The topic of the AMP Roman portrait collection is fascinating and the results obtained by the collector are truly impressive. The collection focuses mainly on material in silver and bronze and the selection of Roman portraits illustrated is perhaps the most complete to ever be presented in the history of numismatic auctions.

No matter the value, what was important to our collector was that any possible variation of a Roman portrait was included in this auction.

The selection of bronzes provided is particularly remarkable and the decision of AMP to focus on them in his collection, wherever possible (some portraits are only available in silver), is an excellent choice for a gallery of numismatic portraits as the size of the flan allows viewers to admire the quality of the engraving at its best, especially when it occurs in conjunction with a beautiful patinas.

AMP has put a considerable emphasis on the integrity of patinas - preferring a coin that has never been tooled or altered, even if this means the coin is not in perfect condition. This does not mean that the collection does not provide coins in a high state of conservation – in fact they are present in large numbers - but simply that the collector has rightly insisted on the integrity and "honesty" of the coins.

Unfortunately, a lack of space for this preface has prevented us drawing attention to the significant pieces included in the collection as we usually do. However, in this case perhaps it is better not to concentrate on individual coins, but rather allow the reader to observe, without bias, from start to finish the journey of five hundred years of Roman portraiture and history.

The Roman Republic

No known portraits can be certainly attributed to L. Cornelius Sulla. This coin without a portrait was minted during his lifetime when he marched on Rome to take control over the Roman republic. I have started this catalogue with Sulla, as his dictatorship opened the door to the troublesome imperatorial period, when contemporary portraits first appeared on Roman coins. AMP.

The best known examples are in the Carlsberg Glyptothek museum in Copenhagen, and another in the Archaeological museum in Venice. Octavian, 32 – 27 BC

After his adolescent portraits during the civil war against Marcus Antonius, some with a mourning beard, Octavian begins to develop a very different portrait style. Augustus' new and never aging, always beardless portraits reflect, in my opinion, a political attempt to distance himself from both the portraiture of the Hellenistic kings, as well as from the traditional "mature" Republican portraits, used by the imperators of the late Republic. It has been speculated that Augustus wanted to connect rather to an even older portrait tradition, based on earlier Italic roots (see Ch Gliwitzky in the upcoming book on Roman portrait coins). Be as it may, his ageless young portraits were never adapted to his changing features, he had to stay forever young. AMP.

These bronze coins minted at Colonia Nemausus served as the main currency for the Roman legions sent to conquer Germania. 

It is unusual to find such excellent portraits in this period, and the reverse is of high historical importance: in my opinion, a perfect coin. AMP.

The accession of Claudius might best be described as an unplanned coup, for he was swept into office by a praetorian guard that believed he was an ideal replacement for Caligula. Just as they had insulated him from harm for the previous five decades, his physical disabilities and reputation for mental ineptness worked in his favour under these dire circumstances. For Claudius this must have been an alarming moment, for he just as easily could have been executed on account of his blood relation and close association with Caligula. Instead, he was hailed emperor by the praetorian guardsmen, who made certain the senate supported their decision. As a result, Claudius dedicated some of his early coinages to the praetorian guardsmen to whom he owed his principate. Previously, Caligula had acted similarly by striking a brass sestertius depicting himself addressing the praetorians. This particular aureus depicts Claudius standing safely within the praetorian camp, the walls of which are inscribed IMPER RECEPT. A companion issue in gold shows Claudius clasping hands with a praetorian (presumably the praetorian prefect).

Claudius faced many challenges in his life, and though his physical disabilities ranked high on the list, perhaps even more trying were his four marriages. His first two attempts at marriage failed - the first because his would-be in laws fell out of favour, the second because his bride-to-be died on their wedding day. Of the four women Claudius actually married, he divorced the first three: one because she was the sister of the defamed Sejanus, the other two because of their adulterous affairs and apparent plans to murder him. His final, fatal marriage to his young niece Agrippina Junior, was similarly disastrous as it ended not only the life of Claudius, but also the life of his only son, Britannicus. According to Tacitus, Claudius' famous statement that "it was his destiny first to endure his wives' misdeeds, and then to punish them" may have expedited his own death, for upon hearing him utter these words, Agrippina wasted no time in murdering Claudius by serving him a dish of poisoned mushrooms. Adding insult to injury was Claudius' precocious teenage successor Nero, who, after Claudius had been deified by the senate, rudely observed that mushrooms must be the food of the gods.

The reverse of this interesting coin commemorates the remission of the customary 21/2% tax or customs duty (quadragensumae remissae) collected on goods crossing provincial borders which Galba had awarded to the provinces of Spain and Gaul for lending him support during the Civil War. The location of the equestrian arch shown on the right side of the reverse is not known, and in fact may not have even existed, being instead a planned construction that Galba never built due to his short reign or merely militaristic imagery meant to appeal to the legions, four of which were stationed in Spain. If it is an arch that Galba planned to build, then it is ironic considering his parsimonious reputation.

On this rare Lugdunese sestertius Titus and Domitian, heirs of the new Flavian Dynasty, are shown standing in military garb, holding spears and sheathed swords. Though it would require no great stretch of the imagination for an engraver to construct this type, it does give the sense of a dynastic statuary group, and it may have been based upon just such a monument

It is part of an isolated issue of aes that Vespasian produced in Lugdunum from 71-72, after which that mint seems to have remained inactive for bronzes until 77-78, when it resumed output, this time for all three Flavian men.

Cited in the inscriptions are Vespasian's fourth consulship, Titus' second, and a designation for Domitian's second, which allows us to firmly place it in 72. By this time the conflict between the brothers had grown from a mere sibling rivalry to an imperial concern. Domitian was resentful of his secondary role in political and military life, and found little joy living in the shadow of his older, more decorated brother.

In imperial publicity heir-brothers tended to be compared with Castor and Pollux, whose pietas was well attested, whereas to compare them with Romulus and Remus would set a poor example since Remus died at his brother's hand.

None the less, the literary tradition was often hostile to co-heirs, notably Drusus and Germanicus, and Titus and Domitian. Suetonius (Titus 9) represents Domitian as plotting against Titus, and it has been observed that there is a veiled reference to the rivalry between the Flavian brothers in Statius' Thebaid, a work dedicated in 91/2 to Domitian that dramatizes the conflict between the sons of Oedipus over the rule of Thebes.

Coinage in the name of Domitilla has long been a source of confusion, for the denarii and aurei bear portraits with the designation DIVA, and the sestertii, which are dated to the sole reign of Titus, have no portrait and no indication that the lady they honour was deified. The obvious conclusion is that they are separate coinages that presumably honour different women. Fortunately two candidates are known, Vespasians wife Flavia Domitilla and their daughter, who bore the same name. Both women died before Vespasian became emperor in 69, an appropriate circumstance for the memorial in nature of these coinages. Titus' sestertii for his mother, the elder Domitilla, are inscribed MEMORIAE DOMITILLAE SPQR and show a carpentum drawn by mules. Metrological study by Carradice has shown that the aurei and denarii of the deified Domitilla were struck by Domitian sometime after his monetary reform of 82. This conclusion is reinforced by their portraits, which incorporate the features of Domitian (as can clearly be observed on the coin offered here).

Despite having died before her family came to rule the empire, the younger Domitilla had at least one daughter who, rather inconveniently, bore the same name as her mother and grandmother, and who is thus called Domitilla III. This young woman eventually married Flavius Clemens, a grandson of Vespasians' brother Flavius Sabinus. The royal couple had several children of their own, though coins were struck for only one of them, the unfortunate Vespasian Junior, who was eventually murdered by Domitian.

Many Roman emperors were fond of architecture, and consequently struck coins with architectural types, but in this regard we must acknowledge that Trajan was the most prolific of them all. On this sestertius we have a depiction of his marvellous forum, represented by the façade of its entrance. It appears as a building of six columns with its central entrance flanked by four distyle shrines, each containing a statue and situated beneath a circular shield. The roof supports an array of statues and statuary groups: in the center is a facing chariot of six horses; the outermost horses are assisted by standing warriors, and the whole scene is flanked by military trophies and figures of Victory. The forum was dedicated in 112 or 113, the coin types presumably were struck in 115, and the final touches seemingly were completed about two years later. Trajan struck a variety of Imperial coins with architectural reverses, including many with identifiable statues and statuary groups, such as Trajan's equestrian statue and the castellum of the Aqua Trajana. Foremost among his other architectural types are his basilica, the Circus Maximus, the 'Danube bridge,' a hexagonal harbour, a triumphal arch, Trajan's Column, a richly ornamented gateway to Area Capitolina, the temple of Jupiter Victor and an octastyle temple which may be that of Honos, or perhaps the one eventually dedicated by Hadrian to Trajan and Plotina that occupied the end of the forum opposite the entrance depicted on this sestertius.

The first few portrait types of Hadrian on coins occur very early in his reign and can be clearly differentiated. The first type depicts Hadrian with a very small head and large bust. The second type has a larger head with bust, the third type a large head usually without a bust. There is an ongoing scholarly debate as to whether there are any further sub-types of portraits within this third portrait type (used from ca 120 to his death). It is my view that all numismatic portraits in this period are only variants of the same third portrait type. AMP



Faustina II, daughter of Antoninus Pius and wife of Marcus Aurelius

K. Fittschen identified nine portrait types of Faustina junior on coins, based on different hairstyles also present in sculpture, and relates them based on the coin reverse types to the births of her many children (Fittschen 1982). It is not always easy to attribute a coin portrait of Faustina junior to one of Fittschen's hairstyles, as not all coins are equally well executed, however the diversity of her hairstyles is obvious. Her most prominent marble bust in the Capitoline museum is an exact replica of the same portrait type as the Fittschen type 1 coins. This bust was found at Hadrian's villa in Tivoli, and quickly entered the Papal collections. In my view type 1 of Faustina II is the most attractive portrait type of this seemingly very beautiful woman. AMP.



Caracalla is shown to mature throughout 9 differing portrait types on Roman coins from a young boy with a round head and straight hair (as Caesar) to Augustus with a laurel and curly hair, to an adolescent boy with an increasing beard length, and finally to a young man with a full beard. This phenomenon was last analyzed on coins by A. Pangerl (Korrespondenzblatt des RGZM 43, 2013, 99-116). His brother Geta's portraits follow his lead, albeit with some delay, through the same portrait types so that shortly before the death of their father, the two brothers were equally presented to the people as mature young men, ready to follow their father to the throne. Caracalla developed further portrait types only after his brother's murder, for instance a very aggressive sinister looking type with deep wrinkles on his forehead. AMP.



Geta caesar, 198 – 209

Seven portrait types were identified for Geta, spanning the period between his nomination as Caesar and his assassination late in 211. Initially his portrait evolves in parallel to his brother Caracalla's portrait types, albeit with delay, from child to a mature man. After the death of their father both brothers were appointed Augusti. During the turbulent animosities from 211 up to his murder, Geta as augustus develops his final seventh portrait type with a long forked beard and a clear resemblance to his father Septimius Severus, while Caracalla's portrait does not change. In my opinion, Geta used this similiarity in portrait style to his father for his gain in the struggle for power. AMP.

Maximinus, a soldier that conquered the throne with brute force having Severus Alexander and his mother killed in modern Mainz, Germany, is initially represented with natural features but his later portraits adopt a more extreme, expressive style with a long hooked nose and pointed large chin. His wife's portrait appears to have been strongly influenced by this unusual style, as does that of his son Maximus, albeit to a lesser degree. Perhaps one can assume an artistic experiment, which merits further research. I am not aware of any sculpture that is so extreme. AMP.

Gallienus, 253 – 268

Gallienus' numismatic portraiture is amongst the most complex in the third century, with multiple dramatic style changes from initially classical "realistic" portraits as a general emperor via more 'experimental' portraits to minimalistic and very impersonal portraits. Gallienus late portraits are in my view an important artistic step leading on to the portraits of the dominate, the tetrarchy and eventually into images of the empires of late Rome and the Byzantine empire (which I am hesitant to even call portraits). Clearly more research is needed for the portraiture of Gallienus and the motivations behind these dramatic shifts. AMP.

Postumus, 260 – 269

Postumus and the following emperors of the Gallic empire still have individual portrait types, with beards of different lengths. I always selected typical portraits to represent their portrait types in my collection, that I could recognise without reading the coin inscriptions. Often the poor quality of the dies and the increasingly small flans made that quite a challenging and time consuming task. I did succeed eventually and found exceptional coins.

Note that I left the small copper antoninani of Tetricus I and II out of this auction, but they are part of my collection. Especially the young Tetricus II shows interesting portraits as a boy, a portrait type that seems to echo the portraits of imperial princes several decades earlier. AMP.

They can nonetheless often be recognized on their coins just based on their portraits, certainly to the experienced numismatist and collector. To add to the diversity many more mints than Rome started to issue coins, with often very specific local styles, that reflect more the mint than the emperor. AMP.

Diocletian, 284 – 305

From the late third century to the period of Diocletian up to Constantine the Great, portrait styles change dramatically. While the first coins issued for Diocletian and his eventual co-augustus Maximianus were still in line with the portraits of the military emperors seen in the decades before, the newly established tetrarchic structure of two Augusti and two Caesars called for completely different images. From this point on, the Tetrarchs are shown without individual portrait features. The tetrarchic 'One for all, all for one philosophy' included that the portraits of all four should look exactly the same. As a matter of fact, tetrarchic portrait types differ more between the many now established mints than between the tetrarchic emperors themselves.

There are however a few exceptions: in some Western mints Maximianus shows a stubby nose, while his Caesar Constantius I is presented at times with a rather aquiline nose. These individual features can be best observed in issues from Treveri (modern Trier), where Constantius I resided. AMP.

The following two coins represent the most fascinating and interesting portrait type of Constantine the Great, the highly stylised new portrait type looking up "to God". Especially a large miliarense such as this example is exceedingly rare and difficult to find. Clearly these portraits leave the tetrarchic images behind and experiment with a completely new approach to imperial portraits.

This particular miliarense has a feature which I have not found so far on other coins (but I have also not seen many such miliarense to compare it with): Constantine's hair was made to look fuller and shinier by this very artistic die maker through an ingenious idea. He added many ultrashort metal cuts against the longer waves of the hair, which reflect the light. This miliarense was exhibited at the Constantine exhibition in the Munich Coin Museum, in the catalogue Konstantin 312; 2012 coin 126 AMP.

Constans, 337 - 350

Numismatic portraits of the three surviving sons of Constantine the Great as augusti naturally leave their portraits as young princes behind as they grow up (Constantine II showing an adolescent beard on some rare follis), but they do not follow the innovative portrait style set by their father as augustus (see above miliarense and solidus).

They rather use two new impersonal portrait types which would dominate late Roman coinage far into the later Byzantian Empire.

- 1) Late Roman side portraits such as below with diadem and/or pearls, first developed during the later part of the reign of their father, and,
- 2) The typical frontal imperial portraits with helmet in gold, first used during the reign of Constantius II as augustus. Some Late Roman emperors still issue coins with limited individual features such as beards, or a peculiar shaped nose. I will point out these increasingly rarer examples in this catalogue. Also, the imperial ladies continue to be represented with impressive hairstyles and jewellery, but with less and less individuality of their face. The position, title, and the attributes of power are now more import than the individual person. AMP.

For me the Western Roman empire does not really end with Romulus Augustus in 476, but rather with Julius Nepos as last legitimiate Roman emperor in the West 474-475, and he remained the legitimate emperor acknowledged by his colleague in the East until his death in 480.
